

Passengers Flee Burning Airliner

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — John G. Rankin ate breakfast Monday with just his right hand. His left hand was still wrapped in heavy bandages from friction burns received last night when he and 30 other passengers slid down a rope from a burning American Airlines plane that crash-landed after colliding with a Navy Beechcraft here Sunday.

Two Naval Reserve officers died in the crash. Rankin, 54-year-old Louisville, Ky., employee of a fishing tackle firm, slid to safety after a woman passenger stalled in front of him, afraid of the 25-foot rope plunge.

"Lady," he told her, "we've got to go." He said he grabbed her with his right arm and slid down the rope by his left hand. He suffered severe hand burns.

Eyewitnesses on the ground said the Navy plane exploded in a "ball of fire," spattering burning debris in the dusk, then crashed just east of the Port Columbus Airport.

The dead were identified as Lt. Cmdr. John R. Hoerath, 35, of nearby Westerville and Lt. Cmdr. Donald G. Edgar, 48, of Columbus.

Capt. J. C. Pollard, 32, of Nashville, pilot of the American Airlines passenger Convair, brought his ship safely to earth.

WINGS FLAMING
Its wings were flaming from gasoline spilled in the crash and the left engine was torn loose. Crippled and burning, the Convair skidded across the Port Columbus runway on its nose.

Trapped inside by a damaged exit door up front near the nose, the passengers and three crew members escaped down a coarse rope 25 feet to safety.

The safety door was forced open by slim, auburn-haired stewardess Martha Jane Gunn, 24, of Nashville, Tenn.

A baby was dropped into the arms of its parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Herrman of Columbus, when they were unable to take the child with them down the rope.

Investigators from the Civil Aeronautics Board were expected to arrive Monday from Washington and Chicago to study the crash.

The planes collided as both neared Port Columbus for landings.

PLANES GIVEN OK
The Civil Aeronautics Authority here said a preliminary report indicates both planes had been given "an okay for an approach but only the American Airlines plane had been given an okay for a landing."

The passenger plane was bound from Memphis to Cleveland, Ohio. The Navy plane was returning to Columbus from Lafayette, Ind.

One eyewitness, pilot John H. Corrier, 35, of Columbus, said the Navy plane pulled up apparently on control tower orders to make a different approach and crashed into the front undersection of the huge passenger ship.

March Base officials said the ill-fated plane was on a routine training flight from the Oklahoma base and for this reason probably did not have a full load of fuel but only enough for its own use.

Gasoline and wreckage were strewn for a wide area over the precipitous section of the mountain where it hit.

Hours after the crash parts of the wreckage were still burning. None of the victims was from Oregon.

Small Turnout Expected In Maryland Primary Vote

BALTIMORE (AP) — National party officials showed special interest in three of the seven congressional seats and state political leaders kept close watch on the Democratic primary for governor Monday as Marylanders named their candidates for the November elections.

Despite this high-level attention and an exceptionally bitter campaign by Dr. H. C. Byrd and paving contractor George P. Mahoney for the Democratic governor nomination, the election stirred little apparent interest among the voters.

Election supervisors predicted about one third of the 1,065,180 eligibles would turn out.

GOVERNORIAL RACE
An even smaller showing was expected on the Republican side, where Gov. Theodore R. McKeldin sought renomination to a second term in a state where his party is outnumbered 2-1 by the Democrats.

The GOP campaign had produced few fireworks. McKeldin practically ignored his three opponents, Baltimore used car dealer Temus R. Bright, retired Marine Lt. Gen. Pedro A. del Valle and James W. Gum, Montgomery County farmer and lawyer.

Also on the ballot were aspirants to attorney general, the State Court of Appeals, four circuit benches, the Legislature and county offices.

There was no major opposition from either party to Democratic Comptroller J. Millard Tawes, close friend and distant cousin to the 65-year-old Byrd.

With the GOP holding a bare majority of the seven Maryland congressional seats, national chieftains of both parties looked for sore spots and possible November breakthroughs.

THREE RACES EYED
Mentioned among these in dispatches from national party headquarters were the 2nd, 5th and 7th District seats occupied by Republicans Edward T. Miller and Frank Small Jr. and Democrat Samuel N. Friedel, respectively.

Miller, who broke a long series of Democratic victories in his district eight years, was opposed for a fifth term by Mrs. Alonsita Walker, widow of a wealthy oilman.

Small faced opposition from Robert E. Ennis of Capitol Heights, and Friedel from Henry R. Hergenroeder, member of a well-known baking family and professor at Baltimore Loyola College.

There was no primary opposition to the other incumbents.

NAACP Vows Court Action

School Boards to Be Defendants in Suits

DALLAS (AP) — The leader of the Negroes' antisegregation battle has indicated his organization will stand for no trifling with the Supreme Court's school decision.

Thurgood Marshall says the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) will go to court against local school boards which balk.

Marshall arrived Saturday for the annual national convention of the NAACP in this segregated city. As special counsel for the NAACP, he was a powerful factor in the May 17 decision of the Supreme Court which outlawed segregation in public schools.

"While the governors want to circumvent the Supreme Court," he said, "we are going to circumvent the governors."

Since the Supreme Court spoke, there is no use listening to anybody else.

"In suits, if they have to be filed, the school boards will be the defendants."

However, he would not deny pro-segregation governors the right to speak out against the court's ruling. And he said he favors court action to compel admission of Negro students to schools only as a final resort.

Monday, Marshall was discussing with other Negro lawyers how to handle possible suits. The lawyers will confer with state NAACP presidents Tuesday, opening day of the six-day convention. About 700 delegates are expected.

The lawyer said the convention will consider other fields in which it will fight segregation. He mentioned transportation, housing, recreation and employment. But, he added, "schools are most important to me."

Little Girl Survives 2 Nights in Woods

MARKLEEVILLE, Calif. (AP) — Little Kathy Paxton, for whom hundreds of men had searched since Friday evening, was found Sunday only a short distance from her family's camp in the High Sierras.

The five-year-old tot was in surprisingly good condition after wandering without food or shelter for more than 40 hours in the 8,500-foot wilderness area, where temperatures dropped nightly to near-freezing.

A mongrel dog owned by one of the searchers started barking furiously not far from the Woods Lake Camp from which Kathy had wandered, and suddenly the little red-clad girl stepped out of the dense forest.

"Are you Kathy?" asked Van Dell, owner of the dog, when the tot stepped out on the trail.

"Yes, and I'm tired," she replied with a wan smile.

But she was in amazingly good condition, for all her frightening experience. Except for a black eye and a broken tooth, incurred in a fall, the Stead Air Force Base doctor who examined her could find no injuries.

Kathy apparently had had nothing to eat since late Friday, when her mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Stewart Carndall of Cupertino, Calif., pitched camp at Woods Lake.

At 7:30 p. m. that evening she and her brother Peter, 6½, entered nearby restrooms. When the boy came out, Kathy was gone. The family believed she lost direction and wandered away in the dark woods.

Several times during the two-

day search men came upon her tracks, but they never caught sight of her. Sunday, some 200 civilians and 300 airmen from Stead Air Force Base minutely investigated every thicket and clump of brush in the area.

Surprisingly, no one had given up hope of her being found alive, either. She was warmly dressed, for one thing, clad from head to foot in warm clothing, all of which she was still wearing when Van Dell and his dog found her.
