U of O Band To Entertain At Grid Tilt

The University of Oregon marching band will make its first public appearance for the 1954-55 season at the Oregon-Utah football game Saturday, according to Marian Cass, band publicity director.

The band is under the direction of Robert Wagner and Ira Lee, his assistant.

Made up of over 100 pieces, the Oregon unit is unique in that it is the only college band on the coast that includes an all-women's marching unit. There are 72 men in the all-men's band, while the women's group has 30 at present. The two bands work together as one unit and will be seen at all home games this fall and at the Oregon-Southern California game in Multnomah stadium Oct. 16.

The women's uniforms differ in color from the men's band and are very effective in making contrasting colors in formations, according to Miss Cass. The half-time show this Saturday will be based on an Indian theme and the bands will make formations of a teepee, an Indian moon, a tomahawk and an Indian war dance, performed by the women's section.

the sputtering jeeps, the spreading tents, the ringing axes, and the campfire smoke in Indian summer means it's time to move.

GENERAL SEASON

Nimrods in the eastbound caravan as well as those who stayed to meet Saturday's dawn in western Oregon will be in the woods until Oct. 21. General buck season ends Oct. 18 and then it will be hunter's choice for three more days. Other special hunts are slated for those successful in drawings.

And for the first opening in several seasons, Oregon's hunters will be near portable radios to learn what is happening in a ballpark in Cleveland instead of awaiting word from the state capitol. Most of the state had plenty of rain in late summer and Gov. Paul Patterson assured hunters several days ago there wasn't enough fire danger to threaten delay of opening day.

High temperatures, east winds, and low humidity in the past few days have brought a note of caution, however, from State Forester George Spaur. Some of the

southern slopes are drying rapidly and Spaur said a few hazardous areas would be closed.

Much of the open country in eastern Oregon is dry, while the timber cuttings west of "the mountain" continue to dry in clear weather. Dampness means less rattle in the brush west of the Cascades and that helps a hunter get closer to his deer.

LITTLE CHANGE

Little change in weather is in sight, according to the weather bureau, whose five-day forecast called for little or no rain except for some showers in the extreme southwestern corner early next week. Chilly mornings throughout the state, including 40-50 minimum in the valley and below freezing on the eastern side, will induce hunters to wear longies at daybreak and regret it later in the day.

And forest officials note hunters have tended to be careless with fires after cool, damp weather. Abandoned or neglected fires caused nearly half of last year's man-caused blazes on lands protected by the U. S. Forest Service in the Northwest, says Kermit Linstedt, regional fire control chief.

Two mild winters in a row promise good hunting, for the mule deer in the sagebrush and pine of eastern Oregon as well as the blacktail and whitetail in the vine maple and fir of the western side. The game commission looks for the highest success in the northwest corner of the state, where Wallowa County provided deer last season for 73 per cent of its hunters. Baker, Grant, and Union counties also are expected to absorb lots of tags.

BUSH WIGGLE

In central Oregon, deer population is high in Ochoco, Deschutes, and Fremont National Forests.

Despite warnings year after year by state police and other enforcement agencies, some of the hunters will walk into the brush and be carried out. Eight were killed and 22 were wounded last season in Oregon. "Brush wiggle" shots were fatal to three who were mistaken for game.

Most crowded woods in Lane County are expected to be around Wendling on the east side, Lorane in the central part, and Triangle Lake in the coast range.

Man Denies Zoning Charge

A zoning controversy that has plagued the Lane County Planning Commission for several months was brought into district court Wednesday with the filing of a complaint by the county.

The man, Charles Buckle, pleaded not guilty in district court Wednesday afternoon on a charge of "unlawfully maintaining and using" a building located at the southwest corner of 50th Place and the McKenzie Highway for the purpose of maintaining and storing industrial vehicles.

The complaint said the building is located in a commercially zoned area and that the storing of industrial vehicles is not allowed in a commercial zone.

A trial date was scheduled for the court's first open date, but the court docket indicated no time will be available until sometime in January.

Neuberger Left Winger, Nixon Says

ALBANY, N. Y. (AP)—Vice President Nixon, campaigning for Republican candidates, referred this week to two Oregon political figures as "left wing" Democrats.

Nixon, grouped Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon with Adlai Stevenson, 1952 Democratic presidential candidate, and Stephen Mitchell, Democratic national chairman, as the three "left wing" leaders of Democratic forces.

Earlier at a news conference when Nixon was asked to name some Democratic candidates he considered as "left wing" he included Richard L. Neuberger, who is running for the Senate in Oregon.

Neuberger, asked to comment on Nixon's statement said: "I'll match my record for patriotism and devotion to my country with that of Guy Cordon or Mr. Nixon at any time or any place. I think the public must be getting sick of these personal smears. It is significant that one of the main henchmen of my opponent recently said in Oregon, 'A high level campaign is fine until you start to lose.' I'll stick to the real issues."

Singer Fined \$263 For Drunk Driving

VAN NUYS, Calif. (AP)—Baritone Lawrence Tibbett was fined \$263 Thursday on his guilty plea to a charge of drunk driving.
