'How Good and How Pleasant—'

(From The Christian Science Monitor)

"Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!" sang the psalmist. And two great Protestant churches, the Methodists and the Presbyterians, are tasting these joys long years after each had been split asunder in sorrow and in anger.

The Methodists divided first in 1830 over differences as to church government and the Methodist Protestant Church was formed. But the bitter split came in 1844 on the issue of slavery. Then the Methodist Episcopal Church divided into northern and southern camps, and the denomination remained thus triply sundered until May 11, 1939.

On that memorable date 8,000,000 Methodist members (involving, it was then said, 20,000,000 Americans, counting young people and non-member adults in the congregations) joyfully put behind them doctrinal and section differences and joined in the unity of a common faith.

When the South seceded, the southern Presbyterians seceded too, and in 1861 formed the Presbyterian Church in the Confederate States. After the War between

the States the southern church changed its name to the Presbyterian Church in the United States. But northern and southern churches remained apart. (The Presbyterians had their doctrinal splinterings also, into a third group, the United Presbyterians, in 1885).

Now, with ratification by its general assembly the Presbyterian Church in the United States (southern) joins with the larger Presbyterian Church in the United States of America (northern) and the smaller United Presbyterian Church in one Presbyterian Church of the United States.

Thus another 3,500,000 church members (and, applying the same proportions as to the Methodists, something over 8,000,000 Americans) are joyfully putting behind them doctrinal and sectional differences and joining hands and hearts.

When unity among Americans is being tried sorely by the international threat of communism, and by the demagoguery which seeks to exploit it, and now by the largely sectional issue of segregation, it is significant indeed that two of the four largest Protestant denominations have found new solidarity within.

A worship service marking the formal beginning of united effort among many Protestant churches in the Central Lane area will be held at the First Christian Church, Sunday, July 18, at 8 p. m., signaling the inauguration of the Central Lane Council of Churches.

State Senator Philip Hitchcock, president of the Oregon Council of Churches, will deliver the sermon.

The constitution of the Central Lane Council of Churches will be signed and Dr. Mark Talney, executive secretary of the Oregon Council of Churches, will install the new officers.

A short meeting for business and election of all of the delegates from member churches will be held at 7 p. m. at the Christian Church, according to Robert Burtnor, temporary chairman.

The purpose of the Central Lane Council of Churches, which is made up of both ministerial and lay delegates from member churches, is to furnish opportunities to congregations in Central Lane County for working together in Christian service.

Paris Recreates Ancient Era This Summer

PARIS—Medieval Paris, in all the splendor of centuries-old street parades and spectacular Passion plays, will be recreated here this summer.

Under the brooding grey stone towers of old Notre Dame, near winding alleys where Francois Villon wrote and rowdied, the middle-age spectacle, "Le Vray Mystere de la Passion" (The True Mystery of the Passion) will be presented from June 26 to July 11.

It will be the climax of three highlights of the Paris spring-summer season.

Presented three before World War II and again in 1951, the play is a spectacle with a cast of 1,500 actors combining medieval pageantry with the latest technical effects, including recordings of the bells of Notre Dame and Rouen's new 50-bell carillon. Seating arrangements will accommodate 10,000 persons at each of the 13 scheduled performances.
