

World Council of Churches Preparing for 'Evanston'

The Second Assembly of the World Council of Churches, which will convene on the campus of Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois, August 15-31 of this year, is being hailed as the most significant religious event in the world since the Second Vatican Council. It is the first time in the history of the world that a great ecumenical meeting has taken place in this country, and because such assemblies occur only every five or ten years, churches and church members are likely to experience a "turn" in the lifetime of those who attend.

SDA Speeds Efforts For Missionaries

To advance a mission program that already stretches into 197 of the 230 countries of the world, members of the Eugene Seventh-day Adventist Church set aside Saturday, July 10 for a special "Midsummer Offering."

Walter Gundrum, one of the local elders, in announcing the offering, pointed out that at the worldwide general conference session held last month in San Francisco, the whole mission program of the church had received study.

In the light of prevailing conditions, the elder said, there can be "no slowing down of mission work. On the contrary, the brevity of time demands a quickening pace."

Last year Seventh-day Adventists invested \$11,947,578 in foreign missions. This amount supported an overseas mission, Gundrum said, which, according to a recent report issued by the American Bible Society, extends into more countries than any other Protestant denomination.

Very Reverend Edmund J. Murnane, Pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church, Eugene, Oregon, has been appointed State Chaplain.

Hine, as one of the first acts in his administration, has appointed a committee to follow out the resolution adopted at the State Convention of a program to support St. Mary's home for boys at Beaverton, Oregon, and to attain this end, Knights of Columbus statewide will be asked to help start a dairy herd and an "incentive fund" so older boys in the school and boys of high school age who work on the farm during the summer months could be paid some compensation for their efforts in developing a dairy farm.

Hine will head the Oregon delegation to attend the Supreme Convention at Louisville, Kentucky, Aug. 15 through 18.
