

MacMurray-Haver Wives Held in Hotel

Calif. — Blonde June Haver, who once gave up Hollywood to become a nun, and actor MacMurray were married in a surprise hotel room.

The actress and MacMurray have been married since a year ago, and away to this valley resort in Hollywood off base.

Through the wedding was expected to take place next week.

The ceremony meant Miss Haver can no longer practice her

religion in the eyes of the Catholic Church.

Her efforts to obtain the church's consent to the marriage had failed. It ruled she was still married to musician Jimmy Zito, even though the union ended in a divorce. The church does not recognize divorces of Catholic marriages.

Only last year Miss Haver gave up studies to become a nun, saying the physical strain was too great.

Monday night's ceremony took place in the room of Dr. and Mrs. Don Burger, owners of the Ojai Valley Inn, before Superior Judge Charles Blackstock.

MacMurray, 45, whose first wife died a year ago, slipped a circle of diamonds on the finger of the blonde 27-year-old bride. She gave him a plain gold band. He had given her a diamond solitaire when the engagement was revealed a month ago.

Later the bride and groom and a small group of friends and relatives celebrated with champagne. Then the couple took off on a motor honeymoon through Grand Canyon and Bryce Canyon.

Agreement

WASHINGTON — The Senate Tuesday passed and sent to President Eisenhower a bill extending the 20-year-old reciprocity agreements act to June 1955.

The Senate completed legislation on the bill by accepting a House change voted Monday.

Originally President Eisenhower sought a three-year extension of new powers to cut tariffs. He dropped this after Republicans in the House, and agreed to the one-year bill with no new duty-cut powers.

NEW YORK — The income tax evasion case against the nation's former top tax collector, Philip D. Numan Jr., went to a federal court jury in Brooklyn Tuesday.

Steelworkers Come to Terms

PITTSBURGH — The CIO United Steelworkers Executive Board Tuesday approved a "package" contract settlement giving 600,000 basic steel industry workers a five cents an hour wage increase plus fringe benefits worth about three cents an hour.

The U. S. Steel Corp. and five other top producers employing some 370,000 steelworkers, signed the contract Tuesday afternoon.

The ceremonies followed approval of the settlement by the USW's 170-man Wage-Policy Committee.

U. S. Steel, the nation's No. 1 producer and formulator of the industrywide contract terms, already has signed contract memorandums along with Bethlehem, Republic, Jones & Laughlin, Youngstown Sheet and Tube, and Inland Steel Companies.

The USW's contracts were scheduled to expire at Wednesday midnight.

The agreement, hammered out in its final details with "big steel" Monday night, provides, in addition to the wage increase, improved hospitalization insurance benefits to cost about two cents an hour per man. Better pension agreements in the settlement will vary in cost with the individual companies.

About 70 other companies having basic steel contracts with the union were expected to work out similar agreements quickly with the 1,200,000-member USW.

The new contract can be opened for wages only next year. The pension and insurance provisions will go into effect Nov. 1 with the insurance program frozen for two years and the pension package for three.

Other details of the contract were not disclosed immediately.

Hurt in Crash

Erie T. Kirby, 28, of Eugene, was hurt late Monday afternoon when he was pinned between an auto and a railroad car in North Eugene.

Kirby, a Southern Pacific flagman, was taken to Eugene Hospital and Clinic where he was in good condition Tuesday. His leg was severely crushed below the knee.

Eugene police reported that he was flagging for a train at 4th Ave. and Charnell St. when a car driven by Richard D. Swanson, 26, of 1596 W. 8th Ave., crashed into it. Swanson told officers he was blinded by the sun.

Workers used jacks to free Kirby, who was pinned between the train and the car after the car wedged tightly against a track-side building.

There were no citations and Swanson was not hurt.

Ice Creamski Sales Brisk

MOSCOW — The Malenkov government, pledged to give the Soviet common man more to eat and drink, says it is making good this summer on the ice cream front.

