

President Hits Doom Prophets In Major Talk

2nd Speech Given
To Church Council

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower says administration critics forecasting a depression are pursuing "crooked-fence economic politics"—and aides said Friday this means he intends to fight hard to tighten Republican control of Congress.

Democrats quickly replied to Eisenhower's latest pat on the back for the GOP-run 83rd Congress with notice they are ready to wage the November election battle on the issues of the administration's tax, farm, labor, power and business policies.

SECOND SPEECH

The President hit at critics in a speech at the Illinois State Fair in Springfield Thursday. Then he flew on to Evanston, Ill., for another, quite different kind of address.

In that solemn talk at the Assembly of the World Council of Churches at Northwestern University, Eisenhower declared the cause of peace in the world "needs God." He voiced faith "certain wondrous results could ensue" from world-wide prayer for international tranquility.

He called on religious leaders everywhere to help launch a "mass dedication" through prayer toward that end.

HONORARY DEGREE

After his talk to the Protestant churchmen, he received an honorary doctor of laws degree from Northwestern University. The citation which accompanied it praised him as a man who "has brought to our highest elective office an abiding awareness of the central importance of the Christian messages to the peoples of a divided world."

Cook County Sheriff John Babb estimated 18,000 to 20,000 persons attended Eisenhower's address.

At Springfield he got a roaring reception from a fairgrounds crowd which Strother Jones, the fair manager, estimated at 100,000.

In his Springfield speech, Eisenhower said that while Republicans have been at work—successfully, he added—on the administration's legislative program, "there have been sitting on the sidelines, of course, the prophets of gloom and doom" on the economic outlook.

MEET ON PLATFORM

He mentioned no names, but obviously was alluding to Democratic critics who have contended the administration was leading the nation into a depression.

One such critic is Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill.), whose November opponent, Joseph T. Meek, sat on the platform with Eisenhower.

Eisenhower said Abraham Lincoln once told a story about a farmer building a fence so crooked that every time a hog bored through it he found himself on the same side from which he started.

"Now these economic prophets of doom have been building up a lot of fences of what they call economic statistics," Eisenhower said with a grin, "but every time they bore through them, they still find themselves on the side of pessimism and depression."

PERSONAL KICKOFF

"It seems to me lately that they would like to forget the whole thing, and I think all of us are getting rather tired of crooked-fence economic politics." That speech was the President's personal kickoff of a cross-country tour in the weeks to come in an effort to increase the number of Republicans in the Senate, where they outnumber the Democrats by only one, and in the House, where their margin is five.

He spent about 13 hours away from Washington, returning by plane Thursday night.

Eisenhower said he believes Lincoln would be proud of the GOP delegation now in Congress.

CITES FOREIGN FIELD

Turning to the record, he said that in the foreign field since his administration took office the shooting in Korea and Indochina has ended and that the outlook is brighter in Iran, Egypt and Guatemala.

On the domestic front, he said, the administration has lifted "stifling controls" on prices and in other fields, and prices "have shifted scarcely at all."

He claimed a 10-billion-dollar cut in federal spending, 7½ billions in tax cuts, expansion of social security, and enactment of a flexible farm price support program which he said "will not break down of its own weight because of unmanageable surpluses."

Attorney Completes Educational Probe

PORTLAND (AP)—Victor Bryant, Durham, N. C. attorney and head of a commission to evaluate that state's higher education organization, completed three days of investigation of Oregon's State System of Higher Education here this week.

Bryant conferred with Gov. Paul Patterson, legislators, other state officials and higher educational administrators.

Kelly and Friends Stir Up Irish Stew

POMEROY, Northern Ireland (AP)—Sure, it was a glorious fight—but the Union Jack still fluttered Friday over Pomeroiy.

