

Giants Gain on Dodgers

Cleveland Ties; Yanks Victors

What does a feller have to do to get into first place in this league?

Casey Stengel of the New York Yankees is running the hottest ball club in the American League. Only 3 1/2 games off the pace on July 1, the Yankees have won 17 out of 19 games since then.

And they still aren't up on top. Tuesday night they came within one putout of reaching their objective. They fought off third-place Chicago handily, winning 4-1.

The huge scoreboard in Yankee Stadium showed Boston leading Cleveland 5-3 after eight innings.

But in the ninth at Boston Al Smith coaxed Willard Nixon for a walk with two out and Bobby Avila drilled his second home run of the contest to tie the score.

That's the way it stayed through seven more innings. It wound up a 5-5 tie after 16 innings with the league curfew calling a halt.

You can't start an inning after 12:50 a.m., local time, and it was 12:57 a.m. by the time the last out was made in the 16th. It will have to be replayed from the start sometime later.

So, by four percentage points, the Indians stayed in first place.

Other results in the American League included a 9-1 triumph by Washington over Baltimore and two more losses by the Philadelphia Athletics, their 9th and 10th in a row, this time to Detroit 12-0 and 4-3.

The Giants and Dodgers' games both were decided on errors. In Cincinnati, the New Yorkers pushed across the winning run in the 13th on a single by Bobby Hofman followed by two misplays and a sacrifice fly by Whitey Lockman.

Gene Baker scored the winning run for Chicago against Brooklyn by scampering home from second base when pitcher Jim Hughes dropped an easy toss at first base that should have been the third out.

Johnny Antonelli stayed all the way for the Giants in winning his 14th game against two losses. The only run against him was a homer by Ted Kluszewski.

Harvey Haddix of the Cards joined him as a 14-game winner after beating the Phils but Haddix needed ninth-inning help from Gerry Staley. Four hits climaxed by a triple by Ray Jablonski produced all of the St. Louis runs in the first inning.

The Yankees pinned the fifth loss on Bob Keegan although they were out 8-7. Fine fielding which included three double plays helped Whitey Ford to his ninth success.

Detroit scored nine runs in the first inning of the first game at Philadelphia in a spurge which included a double and a grand slam home run by Harvey Kuenn. In the nightcap the Tigers rallied for three runs in the eighth, two of them on a home run by Bill Tuttle.

Roy Sievers and Eddie Yost were the hitting standouts in Washington's triumph over Baltimore. Yost tripled with the bases loaded and Sievers hit his 15th home run.

CHICAGO (AP)—Yolande Pompee, beaten only once in 30 pro fights, makes his American debut Wednesday night, and the Trinidad scrapper figured his television brawl against Moses Ward would be the "most important one."

Pompee, 25, who beat heavy-weight Jimmy Slade in one battle and drew with him in another, was a 7-2 favorite for the battle. Still he rated Ward, a 22-year-old Detroit middleweight, as a strong challenger.

Pompee plans to weigh 165 for tonight's battle. Ward expects to weigh 161 to 162. Ward has won 18 of 25 pro scraps.

Turley Gives Fox Credit For Control

DETROIT (AP)—Bob Turley, the Baltimore Oriole pitcher who began the season with raves as the new American League strikeout king, reported Saturday he has found out what's wrong with his control, which lately has him walking twice as many as he's fanning.

The big 23-year-old right-hander credits Howie Fox, a fellow moundman who is from Thurston, Ore., with spotting his trouble.

"If you've noticed," said the speedballer, "most all of my wild pitches have been outside to a right hand batter, and sometimes high."

"Howie told me to try standing on the left side of the rubber instead of the right. I did, and darned if it didn't work. For some reason, I can get the ball inside better that way. Howie also corrected a little hitch in my stride."

"I think I'm gonna be okay now."

The Orioles sure hope so. They will find out Sunday when Turley tries out Fox's suggestions against Detroit.

Turley's wildness in his last seven games has resulted in 57 bases on balls, while he struck out 26. He now has fanned 103, but walked 100, to lead the league in both departments.

Russian Olympic Team Split Draws Fire

MOSCOW (AP)—Avery Brundage, chairman of the International Olympic Committee, said Wednesday that Russia would not be allowed to split her Olympic team into three contingents at the next Olympic Games.

A Swedish newspaper reported on Monday that the Soviet Union was planning to ask the IOC for permission to split its athletes into three teams representing the Ukraine, Byelo-Russia and the rest of the union, but Brundage said, "I haven't heard of such a report but I can say definitely that such a move is completely against the Olympic rules."

Wild Jokers Out for Cards

Stanky Suspended, Vows to Improve

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP)—A chastened Eddie Stanky accepted a five-day suspension Wednesday as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals with a promise to turn over a new leaf.

Stanky and his club lost on all fronts Tuesday when National League President Warren Giles disallowed their protest of Sunday's forfeited game with the Philadelphia Phillies.

Giles, who added a \$100 fine to Stanky's penalty for delaying the game, also suspended Cardinal Catcher Sal Yvars and Phillies Firstbaseman Earl Torgeson—Yvars for three days and Torgeson for two.

It was Yvars and Torgeson who touched off a free-for-all fight between the teams by squaring off at home plate. Police had to break up the fracas which followed.

Shortly thereafter, when Stanky went to the mound to relieve Pitcher Cot Deal, Plate Umpire Babe Pinelli awarded the game to the Phils because of Cardinal "stalling."

Stanky read a statement which amounted to a public

apology for his conduct on the field.

"I called this press conference," he said, "because of the impression I received Sunday when I heard the St. Louis people applaud Pinelli's decision to forfeit the game to the Phillies."

Stanky's voice was choked with emotion as he declared that he was "proud of my character off the field."

"I am aware of the boogie here in St. Louis," he said. "As a player, I was boogied quite frequently. I always took the attitude—the hell with it—and I am out here to win ball games. Since becoming a manager in 1952, my wife, Dickie, and very close friends have been trying to knock into my head that there is a difference."

"I know in my heart indirectly that I have embarrassed and hurt the St. Louis people, baseball nationally, my reputation as a baseball man of which I have been very proud and Gusie Busch and the Cardinals front office which has stayed with me under great pressure, of which I am aware."

Tennis Favorites Win
