American Troops Begin Leaving Trieste Territory

TRIESTE (AP)—The first Allied contingent left Trieste territory Thursday as British and American military officers shifted their departure plans into high gear.

An advance American party pulled out in a 12-truck convoy for Leghorn, Italy. All 5,000 Allied troops are expected to be gone by at least Oct. 28, in accordance with the Italian-Yugoslav agreement Tuesday to return the present British-American occupied Zone A to Italy.

Although a few occupation personnel left by private automobiles Wednesday, the departure of the U. S. convoy Thursday morning was the first sizable Allied movement. The advance party will prepare Leghorn, a port on Italy's west coast, as a staging area for the 3,000 American troops now in Trieste.

Cherry Tree Donor Dies In Yokohama

TOKYO (AP)—Yokio Ozaki, Japan's oldest and most militant crusader for democracy, and donor of the famed cherry trees in Washington, D. C., died in a peaceful coma Wednesday at his home near Yokohama. He was 95.

Ozaki, known as the "god of constitutional politics," served 61 consecutive years in the Japanese Diet. He won his first Diet seat in 1890 when Japan's first constitutional government was formed, and last served in 1952 under the country's postwar constitution.

In Washington, the U. S. State Department expressed formal regret at the passing of the "grand old man of Japanese politics." Walter S. Robertson, asst. Secy. of State for Far Eastern affairs, said Ozaki "came to represent the finest type of Japanese civic leader and public official, continually working for the cause of popular democracy and international understanding."

Ozaki probably was the Japanese best known in the United States. He presented the cherry trees to Washington 46 years ago, when he was mayor of Tokyo, as a gesture of appreciation of American friendship.

Rabbi Replies To Rally Critic

NEW YORK (AP)—Rabbi Benjamin Schultz, answering a protest against the scheduling of a pro-McCarthy demonstration in Washington on Veterans Day, Nov. 11, said Thursday it will be a "solemn convocation" and there will be "no picketing and no marching in the physical sense."

He said there is nothing "partisan or political" in the plan.

Rabbi Schultz, head of the Joint Committee Against Communism in New York State, issued a statement here in reply to a telegram he received from Rufus H. Wilson, national commander of the American veterans of World War II (Amvets).

Wilson protested Wednesday against choice of Veterans Day for the so-called "March on Washington" to oppose Senate censure of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Rabbi Schultz had said the demonstration in Washington is being spearheaded by his joint committee, which he described as a group of 75 leaders of veterans and patriotic organizations acting as individuals.

Wilson said in a telegram to sponsors of the demonstration: "We take no sides on the political dispute regarding McCarthy censure charges, but must emphatically protest desecration of Veterans Day for partisan political purposes."

Group Head Gets Warning

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Dist. Atty. Richardson Dilworth says he will order the arrest of Bryant Bowles, head of the National Assn. for the Advancement of White People, if Bowles tries to sponsor anti-integration meetings here.

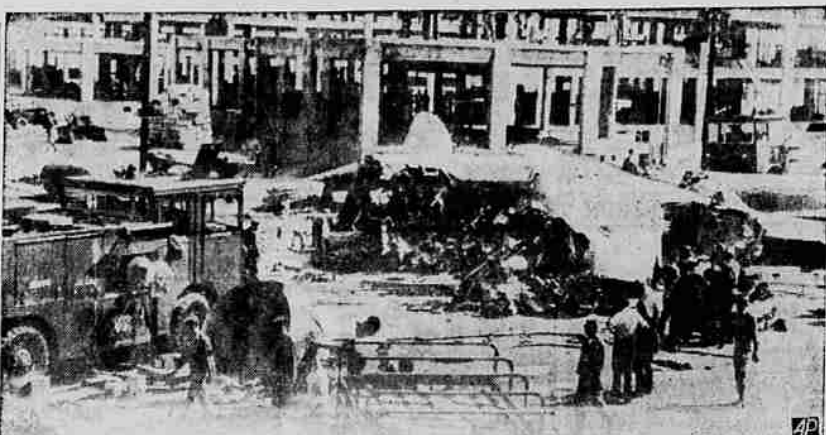
Dilworth said Wednesday that he had seen and heard Bowles claim on television that "he was coming here to do the same job he claims to have done in Milford, Del., Baltimore and Washington."

