

Publinx Heads Into 2nd Round

Oldsters Dominate In 110 Degrees

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Despite torrid 110-degree weather, youth didn't necessarily dominate Tuesday as the 29th annual National Publinx Golf Tournament headed into its second round.

The oldsters managed more than to hold their own against the young upstarts Monday as match play started whittling the 200-player public links championship field down to size.

As a result, there were only an even dozen 'teen-agers among the 128 survivors who teed off Tuesday on the second lap of the week-long tournament.

Heading the list was 19-year-old Hal McCommas, a Southern Methodist University sophomore who startled the Publinx field a year ago by surging into the quarter-finals.

McCommas was three-under-par in winning his opening match Monday, 5 and 3, from F. M. Wiggins, a 43-year-old Louisville, Ky., executive.

But right alongside him were a couple of plus-40 former champs in Andy Szwedko of Pittsburgh and Stan Biel of Yonkers, N. Y.

Average age of the survivors ran around the 35-year mark and ranged from 14-year-old Robbie Webb of Gulfport, Miss., to 53-year-old W. D. McEwen of Charleston, S. C. McEwen was one of the 56 players who drew opening round byes, but Webb whipped Rudolph Ryshel, Jr., of Niagara Falls, 5 and 3.

Tuesday, McCommas tried his luck against Sherman A. Conrad, a 36-year-old Memphis, Tenn., gas station operator. Szwedko teed off against T. Moultrie McKeel of Charleston, S. C.; Biel met Louis Burton, a 37-year-old Oklahoma City salesman who breezed by Al Neverskas of Cattle Shannon, Pa., 6 and 5; while Webb met Hung Soo Ahn, one of the two surviving Hawaiian contenders.

JCC Golfers Led by Hval

COOS BAY (AP)—Portland's Gary Hval fired a 69 Monday to grab the lead after the first 18 holes of the state Junior Chamber of Commerce golf tournament.

Jerry Hall of Ontario and Rog Selikey of Portland shot 70's for second place. Leighton Tuttle of Eugene and Pendleton's Don Sievers were three strokes back at 73.

The tournament ends with another 18 holes Tuesday. The top four players get the right to play in the national JCC tournament August 14-15 at Albuquerque, N. M.

J. J. Hagan, Portland, won the driving contest Monday afternoon with a 283 1/2-yarder, while Tuttle was second at 276 yards, 2 feet.

Other Eugene golfer scores for first 18 holes include: Gary Geertsen, 77; Jon Masterson, 80; Gordon Marlatt, 82; and Wally Schulz, 83.

Oregon's top semi-pro baseball team, Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks, make their only local appearance of the season Wednesday night at Bethel Park when they face the Eugene Caseys at 8:15 p.m.

The game was originally scheduled for last Wednesday but bowed to rain and in the interim the Lumberjacks have added enough additional wins to run their victory string to 17 straight. Latest victims were the Salem Senators of the Western International League, who were embarrassed by a 13-3 drubbing from the bats of the Lumberjacks at North Bend Monday night.

Cal McIrvin, one-time Coast Leaguer, was never in trouble as he chopped Salem off with six hits and enjoyed the backing of four hits in five tries by Jack Dunn, a homer and two other safeties from Johnny Kovenz and three hits by Roy Nicely, another ex-PCL regular.

The Caseys have a record of 10 wins in 14 starts this season and go into this game with a double win over Medford last weekend under their belts. Manager Charlie DeAutremont will call on either Dick Weaver or Jack Henkel of Eugene high or slow-balling Gene Lewis of Oregon to still the powerful Lumberjack attack.

The locals will be without Ray Stratton, who divides his activity between the two teams and will be with CB-NB Wednesday. Elmer Dan Poling of Albany or DeAutremont will take over in his place.

The remainder of the lineup will include Chris Christian, the ex-Oregon State fancy-dan or Art Wright at first, Jack Fassett at second, Hank Hudspeeth at third and an outfield of Bernie Averill, Gene Stott, Bob Krasneski or Dick Nix.

One of a pair of Inland Empire chukkers, Ward Rocky of Washington State and Spokane or Dick Bishop of the now defunct Indians of the WIL, will get the pitching assignment for the unbeaten visitors.

The balance of the CB-NB batting order will feature some high powered talent Bill Burgher, one time PCL and Texas League catcher from Oregon, will be behind the plate, Jay Ragni of Oakland will be at first, Ken Jensen at second, Nicely at short, Stratton

Players Want Improvements

Salary Approved For Attorney

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP)—Major league player representatives approved a salary of between \$30,000 and \$35,000 a year for their attorney J. Norman Lewis Tuesday while setting forth six more improvements they will ask from club owners at a meeting in New York, July 28.

