

ate Henderson McClung Active in Church and Clubs

Henderson McClung, one of this company followed closely the pattern of the crossings of other trains that year but they arrived at The Dalles in late September without serious mishap. A short time later they passed through Portland, going on to locate a claim in Yamhill County in late October. Four years later, they moved to Eugene.

"The Rev. Henderson was a capable man, was elected Lane County School Superintendent in 1858 and in 1865 was sent to Congress as a representative.

"The Rev. Henderson's brother was also an educator. He founded Columbia College on what was later known as College Hill," Mrs. Norton continued, "but after three years of struggle the institution was closed. Professor Henderson was undaunted, however, and started a private school in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church which his niece, Kate, attended for two years, walking back and forth each day from Springfield."

From a letter written by Mrs. McClung in later years, Mrs. Norton quoted the following: "My uncle bought what was known in those days as the Old Red-topped Hotel which stood on the site of the present Osburn Hotel. He turned the building into a school and ran it for some time. When I was 15 I started teaching school and was paid \$25 per month. Oct. 9, 1863, I was married to John Henry McClung.

"The McClung family had chosen a different route to Oregon," Mrs. Norton related, "coming from Ohio by the water route and by way of the Isthmus of Panama. Crossing the isthmus by railroad, they were involved in a railroad accident in which 60 persons were killed but the McClung family escaped unhurt." The family arrived in Eugene in June, 1856. John, being then aged 19, bought a farm six miles west of town.

"Some years later, Mr. McClung engaged in the drug business in Eugene and in 1886 he and A. J. Johnson purchased a general merchandise store. In 1902 Mr. McClung built a brick building on the site of the present Tiffany-Davis building.

"The McClung home was built at the corner of 10th and High in 1852, a large house with ample grounds on which were planted almost every tree and shrub indigenous to Oregon. In after years the home was occupied by Mrs. Louis Bean, a niece of Mrs. McClung. Mrs. Bean was very generous with the shrubs and plants and encouraged her friends to take cuttings for their own gardens.

"The McClungs had three daughters, Jessie, who married Prof. Charles Friedel; Margaret, who married Dr. Weatherbeen, and Ina. All were graduates of the University of Oregon. Mrs. Friedel still is living.

"Mrs. McClung was active in First Methodist Church, was interested in the work of various clubs as well as Fortnightly. She made a gift to the University of Oregon in memory of their daughter, Ina, a scholarship in the school of architecture and allied arts."

In conclusion, Mrs. Norton quoted from a friend: "She had a brilliant mind and always kept abreast of the times, a woman of real culture, and a gracious companion and kindly neighbor."

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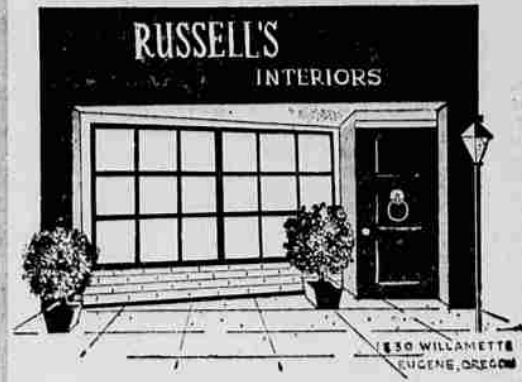
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
