

Scholarship Checks Sent As Eppenbaugh Memorial

Receipt of a number of checks for use as scholarships in lieu of a memorial to Lloyd Eppenbaugh, late manager of the Children's Hospital School in Eugene, was reported by Mrs. Carl Phetteplace, who temporarily is filling the place at the school.

One of the latest of these came from the staff of the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation in Eugene, under which Mr. Eppenbaugh served, before taking the position.

A note from C. F. Feike, state director, said: "Those of us who have known Lloyd during the years he has been in Oregon were saddened by the news of his death. His work as a counselor with this division was of the highest, and we recognized in him a conscientious individual who was committed to the service for the handicapped. We have made up a gift that we are sending in your care that it may be applied toward any memorial or future recognition of Lloyd's work with the Children's Hospital School."

In explanation of scholarships, Mrs. Phetteplace said that it costs \$40 per month per child for tuition, to meet the cost of upkeep, supplies, services and buses. Part of the costs of foster home care for the children who come from other towns is supplied by welfare agencies in their home counties, she noted. Other children are unable to attend the school for lack of these funds.

A number of individuals about Eugene have made it a personal obligation to send a small sum each month to the school for this purpose. Twenty full tuition scholarships of \$40 each are the goal of the school for the year to meet the needs of the children now enrolled, but the smaller sums which pay a portion of one scholarship are most welcome, she said, as all add up to the total. Some organizations pay a full or half scholarship each month. These contributions also are tax-exempt, she remarked.

Salaries of the three teachers and the speech therapist are met from public school funds, but those of the 10 other persons who comprise the staff—medical, therapeutic, administrative and in maintenance—must be met by the institution.
