Federal Budget Business Mirror

NEW YORK — Business now has a pretty good view of its prospects in coming months in the mirror held up by the U.S. budget.

1. Gross profits are down—and apparently Washington puts little faith in their improving very much before next summer.

2. The government's purse-strings are being loosened deliberately to give business a nudge—the Treasury will pay out more for non defense items such as roads, housing, shipbuilding, loans to farmers than it originally planned; and defense contracts this fiscal year will be handed out in twice the volume as last year.

3. The Treasury's "cash budget" instead of being balanced as originally planned, will run two billion dollars in the red—meaning that Washington will pump that much more money into the economy than it will be taking out in taxes.

The nudge for business is going to cost more than the Treasury first thought, in spite of a notable saving in over-all defense spending.

PROFITS DOWN
But the real setback that is sending the Treasury deficit well above earlier estimates comes from Uncle Sam's being a full-time partner in business profits.

He gets a little more than half of the gross earnings. And when they drop it hurts him more than it does the stockholders.

That shows up clearly in the earnings reports of corporations this year. While many companies did better than a year ago, the majority show a drop in gross earnings, reflecting the general setback in business activity.

They also show striking savings in tax payments. In many instances this came about from the end of the excise profits tax. But also it reflects the fact that when sales slide off the gross earnings drop, the first to feel it is the U. S. Treasury.

So great have been the tax savings of some companies this year that their net profit after taxes has been down hardly any—in a few cases has even risen. This has let most firms maintain their dividend payments to the stockholders and in some cases to increase them.

WILL BORROW

The Treasury, on the other hand, now expects to take in almost three billion dollars less in corporate income taxes than it did last fiscal year.

The government will have to borrow more money — much of it probably in the form of tax anticipation certificates, so that it can stay within the federal debt limit. And it may have to ask the next Congress to raise that limit again.

A fast step-up in the pace of business this winter — meaning more tax payments — might change that outlook. But apparently the Treasury isn't counting on it.

ACME FAST FREIGHT

610 Willamette St., has announced filing of an application with the Interstate Commerce Commission seeking a reduction in rates, effective Nov. 10, for freight shipped to the Eugene area from points east of the Mississippi River. Bob Tracy, general agent for the freight company here, reports that the move is intended to place Eugene, Junction City, Springfield and other local points on a par with Portland by eliminating charges for the Portland-Eugene haul. Tracy reports that Acme now is handling mixed carloads of freight, assembled at St. Louis and shipped here direct for unloading and local delivery through services of Pierce Freight Lines. Such cars, Tracy says, are reaching Eugene five days after leaving St. Louis. Others, from New York, are arriving in from seven to nine days.

MRS. GERDA JANE Groat

of the Eugene F. W. Woolworth store is en route to Honolulu, T. H., in a group of 30 Woolworth girls who are going to Hawaii via United Airlines to assist in the opening of Hawaii's first Woolworth store late in October. In charge of personnel in the local store for the past four years, Mrs. Groat will remain in the islands until Christmas and then return to her post here. William H. Lush, manager of the Eugene store, reports that this is the 12th time that Mrs. Groat has been called on to help open a new Woolworth store. She is a member of the Eugene Business and Professional Women's Club.

OAKRIDGE