But you should have seen the place Thursday night about the time Liam Kelly was being welcomed home from jail. He's the local hero of the nationalists, who want to wrest Northern Ireland from the British crown and join it up with the Irish Republic. He had been spending a year in the Belfast gaol for making seditious remarks last year about Queen Elizabeth II. This was when he was campaigning for a seat in the Northern Ireland Parliament.

But Thursday Kelly's term was up and he headed for home. His nationalist friends camped on the edge of Pomeroiy to give him a big welcome and escort him into town. Three hundred North Irish

cops with guns stood by just in case of trouble.

As the word was passed along that Kelly was coming, bonfires were touched off on the hill. The nationalists formed a parade to march him to his home and hoisted the green, white and gold flag of the Irish Republic.

The police ordered them to strike the flag when they started down Pomeroiy's main street. The nationalists paid nary a heed and marched into the cordons of 80 police strung across the road.

The police charged with their shillelaghs and broke up the parade. The nationalists retreated to the churchyard with 30 wounded, then armed themselves with stones and bottles.

"Stand firm, boys," a leader shouted, "now let 'em have it." The nationalists charged back into the fray. They beat off police trying to grab the flag, but another attack by the police clubs finally sent them reeling. The fighting petered out then, and the village hotel was turned into a casualty station for the night. The able-bodied, including Kelly, went home to bed.

He's quite a fellow, actually. He won the seat he was campaigning for last year in Northern Ireland's Parliament. While in jail, he also was elected to the Irish Republic's Senate. He was sworn into office in his jail cell last week, by special permission of the British.

Reds Renew Invasion Talk

TOKYO (AP)—Communist China called again Friday for the "liberation" of Formosa and declared "We shall not stop until this objective is attained."

A Peiping Radio broadcast said Formosa "must be liberated by the Chinese people and they will brook no U. S. occupation, on U. N. trusteeship, no neutralization."

'MORALLY JUSTIFIED'

"The Chinese people both legally and morally are perfectly justified in wanting to liberate Taiwan (Formosa) and wipe out the traitorous Chiang Kai-shek gang," said the broadcast, quoting an editorial in the official People's Daily.

This new call for "liberation" of Formosa followed Peiping charges Thursday that U. S. 7th Fleet naval and air units had engaged in "armed provocation" Thursday within sight of the Red China coast.

The broadcast said a U. S. cruiser, destroyer, four destroyer escorts and a number of planes put on a show of naval and air strength near the Chinese Nationalist Tachen Islands, 14 miles off Chekiang Province.

FLEET GUARDS ISLAND

Red China's renewed call for the "liberation" of Formosa followed by only a few days President Eisenhower's declaration that any Communist invasion would have to run over the U. S. 7th Fleet.

The United States has guarded the Chinese Nationalist island from invasion since 1950 and only this week the U. S. Pacific Commander-in-Chief, Adm. Felix Stump, said on Formosa that the 7th Fleet "would do whatever is militarily expedient" in the defense of Formosa.

Kaiser, Union Recess Talks

PORTLAND (AP)—CIO Steelworkers have failed to reach agreement with the Kaiser Aluminum Co. on wages, but no strike is in prospect.

That was the report here Friday from Charles J. Smith, director of the union's western district, who had conducted negotiations for 5,000 workers employed in Kaiser plants at Spokane and Tacoma, Wash.; Newark, O.; and Halthorpe, Md.

Smith said three days of negotiations here ended in a decision to recess indefinitely. He said the union gained the equivalent of 12 cents hourly from Reynolds and Alcoa aluminum plants, but Kaiser negotiators had not offered anything more than 5 cents an hour.

Smith also said the union negotiators were empowered to call a strike after the Kaiser contract, expires Aug. 31, but he added, "I don't think there's going to be a strike."

KILLS HUSBAND

BIRMINGHAM, England (AP)—Mrs. Elsie Nolan, 34, pawned her wedding ring to buy a carving knife. And with that knife, police told a court here, she stabbed her husband to death as he slept because he kept her short of house-keeping money.

