

Workers in Suit
Throws Out
Blacklist Case
 ANGELES (AP)—Twenty film actors and writers filed their \$51,750,000 damages suit against major studios Monday, claiming they were denied employment because of their Communist affiliations.
 Judge Ellsworth Mason threw out the suit of court and ordered judgement against the studios and other members of the committee on Un-American Activities.
 The judge held that the studios did not state sufficient facts to constitute a cause of action. And he added that the studios' prosecution or intention to draw unfavorable inferences from refusal of witnesses to testify.
 The studios and film executives, defendants included Donald L. Jack (Call), and Clyde Doyle (Call) of the House committee investigator.
 The suit was filed by Michael Gale Sondergaard, Howard Silva, John Howland, Fred Graf, Alvin Karpis, Donald A. Gordon, Robert L. Richards, Philip Stevenson, Alfred Lewis, Paul Jarrico, Abraham Polonsky, Wilma Shore, Edward F. Huebsch, L. Rinaldo, Louis Solo and Anne Revere.

'Round the State

Unander Seeks to Prevent Cutting of Overload Fines

SALEM (AP)—A state official proposed Monday to stop justices of the peace from reducing fines against log truck operators who overload their trucks.
 State Treasurer Sig Unander estimated the state had lost several hundred thousand dollars since Jan. 1 because the justices of the peace were remitting portions of the fines.
 Unander asked Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton in a letter to take legal action to stop this practice.
 The request followed an opinion by the attorney general last month stating that the practice was illegal.
 Unander suggested a mandamus proceeding be instituted to compel the courts to impose and collect penalties upon conviction and prevent the justices of peace from improper reduction of fines in the future.

Jap 'Godivas' Reverse Roles

TOKYO (AP)—Tax coffers were as dry as the roads were wet. So women of Okachi Island near Sasebo decided to do something for their children who waded through mud to school during the prolonged rainy season.
 They planned a sumo tournament to start a fund for a two-lane paved road. Husbands watched aghast as their wives—clad in the traditional sumo costume of scant breech cloth, rope and up-swept hairdo—contorted through the grotesque leg-swinging, muscle-flexing warmup routines in preparation for the wrestling matches.

The men hastily subscribed the money and built the road, paved with a hard promise that the women stay out of the sumo ring.

Loggers Find Flyer's Body

TOLEDO, Ore. (AP)—The body of R. W. Hall of Bakersfield, who disappeared while on a flight from The Dalles to Newport, Ore., last April, was found near here Monday in the wreckage of his light plane.
 The plane, an Ercope, was identified by numbers on its wings. State police removed Hall's body from the heavily wooded area.
 Two Toledo loggers who were working in the vicinity spotted the wreckage. The plane had struck a tall tree on the side of a ridge about seven miles from Toledo. Thick branches hid it from view.
 An extensive air and ground search was conducted for several weeks after Hall's disappearance.

Asia, Power Adlai Themes

Democrat Victory Predicted for Fall

SEATTLE (AP)—Adlai Stevenson, confident of a Democratic victory at the polls in November and highly critical of the Eisenhower administration, was to conclude a dashing tour of the Pacific Northwest Tuesday.
 Stevenson, the unsuccessful Democratic presidential candidate in 1952, arrived here late Monday night after a trip from Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, via Spokane and Grand Coulee Dam.
 Tuesday evening Stevenson was scheduled to leave Bremerton on a private cruise of the San Juan Islands, arriving at Bellingham Wednesday noon for a car trip to Vancouver, B. C.

'PERIL' IN ASIA

He will leave the Canadian city Wednesday night for Alaska. Stevenson's schedule Monday included a breakfast speech at Coeur d'Alene in which he ripped into the administration's power policy and a talk before the state AFL Federation of Labor convention at Spokane.
 At Spokane, Stevenson turned his attention to what he termed a "peril" in Southeast Asia.
 The peril, Stevenson told the delegates, was a delusion on the part of millions of Southeast Asians that the United States, Britain and France represent the "symbols of a dying order."
 "It's a sad fact," Stevenson said, "that countless millions don't look on communism as we do. They see it as the lesser of two evils."

OPTIMISTIC

Stevenson became even more enthusiastic when discussing with newsmen the prospects for a Democratic victory in Oregon, long a GOP stronghold. He said Richard L. Neuberger, Portland Democrat, has a fair chance of unseating veteran Sen. Guy Cordon. The Beaver State hasn't sent a Democrat to the Senate in 40 years.
 As for the nation as a whole, Stevenson said the Democrats are almost certain to gain control of both the Senate and the House come November, but he conceded it would be "close" in the Senate.

Postoffice Opens

PORTLAND (AP)—The new Portland regional postoffice, which will supervise all postal activities in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Alaska, opened for business at 9 a.m. Monday.
 Norman R. Abrams, assistant postmaster general who is visiting here for the event, said, "The regional offices we have already created are saving up to \$500,000 a year. There is no reason the Portland office will not do the same for American taxpayers."

Collie Pet Found

SALEM (AP)—After three years, 100 miles and a dog-gone lucky encounter, a Salem family had their collie pet home again here Monday.
 Mr. and Mrs. Lyle Gould of Salem said the dog disappeared from their Mill City home back in 1951. A few days ago they recognized Tippy bumping meals from a Depot Bay housewife.
 A scar from an eye injury of puppyhood days helped confirm the identity.
