The "Retort Geographical"

(From The Christian Century)

Following his announcement that the 1955 General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church would not be held in Houston, Bishop Henry Knox Sherrill has chosen to take the meetings to Honolulu. The distances and costs involved in the new arrangement will require a new kind of convention. Visitors will be fewer, the extra added attractions which usually accompany the main feature will be eliminated. Travel arrangements will be slightly more involved, and officials will probably have to work out some kind of expense-sharing scheme.

Bishop Sherrill, however, is sure that the move to hold a first General Convention in an overseas missionary district is worth the extra effort. There is imagination in this dramatic change of base. We need not over-emphasize the missionary aspects of this trip to a well established church in Hawaii's fair and pleasant land.

But what cannot possibly be overemphasized is the moral witness in this geographic shift.

In Houston racial segregation and dis-

crimination would have embarrassed and shamed the convention. The diocese of Texas should not be blamed for this, but the fact is that the best they could promise was "special arrangements" which would have lasted only for the week the General Convention was in town.

Taking the meeting from Houston was a strong, negative verdict. Where the baptized imagination has entered the situation is in now adding to this implied protest the positive approval of the island society which has integrated so many races so successfully.

In Hawaii many peoples live in fine mutual, and a man's self counts for more than a man's skin. The decision to move the convention was partly, at least, a sequel to the Supreme Court's ruling on segregation in public schools. As is so often the case among the churches, Christian action tagged along just behind the judicial conscience. But now a church has stepped out to a spot just ahead of the rest of the world, where by the witness of fresh action it points toward new directions and next steps.

Violin Concert At Lighthouse Sunday Evening

Lighthouse Temple has two unusual features at its Sunday services: the artistry of Miss Lolita Watson, violinist, and reports from two student groups from the church-affiliated divinity school, Bible Standard Institute, who have been on a trip. Both BSI and Lighthouse Temple are Open Bible Standard institutions.

Miss Watson has just returned from a religious music camp in Stockton, Calif., where she was featured in a concert. Her appearance will be at the evening service. In the morning, 11 a.m., the Rev. Harold L. Adams will preach on "The Life You Save May Be Your Own," and at 7:30 p.m., following the musicale, he speaks on "America at the Crossroads." A film, "Missionary to Walker's Garage," will be shown at 6 p.m. at the teen-agers' meeting.

Plans Approach Completion for New Life Camp

The general committee meeting for "New Life Youth Camp," will be held Monday, Aug. 2, at 7:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church parlor, Broadway at High St. George Horn is local chairman for the camp, which is sponsored by Youth Bible Crusade, Inc., a non-profit religious corporation established to sponsor youth activities. The local address is PO Box 546, Eugene. About 40-50 boys will be accommodated at the camp, where they will be under the direction of Phil Thatcher, of Sacramento, Calif., well-known evangelist who became interested in religion after a childhood of delinquency. Thatcher has conducted evangelistic meetings in various Eugene churches in the past few years. He now is devoting his full time to the youth camping program. The camp will be Aug. 23 to 30, at Camp Lane, near Mapleton. Under Thatcher will be a staff of camp counselors from various local churches.

Religion-Law Relationship Pastor's Topic

"The Christian and Obedience to Our Country's laws" will be the subject of the second in a series of three sermons by the Rev. Dr. Oliver Harms on the Lutheran Hour Sunday, Aug. 1. Speaking over the Mutual network and affiliated stations, Dr. Harms will tell his international audience that "the Christian, besides having the motives that might be held honestly by all other loyal citizens of a civilian state, has received instructions from his God as to what obedience to our country's laws really means."

The Houston, Texas, Lutheran clergyman will note that while many people claim to be good and loyal citizens they "will avoid absolute obedience to the laws of the country." He will cite income tax evasion as an example. "There are ever so many people in the country whose loyalty extends to the point where their own comfort is not touched at all, but when it is inconvenient to observe obedience to the laws of the state and the nation they seek to avoid it," Dr. Harms will continue.

Appealing to Christians to do their duty as citizens, the Houston clergyman will urge them to set an example and to pray for the officials so that they may keep and enforce the laws. In closing he will say that "faith in the Lord Jesus Christ gives you the strength to do what the law says even if it is inconvenient for you."

