The petitions call for a vote on abandonment of the airpark. Prior to the budget hearing, Beistler reported to the council that the petitions contained more than enough valid signatures to put the measure up to vote. The council referred the matter to its elections and aviation committees for study. Presumably these committees will report it out soon and order the measure placed on the ballot.

Hemphill told the council that he wondered whether or not the information Fisher will supply could not be gotten elsewhere cheaper or for the asking. He suggested the Civil Aeronautics Authority might be able to supply it.

Councilmen said the CAA had been contacted and said it did not have all figures at hand and did not have the facilities for so complete a study.

NEEDS ADVICE

Councilman Siegenthaler explained that "Regardless of the outcome of the vote on abandonment, the city has valuable property there (at the Airpark) and needs the expert's advice on it we couldn't possibly get any other way."

Councilman George Owen said that the expenditure will be slight compared to the value of the property.

Other councilmen supported this saying that because of all that is involved, and because of the conflict of opinions, they cannot make their decision without Fisher's help.

Hemphill said he had appeared more to question than object and thanked the councilmen for the information.

The budget then was made official and the property tax levy for it ordered.

The total budget is \$2,191,000. Of this \$802,885 will come from property taxes.

The remainder will come from City license fees, court fines, city-shared state revenues, special levies and various administrative charges.

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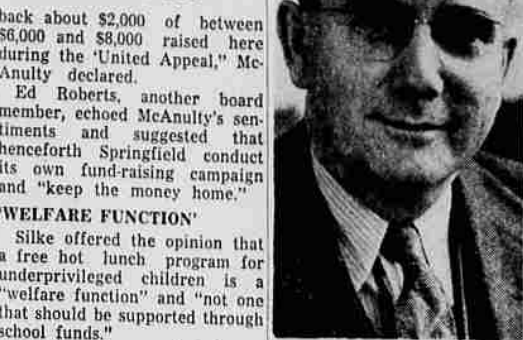

Rare Beauties, Those Clouds Mean Little

Clouds usually tell whether the weather will be wonderful or otherwise, but the formations, over Lane County the past two days have been "just clouds."

Weathermen at Mahlon Sweet Field explained Tuesday that the interesting, small white clouds of Monday and early Tuesday were extremely high altocumulus varying from 18,000 to 25,000 feet.

A balloon released from the local station Tuesday morning entered them at 25,000 feet.

The wispy tails that filtered the moonlight Monday night were made up of falling snow, the weathermen said. It dissipated when it fell into warmer air.

The clouds aren't ice crystals, despite their height, but water droplets, just like the hill-scraping kind.

They don't mean a thing, but the forecast does call for good weather until Thursday when there will be some thunder showers.

Streets, Licences Occupy Council

Street improvements and license applications took up most of the Springfield City Council's time Monday evening.

The council let contracts on the paving of three streets, called public hearings on other street jobs, and ordered the start of two storm drains.

The council also granted 37 business licenses and granted a vacation to the municipal judge.

Intercity Sand and Gravel was low bidder on the three street paving projects.

The paving jobs and low bids are: Level Lane from Riverview to City View Sts., \$5,685; River view from City View to Summit, and Summit to Sunset, \$6,002; and Riverview from W. D St., to City View, and City View to Crest Lane, \$10,873.

Sept. 30 was set as the completion date on the three projects.

HEARINGS CALLED

Public hearings were called for 7:30 p.m. July 26th on the widening of 5th St. from G St. north for 394 feet, and another hearing on paving of 5th St. from that point north to K St.

Councilmen also called a hearing on the widening of 5th St. from B to G St. from its present 32 feet width to 40 feet. This project was discussed as a city-financed job, but the hearing was called to determine sympathies of the residents. Several shade trees would be removed if the project is undertaken, councilmen said.

The council also talked over the opening of new connector streets between South A St. and Main St., but no decisions were made.

Councilmen also ordered steps taken for the construction of storm drains from 21st to 20th Sts. on E St., and from DePue St. to the McKenzie Ditch on 5th St.

PRO TEM APPOINTMENTS

City Recorder Bill Mansell was appointed municipal judge pro tem from July 19 to 25, and City Attorney Robert Carmichael as judge pro tem from July 25 until the return from vacation of Municipal Judge Leigh J. Monson.

The council accepted the recently paved alley south of Main St. between 5th and 6th Sts. and the new sidewalks on the south side of L St. from 12th to 13th Sts. for maintenance. A recently paved streets, 20th from Main to D St., was not accepted pending examination of what councilmen said looked like a bad mix of concrete.

The council also resolved to proceed with the paving of G St. from 14th to 16th St. in front of the new hospital as soon as a city-owned house on the street can be moved.

The house will soon be put up for sale on bids, councilmen said.

Most of the license applications acted on by the council were annual or semi-annual renewals. The list included nine television installation and maintenance licenses.
