

Mitchell Raps Nixon Talks

Says 'Truthfulness'
Becoming an Issue

Democratic National Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell says Vice President Nixon's truthfulness is becoming an issue in the battle for control of the next Congress.

Mitchell Tuesday renewed his public feud with Nixon, saying the vice president's campaign statements about security risk firings have been distortions amounting to "deliberate falsehoods."

Addressing the National Press Club in Washington, Mitchell asked whether President Eisenhower is "going to continue to countenance" Nixon's statements.

The vice president, swinging through Iowa, told a Mason City audience Tuesday night that the Eisenhower administration is "still hotly engaged against the spokesmen for big government and socialist tyranny."

CRUCIAL ELECTION

Nixon said the Nov. 2 balloting will determine "whether our 20-month task has been in vain."

Eisenhower and top GOP congressional leaders will huddle at Denver Friday for a political powwow that may bring a decision to enlarge the President's role in the campaign.

The Denver white house announced Tuesday that Eisenhower is considering adding "several" talks to his pre-election schedule—a step advocated by some party leaders who see the GOP in a "tough fight."

At Watertown, N.Y., Sen. Irvin Ives, the Republican candidate for governor, Tuesday night was the target for a shower of tomatoes at an open air rally. The fruit missed him but splattered his wife, Marian.

Ives said angrily the tomatoes "came by indirection straight from Tammany Hall... the outfit which is running this campaign on the Democratic side." Ives' opponent is Averell Harriman, former foreign aid chief.

'TOO LONG IGNORED'

Gov. Allan Shivers of Texas jabbed at both major parties in a New Orleans talk. "The South has been too long ignored by one, too quickly forgotten by the other," and made to "crawl in humiliating submission" by both, Shivers said.

The Texan, a Democrat who supported Eisenhower in 1952, called on all 48 states to battle for states' rights, "the last great safeguard of our individual liberty."

Shivers addressed a testimonial dinner for Gov. Robert Kennon of Louisiana.

Accord Reached In N. Y. Dock Strike

NEW YORK (AP)—The Independent International Longshoremen's Assn. officially accepted Wednesday a compromise pay agreement and announced its 25,000 striking members would return to work Thursday morning.

A tentative settlement was reached Tuesday night, less than 24 hours after the strike began, but pickets returned to all piers Wednesday morning pending formal action of the union's Wage Scale Committee.

A union letter to John V. Lyon, president of the New York Shipping Association, announced the ratification.

Union Vice President Patrick J. Connelly said work could not resume until 8 a.m. Thursday because ILA locals must ratify the Wage Scale Committee's action. The settlement gives longshoremen a retroactive pay boost of eight cents an hour for each hour they have worked since Oct. 1, 1953, when their last contract expired.

The agreement brings longshore wages to \$2.35 an hour. An additional two-cents-an-hour contribution to the union welfare fund has been paid since April 1 by the employers. A union demand that this payment also be made retroactive to last October was dropped in the final settlement reached shortly after 10 p.m. Tuesday night after day-long mediation by Federal Mediator John A. Burke and city labor and marine commissioners.

Port officials estimated losses from the day and one-half long strike at more than \$1,500,000. With agreement on wages came the promise of a 30-day labor

truce on the New York waterfront.

Management agreed to the wage settlement on condition strikers return immediately to work and the union begin talks on a new contract. Shippers proposed and the union agreed that there would be no strike for at least 30 days while new contract talks are in session.

The 25,000 members of the ILA have been working without a contract since Oct. 1, 1953. During most of that time the union has been embroiled in a jurisdictional dispute with an AFL union set up to take control of the dock workers on a corruption clean-up program.

Sack Returned To Portland

PORTLAND (AP)—George Sack, sentenced to be executed Dec. 10 for the slaying of his wife, was on the way to the death house at the state prison Tuesday when a judge ordered him returned to the Multnomah County jail.

Judge Frank J. Lonergan, granted a request from Sack's attorney, John Patrick Hannon, that Sack be held in Portland while a petition for a new trial is being prepared.

Officers were taking Sack to the prison at Salem when Lonergan signed the order. The Multnomah County sheriff's office contacted the car at Woodburn and Sack was returned to jail here.

Sack was convicted of first degree murder last week in the Feb. 16 suffocation death of his wife, Goldie Goodrich Sack.

Guards Picket Indiana Prison

Union, State Officer
Meeting Wanted

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind. (AP)—Off-duty guards picketed the Indiana State Prison early Wednesday in a protest aimed at getting state officials to meet with their union representatives.

The midnight shift of guards went to work in normal strength, but members of the outgoing shift formed picket lines soon after midnight.

Merle Griffith, vice president of the International Guards Union, said the postmidnight demonstration was not ordered by the union, but he added, "The strike is on."

TROOPS ALERTED

Griffith had said earlier he had telegraphed Gov. George M. Craig stating that a walkout might come at 7 a.m. Wednesday if the governor did not agree by that time to meet with union representatives. Griffith indicated that a limited number of guards would be left on duty to feed the 2,300 prisoners and to keep them under surveillance. The prison employs about 190 guards.

National Guard units stood by in armories at Gary ready to move in any emergency, and other units at Valparaiso and Whiting were on a four-hour alert. State police also were ready to mass troops at the prison quickly if necessary.

NO CONCESSION

Gov. Craig said in response to the union's ultimatum:

"We won't recognize the union now or at any time in the future, and we won't recognize anyone else who seeks to turn people against the government."

"You can't strike against the government, and Griffith might just as well find out about it now," the governor added.

Hugh P. O'Brien, chairman of the State Board of Corrections, handed the guards on the midnight shift cards stating, "I will (will not) be loyal to the state of Indiana." The guards were asked to check one answer and sign the cards.

Two guards, John Kring of Michigan City and Henry Pearson of Laporte, Ind., said they were fired on the spot for refusing to sign the cards.

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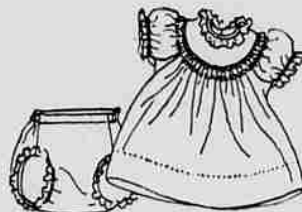
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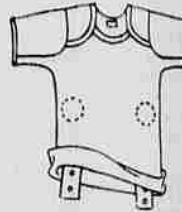

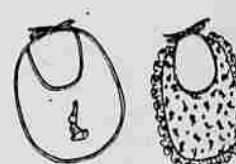
