

Army Still Seeking McCarthy Informer

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens said Monday that the Army will "never give up" its search for the officer who allegedly provided Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) a summary of a classified FBI document.

McCarthy produced the 2 1/2 page document at the McCarthy-Army hearings, and said it had been given to him by a young Army Intelligence officer whom he declined to name. It dealt with the possibility of espionage at Ft. Monmouth, N. J.

Stevens, returning from a two-week tour of Army units in Europe, was questioned about comments made Sunday by Atty. Gen. Brownell in a television appearance.

Brownell said that whoever gave McCarthy the document violated the law but the officer has not yet been identified. He said the search was continuing.

Met by newsmen at Washington National Airport, Stevens said he expects to remain Secretary of the Army "so long as the President wants me." He said also that "as far as I know," John G. Adams will remain as Army counsel.

Both Stevens and Adams were key figures in the dispute with McCarthy and members of his Senate investigations subcommittee staff. The possibility that one or both would leave their posts had been mentioned during the hearings.

Pen Inmates To Feast On Elk Steaks

The men at the Oregon State Pen, whether they know it or not, are in for a fine steak feed this week just because a strange bull got in the pasture with one of Farmer W. E. Caldwell's cows. The bull is a four-point bull elk, and, as many Oregon farmers know, elk don't cotton up to cows of the bovine sort.

It happened Sunday noon. Caldwell, who lives near Meadowview, south of Junction City, called state police to say that the elk was in the process of killing his cow. Could he shoot it?

Permission was given and the job was done.

State police found that the elk weighed about 800 pounds. Dressed out it came to half that. They put the meat in a locker to await transportation to the prison—where much of the out-of-season game goes.

Officers said elks are traditional enemies of cattle, but that fortunately they rarely venture down into the valley. The last instance was more than a year ago when one traipsed into the Albany area to feud with cattle, and also ended up as steak.

The State Game Commission says a herd of more than 30 elk live in the hills between the Siuslaw and the Alsea.

Cyclists Injured

Two motorcyclists—Reeves J. Holbrook and Laverne Olen Nelson, both of Rt. 2, Creswell—received minor injuries at 7:20 p.m. Sunday when the cycle both were riding skidded half a mile north of Jasper. Both were knocked unconscious but had recovered by the time an ambulance arrived, state police said. They were not hospitalized.

Fire Destroys Ashland Mill

An estimated \$175,000 damage was caused over the weekend by two fires in widely separated areas of Oregon.

Saturday night, the Lithia Lumber Co. sawmill at Ashland was destroyed in a fire that raged for more than two hours and caused about \$100,000 loss to the firm.

PLAQUE UNVEILED

DARTMOUTH, England (AP)—The Duke of Edinburgh unveiled a plaque Monday commemorating the departure of American amphibious forces from this port 10 years ago for the Normandy invasion.

A witness, who was driving toward town when the fire started, said the mill "blossomed up all at once." Firemen said it may have been caused by a boiler explosion.

The mill is owned by a corporation of its more than 100 employees and had not been shut down during the current lumber strike. There were no casualties.

PORTLAND BLAZE

Nendel's Chicken Inn on Southwest Canyon Road near Portland was swept by fire early Sunday afternoon. Damage was estimated at \$75,000.

The flames spread from the inn's kitchen to the roof and rear of the building but were checked before they reached the main dining room. Three pieces of equipment and 18 volunteer firemen from Beaverton fought the blaze.

Owner Robert Harrington predicted the inn would open again for business within three weeks.

SILVERTON (AP)—Walter Coleman, 17, Portland, survived a 150-foot fall to the foot of the lower South Silver Creek Falls near here Sunday.

All a New Yorker Needs Is \$2,254.09
