

WHS Draws High Praise
Outstanding, Says Evaluation Report
Bethel High School in Bethel, Alaska, has been rated "an outstanding high school" by the Oregon state department of education.
The evaluation is part of a re-evaluation project to show the strengths and weaknesses of the school system, and to provide a basis for improvement.
The report was prepared by the state department of education, and was submitted to the Bethel School Board by Cliff Robinson, director of secondary education.
The report praised the school for its high standards of achievement, its excellent faculty, and its excellent facilities.
The report also pointed out some areas for improvement, such as the need for more extracurricular activities and the need for more student government.
The school board is expected to act on the report soon.

School Leader Voices Policy On Annexation

The chairman of Eugene's school board Monday answered one of the arguments of Bethel residents who oppose annexation to Eugene.
Virgil M. Cameron, long time member of the District 4 board who now heads it, said that "as a matter of policy and practice the board has never solicited consolidation with other districts."
He said he knows of nothing to change the policy.
His statements were in answer to the question: would the Eugene district attempt to merge with the Bethel School district should Bethel become a part of the City of Eugene?
Cameron said however, that the board has not gone on record in this specific issue. "In fact," he said, "we haven't talked about it at a meeting, and very little outside."

Those who favor incorporation rather than annexation for Bethel have voiced the fear that Bethel's schools would be forced, by law or position, to join the Eugene system.
Cameron said that the old law requiring consolidation of districts within a city was repealed in 1951.

McKay Gives Alaskan Talk

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—The federal government should be asked to make power surveys "only as a last resort," says Secretary of the Interior McKay.
McKay told the Chamber of Commerce Monday that unless local interests work on the problem "you will always have power shortages."
"It is up to you to interest private firms and other private agencies to start these surveys," he said.
The secretary promised government help but said his department believes that "you, locally, should develop power," calling on the government "only as a last resort."
McKay, who is making his first official inspection of Alaska, flew to Valdez and Cordova Monday night. He was due back here Tuesday.

'Police Inspector' Takes Care of Funds

BOSTON (AP)—A man who said he was a police inspector appeared at Purcell's Restaurant Monday and said he had been assigned to take care of the cafe's receipts because of a \$1,372 hold-up there one month before.
The man was given the receipts—totaling \$1,429—to take to the bank. But he never made the deposit.

Auto Strike Idles 20,000

DETROIT (AP)—The number of Chrysler workers idled by a walk-out at the Dodge plant jumped to 22,000 Tuesday and it was feared still more workers would have to be sent home.
The 10,000 members of Dodge Local No. 3 of the CIO United Auto Workers went on strike Monday. Since drivers of inter-plant trucks which haul materials to other Chrysler plants in the Detroit area belong to the local, other plants were quickly affected.
The union charged a speed-up led to the walkout.

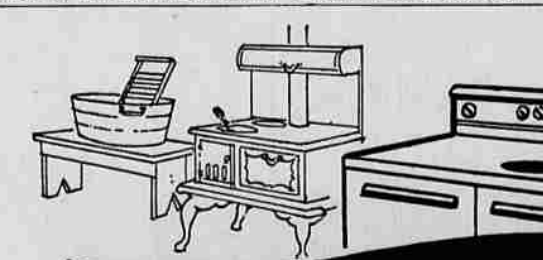
Kiwanians Organize Second Club Here With 40 Members

part of the city. Buford said he knew that was what the law said but commented that he doubted whether it would stand a test and that the area probably would remain an island.
A man asked about representation on the council, and Councilman Calvin Crumbaker said that depending upon how the wards were redivided, it might be possible for the Bethel annex to "dominate Ward 3 and elect both councilmen."
Officials bogged down on the answer to the question: "Will there be a double tax on the water district?"
WATER DISTRICT STATUS
Should the area be annexed, a part of the Bethel Water District would be in the city and Eugene would be faced with having to assume the district's bonded indebtedness, or let the district continue to serve that corner of the city.
There was argument as to whether the bonds could be bought, whether there actually was a water tax, and how far the city could commit itself at this time.
There was a question on whether property would be reassessed, thereby increasing taxes.
After city officials said the city had nothing to do with tax valuations, County Commissioner Kenneth Nielsen answered that assessments are based on current market value now and that they increase when an improvement increases the property.
ASSESSMENT STATUS
He said city property recently was increased to conform to the new assessment basis of 25 percent of current market value value worked out between the county and the State Tax Commission. Nielsen said all land in the county, however, will be adjusted soon also.
Bethel School Superintendent Tom Powers said petitioners for annexation included many farm areas in their boundaries, contrary to their claims. He also said that present plans for arterial roads in the area could be upset later by the city because "I recall many times when the planning commission has been overruled."
There was considerable discussion of why the county commissioner delayed the vote on incorporation, and Commissioner Robert Maclay answered that "We didn't know too much about the situation; we knew only enough to know that it was so important it required study; that's why we've delayed it."
All told, there were about 20 questions, many of them covering the same ground.