The player representatives from all 16 clubs held their second meeting with Lewis Monday. "There were no grievances," said Lewis. "It was a very pleasant meeting."

IMPROVEMENTS ASKED
But the players did list six improvements which will be presented to the owners.

• No restrictions on participation in winter league baseball. Only three players from each club may play winter ball at present.

• Personal negotiation for winter baseball contracts instead of through club officials, as at present.

• No spring training until March 1.

• No exhibition games before March 10.

• One day a week during spring exhibition tours with no game to be played, but merely training.

• Better set-up on "getaway dates" during the regular season. Teams occasionally play a night game followed by a day game, but Lewis pointed out that the owners were "cooperating as much as possible" to remedy the situation.

FOUR MEETINGS

The representatives decided to hold four meetings a year. One will be held the second week in April, another at the All-Star game, one during the World Series and a fourth one during the first week in December.

The players listed their principal sources of player pension fund income as follows, effective after 1956:

• 60 per cent of gross receipts from gate, radio and television at the All-Star game.

• 60 per cent of the radio and television receipts at the World Series.

• Player contributions that now average about \$100,000 a year.

Americans Tip NL 11-9

CLEVELAND (AP)—The American Leaguers outslugged the Nationals to win the 21st All-Star Game Tuesday, 11-9, in the greatest barrage of runs and hits in the history of the classic that began in 1933. There were six home runs with Cleveland's Al Rosen hitting two, driving in five of the American tallies.

In spite of all the homers, it was a blooper hit over second in the last of the eighth inning by little Nellie Fox of the Chicago White Sox that broke up the slugfest that required three hours and 10 minutes.

Larry Doby of Cleveland came in to tie the score at 9-9 with a pinch homer, when Fox dropped his Texas Leaguer over second, just out of the reach of Alvin Dark of the New York Giants. Two New York Yankee stars, Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra, who had singled, romped home with the deciding runs.

The crowd of 68,751, second largest in All-Star history, watched the big slugfests of both leagues tee off on the star hurlers of both circuits but the Americans had the most dynamite this time and won their first star contest in five years.

It was a pretty tame affair in the early innings, but from the last half of the third on when the Americans broke the ice with four runs adding machines were an absolute necessity.

The Americans pounded out 17 hits and the Nationals 14, and the total output of 31 cracked the old record of 26 when the Americans won the fifth game at Washington in 1937, 8-3. The run total of 20 smashed the record of 18 tallies in the 1940 game at Brooklyn, when the Americans won 11-7. That was the last American triumph until this warm afternoon.

In addition to Rosen and Doby, American home runs were clouted by Detroit's Ray Boone, Ted Kluszewski and Gus Bell, both of Cincinnati, homered for the Nationals.

Bell's homerun over the right-centerfield fence next to the 380-foot marker, scoring Willie Mays ahead of him, had put the National League ahead, 9-8, in the top of the eighth.

The Sacramento Solons have made a winning start under their new manager, Tony Freitas, who was elevated from his job as a coach when Gene Desautels resigned Monday.

The Sacs whipped San Francisco Monday night, 1-0. The game went 10 innings and the big blow was a home run by Len Attyd. It was his first four-baser of the season and got Freitas, one of the best southpaws the Pacific Coast League ever had, off to a flying start. After a fine first half showing, Sacramento has been slumping of late and is now 17 games behind pace-setting Hollywood.

Hollywood whipped Portland, 9-2, pounding three pitchers for 11 hits in the first of a five-game series. Rog Bowman, Hollywood lefty, scored his 13th win, and it was the seventh win in the last nine starts for the league leaders.

Bowman wasn't around to receive credit for his victory, for Manager Bobby Bragan yanked him in the eighth when he suddenly lost control although he had limited the Ports to four hits in eight innings. Forrest Main quieted the Portland bats at once.

Hollywood had a five-run fourth inning, highlighted by doubles by Dick Smith and Jack Phillips. Portland's Fletcher Robbe socked his 13th homer in the sixth inning. The other Portland run came in the eighth as Bowman loaded the bases on two walks and an error. Rocco Krsnich bounced into a double play off Main, and one run scored.

San Diego kept pace, 2 1/2 games behind Hollywood, by downing Los Angeles, 6-2. The Padres called upon newly acquired Al Lyons as a ninth-inning relief pitcher. Picked up as a San Francisco castoff last week, Lyons switched from his role of outfielder and came on the hill to strike out Los Angeles Flyhawk Bob Usher and force the next batter to fly out and end the game with two men on base.
