

McKay to Ask for Road Funds

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay has asked Congress for \$3,000,000 to round off the million dollar road program for Indian reservations in the West.

McKay said a major objective of the new program is to bring reservation roads up to acceptable standards so that they can be turned over to counties for maintenance.

The Phoenix area, covering reservations, not including Navajo, in Arizona, Nevada, and Utah, will get \$999,396. Projects include valley farm roads, Colorado River Reservation, \$190,000; Supai Canyon road, Hualapai Reservation, \$35,000; Cibola White road, Fort Apache Reservation, \$60,000; Wadsworth Nixon road, Pyramid Lake Reservation, Nevada, \$97,500; Covered Wells Chuichu road, Papago Reservation, Arizona, \$206,700; Maricopa Colony and Post roads, Gila River Reservation, Arizona, \$90,700; San Carlos-Peridot road, San Carlos Reservation, Arizona, \$40,000; White Rocks road, Utah and Ouray Reservation, Utah, \$83,000.

Portland area, covering reservations in Washington, Oregon, and Idaho, will get \$85,000. Projects included are Joe Moses Creek, Park City, and Silver Creek roads, Colville Reservation, Washington, \$118,215; Ford Willpinit road, Spokane Reservation, Washington, \$100,000; Shoe-ship Curl Kanine roads on Umatilla Reservation, Oregon, \$40,000; Worley State Line road, Coeur d'Alene Reservation, Idaho, \$50,000.

President May Attend Dam Dedication

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower got an invitation Monday to attend the dedication of McNary Dam this summer, and was reported hopeful of being able to make it.

The invitation was presented by a Washington and Oregon congressional delegation which talked with the President personally. The group even offered to fix the dedication dates to suit Eisenhower's convenience.

Afterward, Sen. Cordon (R-Ore) said the President showed interest and hoped to be present at the dedication of the giant dam on the Columbia River near Umatilla, Ore. Cordon said Eisenhower thought arrangements possibly could be made while he is on summer vacation in Denver.

Earlier Bertha S. Adkins, assistant to the chairman of the Republican National Committee, reported to the President on her recent seven-week tour of Western states.

She told newsmen she was "very much encouraged" about GOP prospects in the November election. She said she believes the Republicans have an excellent chance of gaining a Senate seat in Wyoming and of picking up a House seat in Colorado.

Except for "some big wheat growers in Montana and Washington," Miss Adkins said she found farmers generally willing to give a try, at least, to the administration's flexible farm price support proposals.

Willamalane Sets Week for Bunyan

HOPEWELL JUNCTION, N. Y. — More than 100 volunteer firemen worked against time Tuesday to rescue a 13-year-old boy trapped 20 feet down in a water well on a farm near here.

An ambulance and physician stood by while the rescuers shored up sides of the well to prevent a cave-in that would bury David Ronk, a welfare child case being cared for by Thomas Knapp, a farmer.

Police and firemen said Ronk was above water and "apparently in good condition so far." Sheriff C. Fred Close said the boy was "in no immediate danger" unless sides of the well caved in.

Ambulances and volunteers arrived quickly when Knapp discovered the boy in the well. A respirator and other rescue apparatus was aboard the ambulance.

Officials said the well was "under construction" and the boy toppled in when loose dirt around it gave way.

David was up to his waist in mud and silt.

Drunkenness Fines Levied on Two Men

Lavern C. Armitage, 40, Lorane, was fined \$195 and \$5 costs in district court Monday after pleading guilty to driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor. The arrest was made by Oregon state police.

House Topples Housing Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Tuesday defeated a last-ditch drive, led by Democrats, to enact President Eisenhower's proposal for 140,000 government-built, low-rent public housing units over the next four years.

The roll call vote was 234-156. Then on another roll call, the House passed the compromise bill by a 358-30 vote and sent it to the Senate.

The showdown came on a motion by Rep. Spence (D-Ky) to restore the Eisenhower program of 35,000 public housing units a year to a compromise bill carrying out many of the President's other housing recommendations.

The catch-all bill, lowering required down payment on FHA loans, is a compromise between separate versions passed earlier by the House and Senate.

Democrats denounced it as a "death blow" to public housing which actually would do nothing to relieve misery in slums. Spence predicted if Republicans defeated his motion, Democrats would be back in power in Congress for the next 20 years.

The compromise would permit construction of 33,000 government-built low-rent public housing units this year, on which commitments already have been made. And it would authorize 35,000 new units next year—but only for persons displaced by slum clearance projects or other government action.

Eisenhower originally asked for authority to build 35,000 new units in each of the next four years with no such strings attached.

Food Sought For Strikers

The current lumber strike means many things to many people but it means one thing to Mary Zunko—hungry children.

Mrs. Zunko, 477 E. 3rd Ave., for many years has been an amateur welfare agency for hundreds of Eugene and Springfield families.

Many long, cold winters have meant long hours of work for Mrs. Zunko, but the present strike has been the toughest period yet.

"Please ask the public for food—groceries, garden produce, etc.—anything to eat," she pleaded Tuesday. "This time, I don't need clothes, just food for those poor kiddies."

Mrs. Zunko has a dozen or so loggers' families on the list. "Remember," she said, "these mothers and kids aren't on strike. They're hungry."

Mrs. Zunko asks that food contributions be brought to her place near the Ferry St. Bridge. She will distribute.