McCarthy-Army Investigators Still Haven't Reached Verdict

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two months and three days after the windup of the McCarthy-Army hearings, the senators who conducted the inquiry said Thursday they still have not agreed on a verdict.

One of them, Sen. Potter (R-Mich.), announced he intends to leave behind his own statement of findings and head for Europe Sunday if he and the other six members of the Senate Investigations subcommittee fail by then to agree on what the 36 days of public hearings showed.

PREVIOUS STATEMENT

Potter already is on record as declaring he believes the hearings proved the main charges flung at each other by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) and top Army officials which touched off the inquiry.

Secretary of the Army Stevens and Army Counselor John G. Adams accused McCarthy and former subcommittee counsel Roy M. Cohn of improperly seeking

Cost of Eats Boosts Prices

Higher Index Figure
Means Pay Increase

WASHINGTON (AP)—Higher food prices attributed mainly to drought conditions sent the government's living cost index up slightly in July.

It was the third straight month of rising costs and will mean a penny-an-hour pay boost for about one million workers in the auto, aircraft and farm equipment industries.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported Friday that its index for July was 115.2 per cent of the 1947-48 living cost average. This is just two-tenths of a point under the record reached last October.

AUTOMATIC RAISE

Workers who will get an automatic pay raise have union contracts tied to the index. These workers took a cut of a penny-an-hour last April because of living cost declines.

The BLS said higher prices for fresh fruits and vegetables, owing to dry weather in the East and Midwest, caused the July living cost rise.

Food prices in the far west were actually lower. There were no drought conditions in that area to interfere with the usual summertime fruits - vegetables price decline.

OTHER ITEMS

Drought conditions brought average price increases of 22½ per cent for green beans, 10 per cent for oranges, 8 per cent for potatoes and 7½ per cent for tomatoes. Egg and milk prices were also up seasonally. Coffee continued getting more expensive, but has now begun to decline.

BLS said prices were lower for apparel, due to summer clothing sales, and for new automobiles.

There were slight cost increases in July for rents, fuel, cigarettes, and various services including medical care.

The July figure compares with an index of 115.1 in June.

Doctor Enters Innocent Plea

CLEVELAND (AP)—Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard pleaded innocent at his arraignment Friday and his counsel in a surprise move made no request for bail.

William J. Corrigan, head of the defendant's legal staff, previously said he would ask Common Pleas Judge Arthur H. Day to set bail or call a hearing.

Corrigan made no mention of the matter at the arraignment. Queried by reporters, he snapped: "No comment. I'm not trying this case in the newspapers."

Dressed nattily in a charcoal grey suit, Dr. Sheppard was accompanied by Corrigan and his co-counsel, Fred H. Garmone, as he stepped before the bench to enter a plea to the first degree murder indictment.

After the indictment was read, Garmone said simply "Not guilty, your honor."

Dr. Sheppard, who showed no sign of emotion throughout the 20-minute proceedings, was returned immediately to his cell in county jail.

The 30-year-old osteopath was indicted on first degree murder charges Tuesday in the hacking slaying of his wife, Marilyn, last July 4.

Corrigan had reported he would call a "number" of witnesses if the bail hearing was granted, but declined to say if he intended to put Dr. Sheppard on the stand.

Gas Prices Up in East

NEW YORK (AP)—Gasoline prices rose almost a cent a gallon Thursday on the retail level in 18 eastern and southern states.

The increase became effective as the result of wholesale price increases ranging from 0.7 to 0.9 cents a gallon. Six major oil companies announced the increases "to meet competition" after Socony-Vacuum boosted its wholesale gasoline price Wednesday.

Industry sources said the price boost might spread to other sections of the country.

The increase reversed a trend toward lower prices for gasoline which developed last November.

This was the first price hike this year. Companies following the Socony-Vacuum lead in raising prices were Esso Standard Oil, Gulf Oil, Sinclair Oil, Atlantic Refining, the Texas Co. and Sun. Other major companies, such as Shell Oil and Tide Water Associated said they are studying the situation.

