

Passage of a New A-Bill Predicted

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Majority Leader Knowland of California predicted final passage of a new atomic energy bill within the next few days despite the Senate's shutdown of an administration-backed compromise.

Brushing aside a last-minute plea from President Eisenhower, the Senate yesterday voted, 48-41, to reject a revised bill opening atomic energy to private industry under a system of exclusive patent rights. The Senate had voted before to require 10 years of patent-sharing.

Then, by voice vote, the senators sent the bill back for a second conference with the House with general instructions to in-

sist upon Senate amendments, including compulsory license-sharing.

WON'T TAKE LONG

Knowland told newsmen he believed a new conference "will not take too long." He predicted it would be over in time to permit adjournment next week, after both houses vote again on a new compromise.

Other provisions in the measure, not now in controversy, authorize the President to exchange limited atomic information with Allies and make other major changes in basic atomic energy law enacted in 1946.

The Senate shutdown once again threw the bill—a key to Congress' adjournment date—into the status of "unfinished business." An earlier version touched off 13 days of senate speechmaking. The legislation rejected yesterday was a compromise between Senate and House-passed bills which, having already passed the House, would have gone to Eisenhower for signing had the Senate concurred.

POSSIBLE COMPROMISE

Now the issue waits until the House reconvenes Monday and considers appointing new conferees for a second attempt to write mutually agreeable adjustments of disputed points.

A possible compromise solution was suggested by Sen. Gore (D-Tenn.), a leading opponent of the earlier bill, who said agreement might be reached on a period of between five and 10 years of compulsory patent-sharing.

However, Rep. W. Sterling Cole (R-N.Y.), chairman of the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee and a staunch proponent of exclusive patent rights, has said he will continue to oppose compulsory patent-sharing, regardless of Senate action. Cole was absent from the city and was not immediately available for comment on the vote.

U.S. Rushing Medical Aid To Pakistan

WASHINGTON (AP)—Huge United States military cargo planes are converging on flood-stricken East Pakistan, carrying tons of medical supplies.

Two C124 Globemasters left Westover Air Force Base, Mass., Friday night with some 60,000 pounds of medical supplies. Three additional cargo planes of the same type were ready to leave Tokyo for the same destination and on the same mission, carrying 72 tons of equipment, supplies and small vehicles.

Five other planes will follow from the Far East command loaded with medical supplies and army technicians.

The Globemasters from the United States are flying by way of North Africa. The Far East planes were ordered to stop at Seoul to pick up members of the 8th Army's 37th preventive medicine group and supplies, including vaccine to prevent the outbreak of epidemics in a large area of East Pakistan that has been stricken by floods of both the Ganges and Brahmaputra rivers.

The two Globemasters that left Westover Friday are attached to the 62nd Troop Carrier Wing, Larsen Air Force Base, Wash. After unloading their supplies in Pakistan, the two aircraft will continue around the world, returning to their home base via the Pacific.

TB Control Studied

No Aid Without Security Check Says Senator

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. McCarran (D-Nev.) said Saturday the Senate Appropriations Committee has agreed unanimously to bar use of U. S. funds to assist in the migration to the Western Hemisphere of any persons not "thoroughly screened for security."

The provision is directed toward persons entering Hemisphere countries other than the United States, since strict immigration rules already apply here.

The provision, McCarran said, was written into a bill carrying \$2,900,000,000 in new funds to finance the foreign military and economic aid program. The money measure still must be acted on by the Senate.

Over 10 million dollars of this is for the U. S. contribution to the Intergovernmental Committee for European Migration (ICEM), an agency which McCarran said gets 60 per cent of its money from this government.

The McCarran amendment provides that none of the U. S. funds may be used to help in the migration to any nation in the Western Hemisphere of any person "who shall not first have been thoroughly screened for security" in accordance with the strict standards set in the McCarran-Walter immigration law.

McCarran said in an interview his purpose was to make sure no U. S. money was spent "to subsidize the infiltration" of Communists into the Western Hemisphere.

As evidence of the dangers he said he sees in the immigration situation, McCarran placed in the congressional record testimony he took for the Senate Internal Security subcommittee two weeks ago from David B. Hoyt, security officer of the ICEM until his resignation July 9.

This showed Hoyt testified that "with minor exceptions" the security screening of Europeans being resettled in South American countries under the ICEM program is "entirely inadequate."

He was asked if he felt this was "a risk to the security of the Western Hemisphere and to the United States."

"I feel very strongly that it is," Hoyt replied.

Hoyt testified he resigned because "I was dissatisfied with the security within the committee and principally in relation to the screening of migrants moving to South America."

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Federal Power Commission examiner has granted an extra month for filing written arguments in the controversial Hells Canyon case. Examiner William J. Costello said the new deadline for filing legal briefs in the prolonged dispute over proposed damming the Snake River in the Hells Canyon area will be Oct. 11. Originally the deadline was Sept. 10.

'Hindenberg's' Builder Dead

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany (AP)—Dr. Hugo Eckener, whose dream of popularizing lighter-than-air craft for global travel vanished in the flaming explosion of the Zeppelin Hindenburg at Lakehurst, N. J., in 1937, died at his lakeside villa here Saturday. He was 86.

The famed German scientist who in 1929 circled the globe in the Graf Zeppelin in three weeks succumbed to a heart ailment after a lingering illness.

Dr. Eckener, whose greatest successes were achieved in the 1920s and early '30s, had lived in comparative obscurity since the end of World War II in a modest villa on the north shore of Lake Constance.

At a reception on his 85th birthday last August, the famed aeronautical engineer told reporters "It would be foolish to build new dirigibles—because it would be very much like a covered wagon trying to compete with a truck."

He said the only future he saw in lighter-than-air craft was as a novelty for millionaires "who want the wonderful experience of Zeppelin flight."

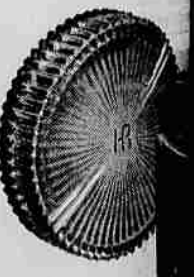

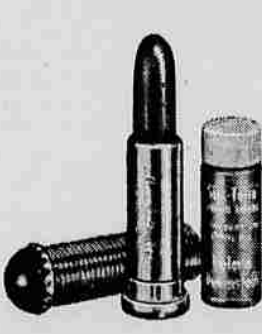
