Engineers to Lease Lots at Fern Ridge

PORTLAND (AP)—The Army Engineers' real estate division here has invited bids for leasing of property in the Fern Ridge Reservoir area of Lane County for agricultural and grazing purposes.

The property consists of five pieces ranging from 14 to 18 acres each. The lease will be for a five-year period, starting Sept. 1, 1954, and ending Aug. 31, 1959.

Bids will be opened Aug. 25. Separate bids must be submitted for each of the five parcels.

The Engineers also announced they will open bids Aug. 31 on sale and removal of buildings from The Dalles Dam area.

Parole Assn. pay particular attention to the needs of the physical plant of the juvenile home," an announcement said Friday.

Sherman said Friday the council hopes to have results by December of a survey the national association will make of the juvenile home.

Ralph Cobb, vice chairman of the council, said Friday that when survey results are obtained "we can then develop an overall long-range plan. The thinking is in the right direction but it takes time."

'ON RIGHT TRACK'

Cobb said he felt the council "is on the right track. Facilities at the home have been one of my greatest concerns," Cobb declared. "We hope this problem can be solved as quickly as possible."

It was the consensus of opinion of all the juvenile program administrators and advisors that the public must be awakened to the need for better facilities before a major step forward can be taken.

Cobb pointed out that the annual one-quarter mill levy for financing operation of the Skipworth Home runs out next year and that an adequate program and adequate facilities in the future will require more than the present levy.

Mrs. Richmond remarked that the general public still isn't awakened to the juvenile needs in Lane County and that many persons think the juvenile department is a law enforcement agency when, in reality, it is a protective agency.

Meanwhile, just what it will cost to bring existing juvenile home facilities into compliance as requested by the state fire marshal's office was not known Saturday.

COST ESTIMATED

To carry out all recommended corrections might cost several thousand dollars, Sherman estimated. He said much of the cost could probably be absorbed within the department's current budget.

Sherman said that after estimates have been obtained the juvenile department and advisory council will decide what steps should be taken.

But there was no doubt in Sherman's mind Friday that there is an existing need for a new fire-resistant structure.

When and how this new structure will be constructed depends largely upon the public which would pay the bill.

Juvenile advisors and administrators, however, feel the cost is a relatively insignificant factor when the safety of juveniles is at stake.

U.S. Workers Can't Politick

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal workers living in the District of Columbia won't be allowed a more active part in politics than the government's hired help elsewhere.

President Eisenhower this week vetoed a bill which would have made this possible. He said the proposal would give a small percentage of personnel "a privilege denied to all other federal employees by the Hatch Act."

The vetoed bill would have allowed government personnel living in Washington to serve on campaign committees, speak for candidates, solicit campaign funds and the like.

Admiral Renews Formosa Pledge

MANILA (AP)—Vice Adm. A. M. Pride, new commander of U. S. fast carriers and supporting warships in the Philippine and South China Sea areas, renewed American pledges Saturday that the U. S. 7th Fleet would defend Formosa against any Chinese Red invasion.

"We will repel the Communists if they attempt to attack," Pride told a news conference.

President Eisenhower said in Washington Tuesday any Communist invasion of the Chinese Nationalist island would have to run over the 7th Fleet.

Pride said he considered the Communists capable of launching an air-sea assault against Formosa.

"I think they can start it, but I don't think they can finish it," the three-star admiral said. "We know we can stop them."

"I can't see Formosa ever falling to the Reds. I am firmly convinced that will never happen."

PHILLIPS RETURNS

Pride took over command of U. S. Pacific Fleet naval forces operating in the Philippine area and the South China Sea from Vice Adm. W. K. Phillips, 1st Fleet commander. Phillips is returning to his headquarters at San Diego.

The units involved are aircraft carriers, destroyers and their supply craft which have been operating out of Subic Bay and Manila for almost a year.

They now are restored to the 7th Fleet after operating for a number of months under the 1st Fleet command of Phillips. The technical return of the three carriers and supporting units of the 7th Fleet involves no increase in U. S. naval strength in Far Pacific waters.

STANDING BY

Pride said the 7th Fleet now operates from the northernmost Japanese main island of Hokkaido on Russia's doorstep, all the way south to the Philippines and the South China Sea.

"We support the military effort in Korea," he said. "We are standing by to defend Japan, if necessary. We are charged with the protection of Formosa and to look after our interests in the South China Sea."

Pride said the fleet would closely watch the China mainland for any sign of Communist ship concentrations. He said the Chinese Reds could gather enough vessels for an attempted invasion.

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