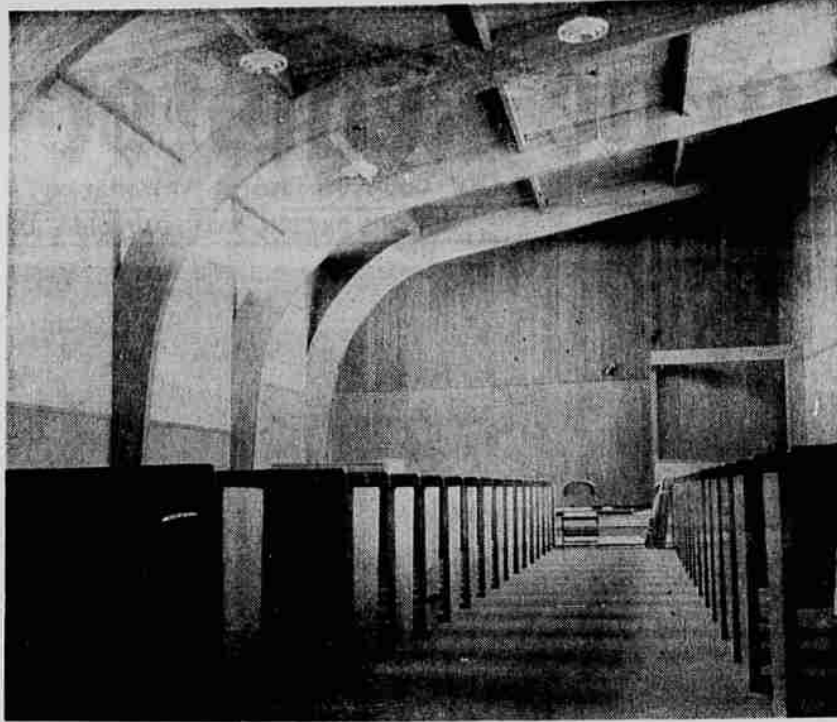

Sunday, Aug. 1, is Dedication Day for the new building, and the start of a week's evangelistic meeting.

Beautiful New Building Shown By Proud Local Congregation

The University Street Church of Christ, formerly Fairmount Church of Christ, is dedicating their new building at 2880 University Street, Sunday, Aug. 1, and also beginning a series of special services running through Aug. 6. Minister of the church is Leo Woodruff.

Evangelist for the meetings, and dedication speaker, will be Donald S. Cox, minister of Central Christian Church of Portland.

In the fall of 1952, due to the expansion program of the University of Oregon, the church property on 17th and Columbia Sts. was purchased by the University with the agreement that it could be used by the church for two years. The church then bought the property on University St. from 28th to 29th for a new building site.

A Building Committee was appointed by the Board and authorized to proceed with plans for the construction of a new building. Drawings were presented and approved by the congregation. The committee is composed of Clifford Hodgkin, Chairman; W. W. Minton, V. C.; Walter Richards, Harold Palmer, F. H. McEwen, Morton Bristow, Lyle Kellogg, Harry Evans, and Dave Reynolds. The committee is to be commended for faithfully discharging the heavy responsibilities involved in making the many necessary decisions.

They chose Dave Reynolds as Superintendent of Construction. Construction began in September, 1953.

The new building as it stands cost approximately \$80,000 including furnishings. The cost would have been much higher if it had been contracted and without the many hours of labor donated by members and friends of the congregation. The buildings and grounds represent an investment of over \$85,000.

Indebtedness is \$35,000 which is being paid off at the rate of \$200 or more per month plus interest. The auditorium has a normal seating capacity of 300 plus the balcony and choir loft. Modern design was accepted by the Building Committee because of the economy, community setting, utility, and simplicity.

The church has three hundred resident members. During the first six months of this year, in addition to regular and building expenses it has given \$1,314.16 to missions. Melba Palmer Rees has been "living link" missionary of this congregation for the past eight years, receiving regular support of \$100 per month. The building plans were engineered by Western Engineering Consultants and designed by Chambers, Unthank, and Patton, designers, Eugene.

Leo A. Woodruff began his ministry on March 1, 1953. He is a graduate of Northwest Christian College, receiving the B.Th. degree in 1943. In 1944 he was awarded A.B. by Butler University, Indianapolis, and the B.D. degree in 1950 from the School of Religion at Butler. Before coming here he was minister of the Church of Christ at Willa-

mina, Oregon, for four and one-half years. He and his wife, Gail, and their two sons, Tommy, 8, and Dwight, 4, live at 2887 Potter St.

At the present time Mr. Woodruff is also serving as Secretary-Treasurer of the Eugene Ministerial Association; Secretary of the Oregon Preachers' Parliament; Chairman of the Okinawa Christian Mission Advisory Council; Director of the Intermediate Christian Camp at Crescent Lake; Secretary of the Continuation Committee of the Northwest District Support Missionary Conference.

Services will be held regularly in the new location beginning Aug. 1. Bible School begins at 9:45 a.m. and Morning Worship at 11. There is a nursery with a regular attendant for infants during Bible School and worship periods. A Junior Church for children is held during the morning church hour.

Christian Endeavor and adult discussion groups are held on Sunday at 6:15 p.m. Evening church service begins at 7:30.

Everyone is invited to attend the Bible Study and Prayer meetings each Wednesday night at 7:30.

Choir rehearsal is held each Wednesday night at 8:30. All singers are welcome.

Adventists Alert To Civil Defense

PORTLAND (AP)—Seventh Day Adventists are setting up food and clothing supply depots in Oregon and southern Washington as part of their civil defense program.

Elder C. J. Ritchie, conference home missionary secretary, said today that welfare centers are under construction at Redmond, Hopewell and Portland. The program started several years ago. Six centers were built originally, and eight more were added last 18 months. The centers located at Salem, McMinnville, Springfield, Roseburg, Medford, Ashland, Oceanlake, New Sandy, Cottage Grove, New Wood, Portland and Van and Ridgefield, Wash.

Last year the centers stored 135,210 garments and food baskets. More than 20 tons of relief clothing were shipped to Korea.
