

They're Out to Cut UNICEF

Why is it that every time the United Nations Children's Fund comes before Congress for an appropriation someone, generally anonymous, manages to slip into the bill some provision designed to deprive this humanitarian agency of part of the funds the American people think it is being given?

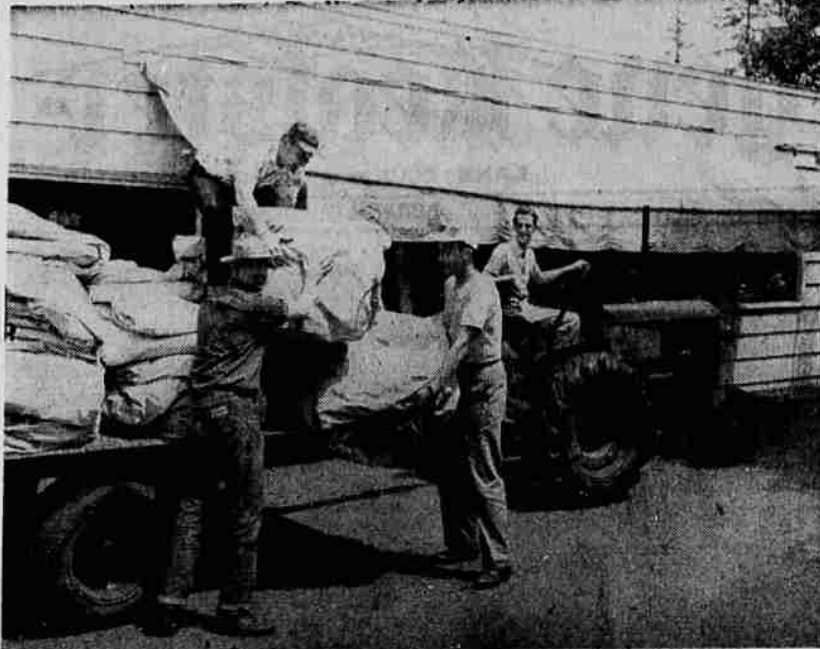
No one who knows world conditions ever speaks of the Children's Fund (UNICEF) save in terms of highest praise. The work it has done in saving the lives of millions of mothers and children, inoculating them against disease and clothing them, is universally acknowledged to be one of the genuinely bright spots in this dark and sinister time.

Moreover, UNICEF has required "matching funds" from the nations where its workers have gone which have transformed many of its projects from an international philanthropy into permanently self-supporting enterprises.

Nevertheless, somewhere along the line to each new appropriation of U. S. funds, somebody in Congress seems to look for disguised ways to cut the modest UNICEF askings. That has happened again this year.

To begin with, the economy-minded administration asked Congress for only \$13.5 million for the next 18 months of UNICEF operations. That in itself represented an 8 per cent cut—nearly a million dollars—from the American contribution last year.

UNICEF would have accepted that without protest, however, if it had not been for a "joker" inserted in the bill now before the House Foreign Affairs Committee. This would limit the U.S. contribution to not more than 60 per cent of what other governments give to UNICEF for international use. What's the matter with that? The matter is that so much contributed by other nations—which in the UNICEF total give \$7 for each \$3 given by this country—goes for work in those nations and so would not be credited in making up the American quota. The most conservative estimates state that this "joker" in the pending appropriations bill would withhold from UNICEF at least \$3 million of the 13.5 million Congress is ostensibly about to appropriate. If you do not favor such trickery at the expense of needy children, why not tell your congressman and senators?

Donald Ryder Gives Sermon At Presbyterian

The new Associate Minister of Central Presbyterian Church, Donald S. Ryder, will be installed by the Presbytery of Willamette in the sanctuary of Central Church at 8 p.m. Sunday, July 25. Also at this service he will be ordained to the gospel ministry. All members and friends of the congregation are invited.

