Arthur Langlie conferred Friday about four hours with representatives of Western Washington operators. He told reporters this was his second conference with the employers and that he had met earlier with union representatives in efforts to develop areas of agreement between the two.

Elsewhere in the strike these developments were reported:

The Santiam Lumber Co. at Lebanon Friday asked CIO Woodworkers to return to work next Monday without a pay increase. However, John Ball, a union official, said a picket line would be maintained at the plant and that workers voted last Monday not to accept a similar offer.

A. F. Hartung, Woodworkers international president, reported Saturday some 200 loggers in the Oregon coastal area around Seaside have returned to work under agreements providing the full 12½ cent pay increase for which the unions went on strike. The boost, he said, was retroactive to April 1 and makes the minimum hourly wage \$1.90.

Hartung said 26 companies signed with the CIO union's CIO local—some being new operations and other have been on strike. "Most of these companies have requested that their names not be released publicly as they fear economic reprisals and blacklisting by the big employer associations," he said.

At Coos Bay, a negotiating committee for a local of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers, accepted a 5-cent hourly increase offered by the Evans Products Co.

The agreement, subject to ratification by the union membership, calls for a wage readjustment in the event industry-wide negotiations result in a different wage figure. About 650 are employed at the plant.

Also at Coos Bay AFL woods and mill employees of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. voted 227-23 against returning to work at the old wage rate. A group of union members had asked the back-to-work vote.

Cougar Prospects Less Favorable

WASHINGTON—Prospects for enactment of the Cougar Dam bill, while still a matter for speculation, appear to be growing less favorable as Congress races toward its adjournment climax.

Passed by the House in May, the Cougar Bill has languished in the Senate ever since, where it has been the focal point for a noteworthy duel between Sen. Guy Cordon and Sen. Wayne Morse.

Cordon, its sponsor, succeeded in getting it placed on the agenda of priority bills which the GOP policy committee declared would be brought up before adjournment. But this list has been altered several times since, usually gaining the pet bills of a number of other influential Republican senators—so that at the moment, the priority list has been narrowed to contain but a few bills mentioned specifically plus a batch of lesser measures which are in the doubtful category of being regarded as something less than "must" legislation.

MINOR LEGISLATION

It appears that minor bills in this group—and the Cougar Bill is among these which are not considered major national bills—will be sandwiched between the few remaining key bills which are "must" bills. If they are fairly non-controversial, their chances of enactment are superior to those which are likely to draw critical fire.

The Cougar Bill is one of those for which at least one Senate sharpshooter—Morse—is lying in wait. Earlier this week the Cougar Bill came up on the unanimous consent calendar, as it has done previously, and Morse's objection prevented its consideration.

Moreover, Morse has alerted the senators with whom he has frequently been allied in public power battles during this congress, hopelessly enlisting their numbers for a battle to kill the Cougar Bill.

Main Line Break
Cuts Electric Service

Customers of the Pacific Power & Light Co. in the Willamette, Clatsop, Junction City and Elmira districts were without electricity for about 20 minutes Friday when someone broke an insulator on the main line in Springfield.

The break came at about 12:30 p.m. and lasted until 12:50, according to A. C. Bartholomew, of PP&L. He said that someone—with a BB-gun or rifle—apparently shot into the insulators on the high voltage line. This was in the 200 block on E. St., he said.

The wires dropped into another set, causing a short circuit.

MOOD OF ANXIETY

The mood of the Senate, as its major legislative hurdles are cleared, is one of increasing anxiety to close up shop and get home for electioneering. Already two weeks beyond the original adjournment date, the Senate is little disposed to acting on all the many minor bills that it normally could handle under different circumstances. It is cleaning up its calendar of non-controversial bills (last Wednesday it passed 415 in this category) but leaving the disagreeable legislative chores for later—a time which will never arrive for many of them.

This is the political climate in which the Cougar Bill is presently becalmed.