The press admits there is a long way to go before consumer goods and housing reach the desired level. But Soviet Trade, organ of Anastase Mikoyan's Ministry of Trade, says tons of ice cream are being produced.

"Ice cream is demanded more and more by all," this paper observes. "There has been a considerable increase in sales over last year. The number of sellers has been increased from 3,030 to 3,420. In addition there is more ice cream in restaurants and cafes. On hot days the volume sold in Moscow averages 160 to 170 tons and on June 13 it hit a record 200 tons."

Last week the government closed down Moscow's best known bar, the Koktail Hol, and changed it into an ice cream parlor from noon until 11:45 p.m.

HONG KONG — William B. Christian of Richmond, Va., arrived Tuesday night aboard a British ship from Shanghai. He appeared weak and ill, but happy to be out of Red China.

Christian, 67, last director of the British-American Tobacco Co. in China, was accompanied by his Russian-born wife, a naturalized American citizen.

They are the first Americans permitted to leave Communist China since March.

Also aboard the ship were a number of Europeans, including two Catholic nuns, and several stateless persons traveling under U.N. auspices.

Christian refused to talk with newsmen.

Chiang Aide Blasts
Indochina Partitioning

TAIPEI, Formosa — The No. 2 man in Nationalist China's Foreign Office Tuesday criticized the Western Allies for "trying hard to achieve a unified Korea and a unified Germany" while "considering the partition of Indochina."

Shen Chang-huan, senior vice minister of foreign affairs, called the division of Germany and Korea after World War II "gross blunders."

"How forgetful the democracies are!" He declared in a speech.

Cornutt Rites Held at Riddle

Services for Alfred Wesley Cornutt of 639 E. Broadway, were held Tuesday at Simon-Lounsberry Chapel with Masonic graveside services at Riddle.

Mr. Cornutt was born 87 years ago in Riddle and lived nearly all his life in Lane and Douglas Counties. He died last Saturday.

Mr. Cornutt's parents, Noah and Mary Judd Cornutt, came to Oregon in 1853, settling near Riddle in 1860.

Mr. Cornutt was graduated from Drain Normal School in 1894, taught in Jackson County for a year and then returned to Riddle. He helped build the Oregon and California Railroad, and in 1916 he moved to Delight Valley. He came to Eugene in 1927.

Surviving are his widow Julia; two sons, Welden of Olympia and Adrian of Seattle; four daughters, Mrs. Vernon Thompson and Mrs. Lloyd Ames of Eugene, Mrs. Harold Parsons of Florence and Mrs. Victor Wyncoop of Portland; two brothers, Noah of Riddle and Clarence of Albany; a sister, Mrs. Parke Patterson of Portland; and 17 grandchildren.

80, Dies Here

Lillian D. Horton, 80, of 670 W. 15th Ave., died Monday, June 28, 1954.

A school teacher for more than 30 years prior to retirement in 1925, she was born April 15, 1874, in Iowa. She attended the state normal school at Wayne, Nebr., and taught in that state before coming to Eugene in 1908.

A member of the First Baptist Church of Eugene, she taught Sunday school classes there and was a county leader in the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

Surviving is a brother, George A. Horton of Eugene.

Funeral services will be Thursday at 2 p.m. at Veatch Hollingsworth England Funeral Home with Dr. Vance H. Webster officiating. Burial will be in Pioneer Memorial Cemetery.

Council Raps
Dog Racing

Opposition to dog racing in Lane County was reaffirmed by the Eugene City Council Monday night.

The protest against any such activity was voiced in a resolution adopted unanimously by the council. The resolution is the same as one passed a year ago, but changes the wording to "Lane County" instead of the Eugene area.

The proposal for the new resolution was made by Ed Cone, councilman from Ward 4.

A copy of the resolution will be sent to the Oregon State Racing Commission, scheduled to meet in Portland on July 2. The commission probably will consider an application for a permit from Greyhound Racing, Inc., of Eugene, to establish a track in the county.
