

Labor Disputes Go to States

NLRB Adopts New Regulations

WASHINGTON (AP)—The National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) in a major move to switch some of the federal government's labor jurisdiction to the states, has adopted new rules which in effect exempt thousands of small firms from the Taft-Hartley Law. Unions generally have opposed giving the states more power over labor relations problems, while the Eisenhower administration has held that more problems should be settled at the local level.

It was reliably estimated by NLRB sources that the new rules, announced Wednesday, will knock out 15 or 20 per cent of the board's present caseload which has been running at about 14,000 a year.

An NLRB spokesman said other changes are planned in the future to surrender more federal jurisdiction. However, the courts have left uncertain just how far states can go in cases where the federal government has voluntarily surrendered jurisdiction in cases affecting interstate commerce.

None of the NLRB rules changes were made unanimously by the five-member board. Cases in which the new policies were established have not been made public.

In one rule change, the NLRB said that henceforth it won't take a case unless an employer does at least \$50,000 annual business in interstate commerce. The prior dollar-volume requirement was \$25,000.

It voted, too, to take no case of a supplier unless the amount of goods and services he supplied to interstate commerce is \$100,000 a year. Previously the requirement was \$50,000 and the goods or services did not have to move in interstate commerce as long as the buyer was in interstate business.

Federal Budget Shows Deficit

WASHINGTON (AP)—This is fiscal year Year's Day for the government and it looks like Uncle Sam wound up the old year in the red by about the 3 1/4 billion dollars that had been predicted.

However, the deficit for the fiscal year ended Wednesday may be a little smaller than previously estimated. Revenues evidently were lower than anticipated, but cuts in government spending went deeper than previously predicted.

The government begins its fiscal or business years on July 1 and closes its books annually on June 30. The year beginning Thursday is fiscal 1955, for which President Eisenhower has predicted a deficit next June 30 of about \$2,928,000,000.

In his budget message of last January giving revised estimates for the fiscal year just ended, Eisenhower predicted that fiscal 1954 spending would total about \$70,902,000,000 and net receipts would come to approximately \$67,974,000,000. That would leave a deficit of about \$3,274,000,000.

The treasury will not have final, complete figures on the fiscal year until about July 19. However, from the way spending and receipts have been running in recent months it appeared that total receipts for fiscal 1954 would total about 64 1/2 billion dollars, or approximately 2 1/2 billion dollars under President Eisenhower's January estimate. It appeared also that spending would come to about 67 1/4 billion dollars, or slightly more than 3 billion dollars less than the January estimate.

This would indicate that the deficit may be about a quarter of a billion dollars less than the January estimate, or about 3 billion dollars instead of 3 1/4 billion dollars.

Mental Patient Wounds 8 In Wild Shooting Spree

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—A 54-year-old man on convalescent leave from a mental hospital fought a death duel with 200 policemen in his West Side home Wednesday and wounded eight officers before he was killed.

When the gunfire finally was stilled the body of Howard Ellis lay behind a bookcase barricade, riddled by 200 bullets. His dirty white frame house was splintered by thousands of rounds of ammunition.

Ellis' wife Janie, first target of his rage, suffered minor wounds in the left leg and left hand.

One patrolman, Paul White, 39, was in critical condition with wounds in the chest, neck and arm.

Two others were listed in serious condition. They were Dora Ward, 27, shot in the head, and Marlin Lyon, 39, shot in the right side. Lt. Paul Pearcey, 60, was in fair condition. Four others were released after treatment for less serious wounds.

Five foster children who had been placed in the Ellis home by the Welfare Department slipped out of the house before the shooting started and were not harmed.

Central State Hospital said Ellis had been on leave for a year and a half and had been checked by monthly reports. The hospital said his June report was the most favorable since his release.

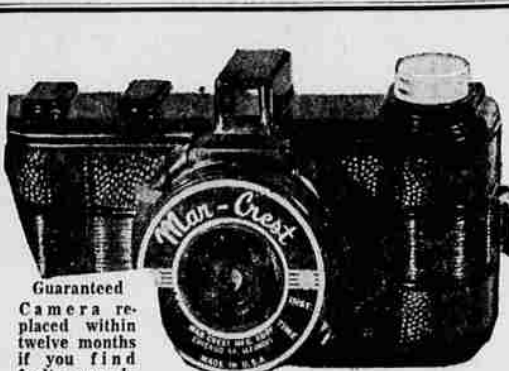
Mrs. Ellis said the trouble

started when Ellis beat one of the foster children wards. She threatened to call the hospital and have him recommitted, and he chased her from the house. She called the hospital and police from a neighbor's home, then started to return home.

That was when Ellis started shooting, wounding her. She fled again, and the first police to arrive found Ellis crouching behind a utility pole outside the house. He wounded Pearcey. The officers held their fire because

there were children in the yard. Ellis retreated to the house and the siege began. His wife said she had no idea where he got his shot-gun, rifle and huge supply of ammunition.

Ellis kept up a heavy fire. Finally an armored car roared up to the back door, and three heavily armed officers leaped through the door and ended the battle. "It just had to be that way," Mrs. Ellis said softly when they told her at General Hospital that her husband was dead.



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Salem Angler Swept Away

BEND (AP)—An angler was swept away from his wife and two friends by the swift Deschutes River Wednesday. He was presumed drowned.

The victim was Samuel Mowery, 51, an employee of the state hospital at Salem, who was on a fishing trip to the Pringle Falls area, 35 miles south of here.

He was upstream from his wife and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Smith, also of Salem, when he fell in unobserved. The current carried him past them before they could make a rescue try.

They said he grabbed for a limb, but failed to reach it. Then he disappeared.
