Norblad Tells Of 'Atrocities'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Norblad, returning from Europe Tuesday, described the "brutalities and atrocities" of the Communists there as "unbelievable." Norblad was an acting member of the special House committee which investigated communism as an international conspiracy. The committee held most of its hearings at Munich, Germany, and witnesses included a number of former officials of governments now under Russian control. Refugees and Communist deserters also testified.

Norblad said there appeared "little chance of a general uprising by the people within these countries because of the secret police and brutality which has occurred," but testimony indicated general dissatisfaction with Russian domination.
