Klamath

State to Continue
Substitute Judges

GOV. Paul L. Taylor, Chief Justice Earl LaCourte and Atty. Gen. Y. Thornton decided they could do nothing to solve the dispute that has tied up circuit trials in Klamath County.

Three officials, meeting in Salem, Ore., today, decided to continue the use of substitute judges in Klamath County. The officials are Gov. Paul L. Taylor, Chief Justice Earl LaCourte and Atty. Gen. Y. Thornton. They decided they could do nothing to solve the dispute that has tied up circuit trials in Klamath County.

STATEMENT

The statement said: "After a thorough discussion of the subject, it was decided that there is no practical way available under the circumstances other than the one now being followed; that in all cases where a change of judge is requested, the chief justice will continue to assign outside judges to go to Klamath County to try these cases."

The chief justice will continue to assign judges to substitute those who are assigned to Klamath County.

The change in the procedures prescribed by law is a matter for the consideration of the legislature."

There had been speculation the governor might order a prosecutor into the county to temporarily from the state, but the statement rules this possibility.

DOES FILED
Justice LaCourte also has suggested that the next judge should make attorney when he file motions for judgment, show cause why it should be done.

Vandenberg criticized the action, accusing him of prejudging cases improperly. Community Offers
Help to Grace Lad

Remember Sam "Butch" Grace, the little boy this area gave the big Christmas to? Well, another community is turning its heart and pocketbook over to him now.

Butch came to Eugene last year for treatment of a nearly hopeless cancer condition. His parents are of very limited means and the hospital and medical bills quickly ate up the Grace treasury.

A landlady told the newspaper about Butch and a story told about the case. It was Christmas time. Soon the tiny apartment on E. 11th Ave. was crowded with a bright Christmas tree—loaded with gifts to make a sick boy feel good. The 9-year-old cancer patient had a wonderful Christmas.

Now Butch is back in the Graces' hometown, Glendale, a logging community in Southern Oregon. Butch is still very sick. A large bulge on his shoulder shows where cancer is eating at the body tissues.

Called hopelessly by the best of medical specialists, Butch's cancer is being slowed somewhat by x-ray treatments. An

operation was ruled out because its result would more than likely be fatal to the boy.

Now the folks down at Glendale are giving Butch his final chance. They're going to send him to a cancer clinic in Texas.

A benefit dance raised \$334; a drive among mill employees raised another \$300; other mills, clubs and citizens have contributed and promise more.

Butch's mother, Mrs. Sam Grace, has said that should Butch fail to respond to the Texas treatment, she will always have the satisfaction of knowing that friends tried to help. She remembers the Christmas in Eugene and now there's the Glendale story.

"Butch wants to live," she said recently. "I've never seen a child put up such a fight to live."

Burger Shop
Asks Review

The owners of Paul Bunyan Burger Shop in Eugene filed a circuit court suit Thursday asking the court to review a recent ruling of State Labor Examiner Fred G. Scherer.

Scherer last week dismissed charges by management that picketing by Culinary Alliance, local 643, AFL, was a violation of the 1953 state labor relations act.

The shop has been picketed since June 4, 1953. Picketing was started because the union claimed management refused to negotiate for an initial labor contract. Management has charged that the union has not been certified as the bargaining agent of the employees.

Owners of the eating establishment, Julius Gilbertson and Carmen A. Gilbertson, alleged in their complaint Thursday that Scherer was "in error" in his findings and conclusions in dismissing charges of unlawful picketing.

On Probation

Earl Lee Walton, 37, of 3465 N. Concord St. was placed on one year's probation Friday morning in district court as a result of carrying a concealed weapon Thursday night.

Oregon state police arrested him following complaints of citizens in the area of his residence during the night that he was causing a disturbance. Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Brockman of 3435 Concord St. told investigating officers that Walton had tried to shoot them with a .38 caliber gun.

Police said they found a bullet hole in the back porch of the Brockman residence which the Brockmans said was caused by the gun which Walton fired.

Walton married the Brockman's daughter, who left Walton last winter, Walton told the court Friday.

"I don't recall about the shooting. I had been drinking quite a lot," he told District Judge Chester N. Anderson.

State police found a .38 gun under a sack on the back seat of Walton's car, and arrested him.

New Radio Antenna
Increases Reception

A new 30-ft. radio antenna atop the Springfield City Hall has improved local and regional police call reception, Police Captain M. J. Redfearn reported Friday.

With the new antenna, the Springfield department can monitor state police calls from Salem headquarters, and calls from departments from most parts of the state. This is helpful in checking "wanted" and "clearance" reports, Redfearn said.