The Rev. Robert D. Bulkley, D.D., will preside at the service as the Moderator of Willamette Presbytery. He is the pastor of the Federated Churches, Corvallis. The Rev. G. Henry Green, D.D., Executive of the Synod of Oregon, Portland, will preach the sermon. Other participants will be the Rev. Jack M. MacLeod, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Bend, and the Rev. Paul S. Mellich, pastor of Central Presbyterian Church. Following the service, a reception will be held in Fellowship Hall, honoring Mr. and Mrs. Ryder.

For the last few years Mr. Ryder has been attending the San Francisco Theological Seminary at San Anselmo, California. He received the degree of Bachelor of Divinity with honors from that institution in 1953. While at this Seminary, Mr. Ryder acted as pulpit supply for various churches in the San Francisco Bay area and for a time as Assistant Student Supply of the San Geronimo Valley Community Presbyterian Church. Prior to entering Seminary, he was in business in Southern California.

After graduating from the University of Southern California he was employed for 17 years by the accounting firm of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Co. in a supervisory capacity. During the war he became a special accountant for Clayton Manufacturing Company. At the time of his decision to enter the ministry, Mr. Ryder was Controller of this company.

Mr. Ryder's father was a Methodist minister who held pastorates in New England and in Long Beach, Parlier, and Delano, California. The family moved to California while Mr. Ryder was still a boy and he has lived in that state until moving to Eugene recently. His brother, Milton P. Ryder, of San Jose, California, and Mrs. Ryder's sister, Miss Frances R. Kohne, of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, will be in Eugene for the ordination and installation service. Mr. Ryder was educated at Pasadena High School and at the University of Southern California, where he received the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, and Master of Arts. He also holds a license as a Certified Public Accountant in the State of California.

Mr. and Mrs. Ryder moved to Eugene the latter part of June and are now living in their home at 2387 Willamette Street. Mr. Ryder lived in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania until a short time before her marriage in Long Beach, California. Mr. Ryder is an ordained elder of the Presbyterian Church and has served on the Session, as well as on the Board of Trustees and in other capacities as a layman. He started his work as Associate Minister of Central Presbyterian Church July 1, taking the place of the Rev. Byron D. Hughes who was called to organize a new church in Portland under the Church Extension Board of Portland Presbytery.

SDA Camp Meeting Off To Good Start

More than 15,000 Seventh-day Adventists from four states and Alaska were expected to pack Gladstone Park the opening week end (July 22-25) of the 77th annual camp meeting of the Oregon Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.

The hundreds attending heard the keynote speaker, Elder L. K. Dickson, world vice president of the church, Saturday morning. Dickson gave an overall picture of progress of the Seventh-day Adventist movement throughout the world, giving special attention to three particular phases of the church program — foreign missions, the world building program and evangelism.

Elder Dickson, who began his ministry in the Oregon Conference in Portland, is currently a world vice president of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.

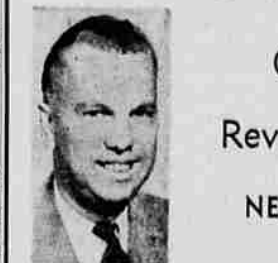
More than 1,400 tents and 350 cabins are being used. The 75-acre camp site has been spruced up and special wiring has been put in for the duration of the camp.

Churches Try To Open Area For Negroes

NEW YORK—Three Philadelphia churches have launched a campaign to welcome Negroes into one of the city's most fashionable residential sections, according to the July 25 issue of the Episcopal Churchnews magazine.

The three churches are the Episcopal Church of the Epiphany, the Germantown Unitarian Church and the Jewish Center. The area involved is German town, which has been one of Philadelphia's choicest all-white sections since colonial days.

The Rev. J. Wesley Twelves, who has been a conservative rector of the Germantown Episcopal parish since 1925, told the Episcopal Churchnews that "it is not yet a popular cause." He indicated that two other leading Protestant churches in German town are not participating in the drive. He observed that in these cases it was the congregations—and not the pastors—who were reluctant to take part.

The three religious groups have formed a "Church Community Relations Council." Its main purpose is to promote inter-race respect and understanding.

"We have met with some hostility," Mr. Twelves said. "But that is only natural since the whole situation arises from unreasoned and blind hostility." He added that the work has just started and that as the result of a few block meetings already held some residents who were prepared to move from the area have reconsidered.
