Hendershott, who was president of the bar last year, said Wednesday the bar association in May, 1953, unofficially endorsed Reid to fill any future vacancy. He said 52 attorneys signed a petition which was submitted to Patterson.

Hendershott said at the time there were four avowed candidates for any future vacancy. These, he said, were William P. Riddlesbarger, Stanley Darling, William Fort and Reid.

Of the 13 bar association members who didn't sign the petition, Hendershott said, seven were members of law firms which had candidates for the circuit judge petition.

The bar association is committed to a preferential ballot, Hendershott explained, "but we felt this was already taken care of by the petition."

Hendershott said "all the leading attorneys" of the county endorse Reid as well as the "old timers," and that the bar is "very enthusiastic" in its support of Reid.

'POLITICAL CRACK'

Hendershott labeled Porter's comments about Patterson as "just a political crack at the governor."

Sidney Thwing, current president of the bar association, said Wednesday the petition signed "by 90 per cent of the attorneys," was already in the hands of the governor when the bar voted to utilize the preferential poll for future recommendations.

Thwing commented he didn't think the governor was aware that the Lane County Bar Assn. had a polling procedure for making recommendations.

NEVER GIVEN CHANCE

Gordon Ramstead, association member who introduced the motion setting up the system of preferential polling, said Tuesday the system "was never given a chance in this case."

Porter, meanwhile, said he never saw the petition, that it was circulated outside the bar association meetings and that petitions were not circulated for any of the other candidates.

"The petition was circulated surreptitiously," Porter said. He added he intended to bring the matter up at next week's meeting of the bar association.

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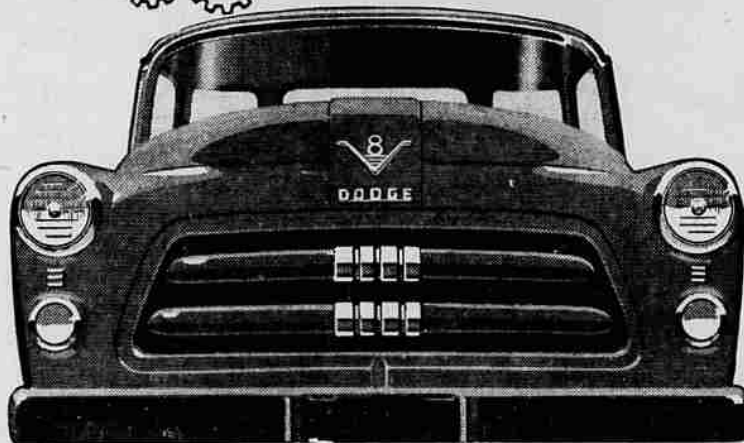


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
