Two Girls Convicted Of Brutal Slaying

AUCKLAND, New Zealand (AP)—Two teen-agers, described in court as "dirty-minded little girls," were convicted of murder today for beating the mother of one girl to death with a brick. They were sentenced to indefinite prison terms.

The pair are Pauline Yvonne Parker, 16, and Juliet Marion Hulme, 15.

BLANKET SENTENCE

As they are under 18, their crime is not punishable by death. They were ordered "detained at Her Majesty's pleasure." Such a blanket sentence is often used in British courts in cases involving adolescents, where there is a chance conditions may change later and a review would be warranted.

A 12-man jury found them guilty after deliberating 90 minutes. The verdict came at the end of a six-day Supreme Court trial in Christchurch.

The girls left the dock for their prison cells solemn and dejected looking. Juliet, tall and blue-eyed, had sat with her fingers in her ears as the prosecutor made his closing statement.

CLAIM INSANITY

The defense said there was no doubt the girls killed Pauline's mother, Mrs. Honora Mary Parker, with a brick knotted in a stocking, but it was contended the pair were insane.

Storm Still Drifting Off U.S. Coast

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Communities along the 350-mile coastline of Georgia and the Carolinas remained on the alert Saturday night as the Atlantic hurricane continued its aimless flailing of open ocean waters.

The storm spun its winds around its calm central eye at a velocity between 100 and 115 miles an hour, but with practically no forward movement. It was centered about 260 miles east of Jacksonville.

Cecil Gentry, storm forecaster in the Miami Weather Bureau, said the tropical hurricane, named Carol for the third letter of the alphabet, actually was moving around in a circle.

This third storm of the season may be losing some of its intensity, said Gentry. Its eye has become poorly defined and clouds have formed in it.

The advisory late Saturday said the storm was centered about 260 miles east of Jacksonville.

"Indications are for very slow movement for the next 24 hours with direction of drift indefinite," it stated.

NEWSMAN DIES

RIDGEFIELD, Conn. (AP)—Richard Manson, 53, general manager of the New York Post, died Friday night at the home of friends here. A medical examiner said death was due to a cerebral hemorrhage.

Red Spy Suspect Plunges to Death

TOKYO (AP)—A foreign office official who was a key figure in the Soviet espionage ring in Japan leaped to his death from a fourth floor window Saturday while being questioned by government officials. Nobunori Higurashi was arrested Aug. 14 on charges he sold U. S. military information to Yuri Rastvorov, the former Russian secret agent who asked and received political asylum in the United States.

He leaped from a fourth floor window of the Tokyo procurator's office seconds after Prosecutor Taro Hase had finished his questioning. Witnesses said he suddenly removed his shoes, leaped onto a desk and plunged through the window while officials tried to stop him. He died soon afterwards in a hospital.

Mined by Soviets

BONN, Germany (AP)—The Russians have produced enough uranium in East Germany since the war to make 44 atomic bombs, a West German government survey said Friday.

German scientists estimate this number of bombs could destroy or cripple every major city in the United States or in West Europe, the survey said.

The uranium has been mined exclusively within territory held by the United States Army when World War II ended and later turned over to Soviet occupation, the survey said.

Officials tried to stop him. He died soon afterwards in a hospital.

IMPORTANT LINK

Higurashi, 44, was a former secretary in the Foreign Office European-American Affairs Bureau and once served with the Japanese embassy in Moscow. Authorities called him an important link in Japanese-Soviet espionage complicity and said their spy hunt would be hampered by his death.

Higurashi was described as a "Soviet expert" by his former colleagues at the foreign office and a "quiet gentleman" by his neighbors. He suffered a nervous breakdown recently and his attorney said he was "particularly about even the smallest matters."

FACED LIGHT PENALTY

The lawyer, Isamu Hiramatsu, who was supposed to meet him after the questioning, said Higurashi had been in good spirits and that he noticed nothing unusual. He expressed surprise at his death since Japan has no espionage laws and the stiffest penalty he could have received for giving away government secrets was imprisonment of not more than a year in jail or a fine of about \$75.

Higurashi was one of three Japanese officials arrested since Rastvorov said in Washington earlier this month that "medium high" Japanese officials were part of the Soviet spy apparatus. Rastvorov was stationed in Tokyo when he asked the United States for asylum.