Radio Comedian Believed Suicide

NORTH HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (AP)—Comedian Pat Patrick, 49, who originated the role of Eric Twing on the Edgar Bergen radio show, was found dead Thursday in his parked station wagon. Police said a vacuum cleaner hose led from the exhaust pipe to the interior of the car.

He had appeared for the last eight years in a night club near here. His widow Lani said she knew of no reason why he should take his life. They had two sons.

Air Nominee Linked With Oppenheimer

WASHINGTON (AP)—The blocking of Trevor Gardner's Senate confirmation as an assistant secretary of the Air Force has been linked to his alleged interest in the defense of atomic scientist J. Robert Oppenheimer.

A Defense Department official, who asked to remain anonymous, said Thursday there was an indication Gardner gave money to help Dr. Oppenheimer's defense against security risk charges or at least allowed his name to be used in connection with the defense effort. He said this was probably why the nomination was blocked.

Dr. Oppenheimer, a pioneer in the development of the first atomic bomb, has been barred from official secrets. The Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) held that Oppenheimer is a security risk, though it did not question his loyalty.

Sen. Knowland of California, the Republican leader, blocked Gardner's nomination when it came up in the Senate Wednesday. Sen. Hickenlooper (R-Iowa), vice chairman of the Senate House Atomic Energy Committee, said Thursday he had asked Knowland to delay consideration of Gardner's nomination "because I did not know his name was on the list."

Hickenlooper would say no more about his objection.

Income Tax Total Drops

SALEM (AP)—Oregon's state income tax collections in the year ended July 1 were 9.4 per cent less than in the preceding year, the State Tax Commission reported Friday.

Collections totaled \$56,334,162, compared with \$63,206,184 in the 1952-53 year, and the all-time record of \$64,895,488 in 1951-52.

The totals for the past year included \$41,522,926 in personal income taxes, a drop of \$2,100,000 from the previous year; and \$14,811,236 in corporation income tax receipts, a decline of \$3,800,000.

Congress Junks 2 Anti-Red Moves

WASHINGTON (AP)—An election-bound Congress, now verging on adjournment, overrode the mark set by President Eisenhower for anti-Red legislation by voting to strip the Communist party of legal rights.

However, two of the principal measures he asked for dealing with subversives had not been passed. They were:

WIRE-TAP BILL

1. A bill to permit the government to use evidence obtained by wire tapping in the prosecution of national security cases. This passed the House but bogged down in the Senate Judiciary Committee.

2. A bill to let the government bar from defense plants in times of emergency persons whom it had reasonable ground to believe might engage in espionage, sabotage or other subversion. It passed the Senate but got pigeonholed by the House Judiciary Committee.

A compromise bill to deny the Communist party legal privileges and force its members to register with the government passed Thursday.

WATERED DOWN

The bill had not been asked by the President or Atty. Gen. Brownell, but apparently the administration was willing to accept it after it had been shorn of a Democratic-sponsored provision imposing heavy penalties on Communist party members.

The bill also strips the Communist party of any legal rights before the National Labor Relations Board.

In its final form, it passed the Senate 79-0 and the House 265-2. Also sent to the President Thursday were bills he had requested to strip U. S. nationality from citizens convicted of advocating the forcible overthrow of the government and to permit the death penalty to be imposed for spying in peacetime as well as in wartime.

The White House announced Eisenhower would sign Friday the first of the administration's anti-subversive measures to be passed by Congress.

GRANTED IMMUNITY

Under it, witnesses in national security cases could be granted immunity from prosecution by

court order and then be compelled to risk jail for contempt to give testimony they now can withhold under their constitutional protection against self-incrimination.

Other bills already passed would increase penalties for jumping bail and harboring fugitives. A measure to tighten the perjury law was killed by the Senate Judiciary Committee.
