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30 CHEST AGENCIES TO GET \$273,143

Some \$273,143 will be distributed to 30 Lane County Chest agencies and the American Red Cross if the United Appeal goal is achieved this fall.

This goal was announced Thursday by Merv Dahl, general campaign chairman. Of the total goal, \$75,500 is earmarked for the Lane County Chapter of the Red Cross and \$168,666 is earmarked for county chest agencies and state chest agencies. An additional \$28,977 is for administrative and campaign costs and a reserve for pledge losses.

The distribution of funds, if 100 per cent of the goal is achieved, will be made this way:

Lane County Chapter of the Red Cross, \$75,000; Oregon Chest, \$32,400; Lane County Chest agencies—Salvation Army, \$13,000; Assn. for Help of Retarded Children, \$3,449; Catholic Charities, \$12,000; Junction City Youth Fund, \$200; Oakridge Community Center, \$600; Y.M.C.A., \$13,500; Community Center, \$9,000; Y.W.C.A., \$10,300; University of Oregon Y.M.C.A., \$4,800; University of Oregon Y.W.C.A., \$4,800; Springfield Community Chest, \$3,062; Cottage Grove Community Chest, \$3,000; Girl Scouts, \$22,200; Boy Scouts, \$35,855; campaign and administrative expenses, \$20,977; reserve for pledge losses, \$8,000.

cept no changes which would require new action by their parliaments.

These four nations already have given their final approval to the EDC treaty. To their objection was added Italian Foreign Minister Attilio Piccioni's contention that the proposed changes menaced his government's plans to secure parliamentary ratification of EDC this fall.

Spaak suggested the Mendes-France points requiring parliamentary action be listed. The rest, he suggested, could be settled by the ministers.

With agreement on this list, the Belgian foreign minister said all six ministers could sign a non-binding declaration of intention to consider real amendments, but only after the treaty goes into force.

The ministers put a committee of legal experts to work on the list.

If accepted, Spaak's solution would be a bitter pill for Mendes-France, since he has maintained so insistently that changes must be made in the treaty. The compromise plan would send him back to Paris empty-handed to face National Assembly debate scheduled to start Aug. 28.

The Germans, Dutch, Belgians, Italians and Luxembourg at the Brussels talks appeared determined to stand pat on three basic conditions. They were:

1. The EDC treaty must not discriminate against West Germany. Several of the French proposals appear to do so.
2. No treaty changes requiring re-ratification can be accepted.
3. The supranational structure of EDC must be preserved. Critics of the French changes say they would destroy this by giving each member nation a veto right in major issues.

of them. In Eugene, the union was meeting with representatives of the Associated Plywood Corp. plants of Eugene and Willamina.

In Marcola, a plant committee was reporting to the some 150 employees of the Fischer Lumber Co. the results of a meeting with Manager Dale Fischer.

And in Springfield the union was meeting with Ted Thomas, Booth-Kelly's labor relations man. The first Booth-Kelly meeting was held Thursday afternoon. About 300 Springfield division employees are affected.

Results of these meetings were not known at presstime.

5,000 SETTLE

The Booth-Kelly and Fischer crews earlier voted, and got approval of the union local, to negotiate at the local, rather than the Northwest, level.

In California, an agreement was ratified by the AFL which will send more than 5,000 men back to work in dozens of Central California mills.

There was no pay increase but one extra holiday was given. Holiday and vacation clauses were rewritten, improving conditions for some men and reducing them for others.

This leaves only about 2,500 AFL men on strike in all of California. The union termed the settlement "a draw." The company

representatives said it will cost them between 1/2 and 1-cent an hour more.

ACCORD IN ROSEBURG

The demand by both unions when the strike began two months ago was 12 1/2 cents an hour. Since then some settlements have been made at that rate, but more have been made at 5 cents.

In Roseburg about 400 IWA men voted Thursday night to accept a provisional 5-cent-an-hour increase offered by the Umpqua Plywood Corp. and the Evans Products Co. The companies expected to start work next Tuesday or Wednesday.

This leaves only about 500 men still on strike in Douglas County.

Evans Products' huge plywood mill at Coos Bay made a similar settlement a week ago.

While many observers said the strike is nearing its end, the governors of Oregon and Washington were calling for both sides to agree to go back to work pending arbitration.

There was no word from the Oregon Conciliation Board which began investigating the strike Monday.

In Washington, three union men pleaded guilty after being charged with violence in an Olympic Peninsula altercation in which trucks and busses attempted to pass pickets.
