

Babe Beats Men's Par by Three

Horvath, Zaharias Top Tam

CHICAGO (AP)—Established pros still were stabbing feebly at the brass ring Saturday as the \$25,000 All-American golf merry-go-round went into its third round at Tam O'Shanter.

Halfway leader in the All-American which pays a modest \$3,400 first money, compared with the World's \$50,000, plus a \$50,000 exhibition contract, was a lightly reckoned Canadian pro, Rudy Horvath.

Horvath with a seven-under-par 137 was a stroke ahead of three earnest, but not spectacular golfers—Pete Cooper, Jerry Barber and Australian Peter Thomson.

As a matter of fact, Friday's second round firing by the men's pros produced only three scores better than a women's record 69 fashioned by the unconquerable Babe Zaharias.

Those were three 68's. They were fired by Cooper; Marty

Furgol, notched fifth with 139; and Harry Ransom, jammed with nine others at 141.

It appeared that most of the more heralded pros were experimenting with the "gamble" shot they may have to use under the white-hot pressure of the spectacular World tourney.

Marty Furgol, no relation to U. S. Open champion Ed Furgol who had a poor 149—completely out of the running—probably put his finger on the attitude of the field with this comment:

"You have to get the feel of this course. You have to play position."

That seemingly explained the exploratory, errant shots by the likes of Carry Middlecoff and Ed Oliver, among 10 bracketed at 141; of defending champion Lloyd Mangrum, a 142 shooter; Lew Worsham, 1953's miracle World

winner, straggling with 146; U.S. champ Furgol at 149; and 1954 PGA champion Chick Harbert with 150.

Three strokes behind Horvath, an ex-Royal Canadian Air Force pilot from Windsor, was the quintet of Chandler Harper, Bill Markham, Bud Holscher, Bob Toski and another foreign contender, Flory Van Donck of Belgium.

In the Men's Amateur, Eddie Merrens, Meridian, Miss., former Louisiana State star, at 144, held a one-stroke lead over Frank Stranahan, seeking his seventh straight All-American title, and Arnold Palmer, former national collegiate champ at Wake Forest.

The top woman amateur was Mickey Wright, 19-year-old former USGA Junior champion from San Diego, whose 155 topped Jackie Yates, Hawaiian star, by two strokes.

Gallant Babe Zaharias, who since 1946. By taking the All-American crown this time she can add \$1,000 and be set up for the grand prize of \$5,000 in next week's "world" championship.

The Babe called it her best round of golf since her operation. This includes a series of hot rounds, during which she has won \$9,832 to top women money winners for this year, and her 12-stroke triumph in the recent Women's National Open at Pea body, Mass.

"Shucks, who goes by women's par—1 just play against men's par," she chortled after posting the 69. "My only disappointment was taking a five on the 460-yard 10th. It was the first time in all my Tam O'Shanter playing that I didn't get a four or three there." The 10th is a "gift" hole with a par 5 for men. The males had 12 eagles on it Friday.

Browns Swap Quarterbacks

HIRAM, Ohio (AP)—The Cleveland Browns, planning at least one season in the future, traded away quarterback Bob Garrett Friday and obtained quarterback Babe Parilli in a six-player deal with the Green Bay Packers.

Garrett, Stanford's star quarterback last year and the Browns bonus draft choice, is expected to play this season before starting a probable two years of military service. Parilli, a former Kentucky athlete who played with the Packers in 1952 and 1953, is in the Army and may not be available until the 1956 season.

Also received by the Browns, runner-up for the National Football League title the last two years, was Bob Fleck, former Syracuse tackle. With Garrett in the shift to Green Bay were Johnny Bauer, former SMU quarterback, Don Miller and Maryland tackle Chet Gierula.

Browns coach Paul Brown said the trade "will help Green Bay this year and the Browns in the future."

It insures the team of having an experienced quarterback at a time when Otto Graham and George Ratterman might not be around, Brown said. He added that "in trading Garrett, we won't have to carry three quarterbacks, giving us a chance to keep an extra man at another position."
