

Shivers Lauded By Eisenhower

Texas Vote to Test Ike's Popularity

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower appears to have invited a test of his political popularity in Texas that could reverberate in the fall campaign for control of Congress.

The President's unusual action Wednesday in endorsing Gov. Allan Shivers, Texas Democrat who is bidding for a renomination that is normally equivalent to reelection, may make Shivers' connection with the President one of the chief issues in an Aug. 28 runoff primary.

OPINIONS VARY

Texas Democrats in Washington who asked not to be named disagreed about the possible effect of Eisenhower's statement that Shivers has made a good governor.

Some thought it might rebound to the benefit of Ralph Yarborough of Austin. Yarborough ran 23,852 votes behind Shivers in the first primary last Saturday. Because of votes for other candidates, neither major rival polled a majority, so a runoff is necessary.

Other Texans said they believe Eisenhower is just as popular in their state as he was when he carried it by 133,000 votes in 1952 and that his public praise will help Shivers.

Shivers, who backed Eisenhower in the 1952 presidential race and has maintained close relations with the President, has been under fire in Texas in connection with a personal land deal and an investigation of insurance companies.

OTHER FACTORS

Texas generally said these matters—plus the action of former Vice President John Garner in criticizing a third elective term bid—may have been more compelling than any issue of party regularity in Shivers' slide from the 2-1 vote margin he rolled up over Yarborough in 1952. Yarborough had support this year of most Democrats who call themselves liberals.

Although Eisenhower disclaimed Republican party interest in the outcome of the Shivers-Yarborough runoff, he said he likes and admires Shivers, thinks he has been a good governor and was pleased that Shivers had supported him in 1952.

Eisenhower said he was interested because he was born in Texas. But veteran politicians said they couldn't remember a modern parallel in which a President of one party so openly stuck a political finger into another party's primary contest.

Winnie Heads New Cabinet

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill headed a new government lineup Thursday after the resignation of two ministers and shifts in lesser posts. A third official's request to quit awaited action by the Conservative party chief.

Two of the ministers let it be known they wanted to go back to private pursuits, which pay better. The third got out after charges of maladministration in his ministry.

The resignation of two other ministers has been anticipated for some time, but so far has not developed.

The following appointments were made:

Colonial secretary: Alan Lennox-Boyd, 49, formerly transport minister, replacing Oliver Lyttelton, who resigned to return to private business.

Agriculture: Derek Heathcoat Amory, 54, former minister of state at the Board of Trade, replacing Sir Thomas Dugdale. The latter quit after judicial inquiry into charges of maladministration in his department.

Transport a non-Cabinet post: John Boyd Carpenter, previously financial secretary to the treasury, replacing Lennox-Boyd.

Atty. Gen. Sir Lionel Heath told a Conservative gathering Wednesday night he had submitted his resignation to Churchill but there was no indication whether it would be accepted. He wants to resume private law practice.

Observers expressed surprise that the reshuffle did not include Labor Minister Sir Walter Monckton, who has said he wants to go back to private law practice, or Solicitor General Sir Reginald Manningham-Buller, with whom the Prime Minister has frequently disagreed.

HELPFUL

NEW YORK (AP)—Bill Kemp, who conducts a half hour morning show on WNEW here, told his listeners recently he was open to suggestions on how he might approach his employers and ask for a \$10 weekly salary raise. He offered a 10 per cent commission for a successful suggestion.

Hundreds of suggestions poured in and Kemp presented one to the station management. Kemp got his \$10 raise. The listener will get \$1 a week for one year.

Sigh of Relief

One-Eyed NCO Cleared of Charge

FT. DIX, N. J. (AP)—A wiry, one-eyed non-commissioned officer with six years of Army service behind him Wednesday was cleared of charges that he kept 225 recruits at bone-taut attention for an hour in 92-degree heat.

Sgt. 1/C Richard J. Witbeck of Wellington, Ohio, breathed a sigh of relief as a three-man, special court-martial board of three of his superior officers acquitted him after deliberating 40 minutes.

"I feel very good," Witbeck said outside the pine-paneled hearing room. "I'm glad it's all over."

WIPED CLEAN

The verdict that wiped clean the slates of the two principals brought up on charges as a result of the June 21 punishment formation during which men were said to have passed out in the broiling sun, been revived with pails of water and forced back into line.

First Lt. Robert S. Morgan, 28, of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Witbeck's immediate superior and commander of Company "L," 272 Infantry Regiment, which stood the formation, was cleared of "dereliction of duty" charges last Friday.

Witbeck, who wears a patch over his left eye, lost in an training mishap while on occupation

ACTED ON ORDERS

His counsel, Capt. Norman Tupper of Winter Park, Fla., contended that Witbeck merely acted on orders of his superiors.

Tupper made light of the trainees' ordeal of standing at attention, saying, "I've done so many times. . . I've seen me passing out all around me."

Pvt. William Brooks, 20, of Hempstead, N. Y., testified he fainted twice while on the formation. He said the first time he was revived by water in the face and the second time by smelling salts administered by Witbeck. Asked if he thought he was maltreated by Witbeck, Brooks replied, "No, sir."

PIRATES?

NEW YORK (AP)—Piracy isn't dead yet—but it sure isn't what it used to be.

Two young robbers early Wednesday boarded a 51-foot yacht tied up at an island off the Bronx, awakened skipper Charles Robbins and took \$50 from him. Then they hopped in a rowboat and rowed away.

Jury Clears Fish Buyer Of Violation

THE DALLES (AP)—A Yakima fish buyer was cleared Wednesday of a charge of buying fish from Indians in the closed season, and the Wasco County district attorney said the decision was a blow at conservation.

The district attorney, Donald Heisler, said he will talk with the federal district attorney for Oregon, Ed Luckey, and with the Oregon Fish Commission on possible remedial measures.

The case was that of Myrl Rowley, Yakima, who appealed a \$500 fine imposed in justice court on charge he possessed 44,000 pounds of salmon in the closed season.

Indians by treaty are permitted to fish in the closed season for their own subsistence. Some Indians interpret this to mean they can sell the fish to buy other food.

Rowley said, however, he did not possess the fish at the time of his arrest. He said he had loaned his storage equipment to the Indians, and they were using it. After the commercial season opened, he bought the fish and shipped it to market, he said.

A Circuit Court jury took just 25 minutes to reach a verdict reversing the justice court conviction.
