advises Ruth Sloan, who spent
seven years on the Dark Conti-
nent as a representative of the
State Department, visited 22
countries of Africa and now is
back home in Washington, D.C.

Slim, svelte, white-haired and
beautifully groomed, Mrs. Sloan
believes any girl with a spirit of
adventure and a knowledge of
business methods can carve out
a brilliant future in Africa, which
she believes may sway the bal-
ance of the world's politics and
economy. She says:

"Africa today stands in the
same world position as the Far
East of 10 years ago. It can go
either way—into the orbit of the
Communist satellite countries or
into a strong alliance with the
free world. It is the continent of
the future—and there's still time
to do something there."

Young men and women with
pioneer blood in their veins can
find one of the world's last fron-
tiers in Africa, says Mrs. Sloan.
They can find an endless variety
of opportunities, dramatic con-
trasts in terrain and customs, and
the thrill of carving out a future
in an almost virgin land. There's
adventure too, and the satisfac-
tion of helping to build a new
land.

If you're going to Africa and
want to make friends with the
native women, she advises, take
along a good supply of lipsticks
and American costume jewelry.
Even the kind found in our dime
stores will be highly prized in
Africa.

The greatest hope of Africa,
she says, is for young Americans
to visit the continent, perhaps
settle there, learn the problems
and the needs of the Africans
and in turn teach them the
friendly customs of America. She
says:

"In Africa they need trained
technicians, economists, secre-
taries, people with the know-how
of American business. It's one of
the world's last frontiers, rich
with opportunity for young peo-
ple with adventure in their
blood."

Mr. Rose was born on a farm
near Welch, W. Va., May 11,
1876. At the age of six he moved
with his folks to Mountain Grove,
Va., where he received his early
education. Later the family re-
turned to West Virginia where
he met Miss Charity Workman,
born April 5, 1877. The young
couple was married July 24, 1894,
in Hillsboro, W. Va. They had 10
children, seven of whom survive.
In 1905 the Rose family moved
West, settling first in Washing-
ton. Later, in 1914, they moved
to Mapleton, settling on Beaver
Creek, a tributary of Sweet
Creek. From 1914 until 1949, Mr.
Rose worked at his trade, that of
a saw filer, in West Lake, Crow,
Vaughn and back to Mapleton in
1939. He now is retired and lives
with his wife on the banks of the
Siuslaw River west of town.
