Noon Saturday Is Deadline For Election

Noon Saturday is the deadline for Springfield residents and those of a large area outside that city to register for voting in the special annexation election scheduled for Sept. 14, according to Lloyd Payne, Lane County elections clerk.

Laws state that residents must be registered at least 30 days before an election to be eligible to vote.

The county office closes at noon on Saturday, so that will be the last time registration can be made.

But in Eugene, citizens involved in another annexation election, for a large area along W. 11th Ave. and in the industrial section along the Coos Bay line of the Southern Pacific Railroad, can register up to 5 p.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 17, according to Payne.

This election will be held in the city as well as the annexation district.

The same deadline applies to residents of the Bethel Water District. An election is slated for most of that district for the same day, and citizens must register prior to the August deadline to be eligible to vote.

Kiwanis Club Hears Rosell

Evangelist Merv Rosell Thursday cautioned members of the Springfield Kiwanis Club that Christianity in this "atom-bomb" age can't be pushed aside into a cubby-hole.

"Christianity is not a minor issue—it's the great driving force of today," he declared.

Rosell said he was encouraged by "an upswing of spiritual awakening in America which he termed the only answer for modern age problems.

Rosell urged church people to take a more active role in the nation's leadership.

"I believe in exercising my franchise," he declared. "The wrong people get in office because the right people don't vote."

Rosell is currently conducting a United Church Crusade at the Eugene High School.

Four Seeking Council Post

Al Peake Latest Ward 4 Candidate

Al J. Peake, of 210 W. 14th Ave., became the fourth person Friday to circulate petitions in Ward 4 for nomination to the Eugene City Council.

Peake took the petitions from the city hall Friday morning. All he needs are the signatures of 25 persons in that ward to have his name placed on the ballot at the Nov. 2 general election.

Others seeking the same post are incumbent Ray Siegenthaler, Archie Bell, of 1145 W. 19th Ave., and Roebrt Hartman, 1637 Wilson Ct.

According to the city charter, any registered voter who has lived in Eugene for at least a year can seek a council seat. City council membership is not restricted to property owners.

But the petitions must be completed and filed before 5 p.m. Aug. 20 for the names to be placed on the ballot.

One position in each of the city's four wards is open this year. So far, one person has sought nomination in Ward 1, one in Ward 2, one in Ward 3 and four in Ward 4.

Ward 1 includes land east of Willamette and south of 15th Ave.; Ward 2 is land north of 15th and east of Willamette; Ward 3 is land west of Willamette and north of 11th Ave.; and Ward 4 is the land south of 11th and west of Willamette St.
