

EDC Dismissal

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Leading force the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). Many deputies who supported the European army swore to vote against German rearmament without the controls EDC would have provided.

French Premier Pierre Mendes-France already has said he would go along with the speedy restoration of sovereignty to West Germany, but he has emphasized that this endorsement does not include rearmament.

Any British-American effort to bypass the French on this likely would precipitate a crisis in the North Atlantic Alliance. The British-American plans for restoring German sovereignty so far have specified that rearming must wait.

Canadian officials in Ottawa said the only logical answer to the Western dilemma was to bring West German into NATO.

In Rome, Italian Vice Premier Giuseppe Saragat called on the Western democratic nations to renew their efforts to reward their solidarity in order to build an efficient community for peace and defense. Italy and France were the only members of the EDC alliance which had not ratified the pact, but the Italians had been expected to approve it this fall.

On the AFL side approval still must come from the pine workers in Eastern Washington.

The original proposal, made by Gov. Langlie of Washington last week, would have the men return work while a seven-man board mediates the strike. Details of the proposal were tentatively approved by the AFL but rejected by the IWA.

GOVERNOR OPTIMISTIC
Presumably the talks this week are resulting in some changes.

Gov. Patterson of Oregon was optimistic and an industry spokesman predicted an end to the strike Wednesday.

As of Wednesday morning, during new developments, these operations will be the only ones still closed in Lane County: Springfield — Booth-Kelly, Coast Plywood (logging mill).

Eugene — Associated Ply. Campbell - McLean Ply. J. P. O'Neil, Seneca Lumber Sales, Central Manufacturing (last two are under the same management).

Siuslaw area — Long-Bell's at Vaughn, Patten-Bilinn at Joyce, Siuslaw Forest Prod. (U. S. Plywood) at Maple, Ausman Bros. and Consumer Co-op, Swisshome.

Cottage Grove area — Booth-Kelly's Row River Division, Booth's sawmill and plywood.

The leaves about 2,300 men in county still on strike, compared to about 6,000 men in more than 40 mills when the strike began June 21.

NOT SETTLED
Only one of the 14 operations still down is AFL. That is Long-Bell. The other 13 are IWA-CIO firms.

Four other operations have not settled with the unions, but are working behind picket lines with full or partial crews. Two of them are AFL mills. They are Ausman Bros. and Long-Bell's plant. The other two — West Lane and Mt. June — are IWA operations.

The unions have gotten at least temporary pay increases in most of the 25 settlements in the county. In other cases men have gone back to work pending fact-finding — or after agreeing to accept the regional rate when it is set.

ing the yellow dust during the 1890s.

He acts like a man who has money, but won't tell exactly how he made it. Not prospecting though—Herbert Hoover's the only man who made money and kept it . . . The rest of us made it and got rid of it."

With Hawks in the room of the Eugene Hotel Monday was Martin Shedd, Eugene resident who has been a friend of Hawks many years. Shedd's father and uncle were buddies and co-workers of Hawks' during the old days.

Hawks' favorite story is how he organized the first annual Sourdough Reunion near San Francisco in 1927.

As president of the Alaska-Yukon Club of the bay area, Hawks set up the confab. His group anticipated several hundred but ended up feeding nearly 600 the huge barbecue, complete with sourdough biscuits and other Klondike specialties.

Nowadays, the reunion is a going thing, with cities competing to have the show. Lots of "fakers" claiming to be Klondike veterans show up and join the show. But there aren't many of the 1897 variety left.

"If you've seen the ice break up at least once, you're a genuine," Hawks says.

Hawks is genuine. At 90, he's a walking evangelist of the days when men were men and Klondike Kate made 'em homesick.

Persons having sheep and goats to exhibit may call Petzold at 4-4697 if they have questions about exhibiting.

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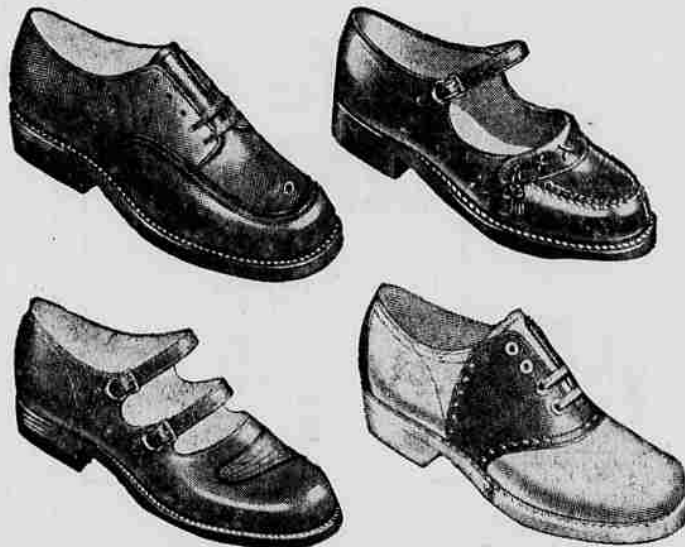