"I think Mr. Bowles should be notified right now that if he pursues the tactics in Philadelphia that he attempted in those other cities, I shall promptly issue an order for his arrest for inciting to riot. He will be given no opportunity to foul up racial relations in our city."

Bowles said on Tuesday that he was planning to hold a NAAWP organizational meeting here. He was in the city briefly and left without announcing further plans.

Log Trucker Killed

GRANTS PASS (AP)—A log from a load being hoisted onto his truck fatally injured Stanley H. Williams, 36, a driver for Stumbo Bros. Logging Co., near here Wednesday. The log fell when a cable broke, striking Williams' back. He was taken from the logging operation to Glendale but a doctor pronounced him dead on arrival.

U.S. Reported To Oppose Plane Attacks

TAIPEH, Formosa (AP)—Rumors that Nationalist China has suspended bombing attacks on the Communist mainland at the request of the United States circulated here Thursday.

There was no confirmation from either U. S. or Nationalist sources. But there have been no announced bombings of Red mainland bases for several days.

The U. S. embassy and military mission here professed to know nothing of such a request and Chinese officials refused comment.

After Red batteries shelled the Nationalist island of Quemoy for five hours Sept. 3, Nationalist planes and warships bombed and shelled Communist Amoy and other Red bases in the area daily for about a month.

The past few days, however, patrolling Nationalist planes and ships reportedly have not attacked small concentrations of Communist troops along the mainland coast or targets on the mainland.

Newspapers here called the China mainland "a new Yalu sanctuary," a reference to U. N. Command orders barring Allied pilots from attacking Communist bases in Manchuria, across the Yalu River from North Korea, during the Korean War.

Elks Set Season's First Formal Dance

The Eugene Elks Lodge will have its first formal dance of the year Saturday in the Elks Temple.

Music will be by Freddie Yahn and his orchestra and the dance will run from 9:30 to 12:30.

Bill Bakewell, the lodge's publicity man, said Wednesday that this dance will be formal, not semi-formal as in past years.

He said women are to wear cocktail dresses or formals and the men should wear tuxedos or dark suits with bow ties. However, a bow with any suit is permissible, he said.

Justice Resigns As Reed Trustee

PORTLAND (AP)—State Supreme Court Justice James T. Brand disclosed Wednesday he had resigned from the Reed College board of trustees just after Duncan S. Ballantine quit as president last month.

Brand, a board member 12 years, made public a letter saying he resigned because of the faculty's dominance and attitude toward communism and toward the president's office.

MOORE DISMISSED

"I cannot," he wrote, "... continue my connection with the college, delightful as it has been, so long as the group which appears to dominate the school continues to show itself so enamored of the dogma of academic freedom that it fails to appreciate the fact that all freedom is in peril as a result of the Communist conspiracy."

In the letter to the board he noted that the Reed faculty council had backed up Dr. Stanley Moore, recently dismissed by the board because Moore refused to answer its questions about charges that Moore had had Communist connections.

Brand quoted Moore, who was named as a one-time Communist by a witness at a House un-American activities subcommittee hearing in June, as having made a statement that "Communist affiliations of a professor at Reed should be a matter of no concern to the governing body of the college."

Moore, the judge said, had the right to do this and so, perhaps, did the faculty council have a right to come to his defense.

DRAWS CONCLUSION

Brand said that when Ballantine resigned after disagreements with the faculty, he came to the conclusion that "no president can survive at Reed College if his conception of the office goes much beyond that of a money raiser and a moderator of the meetings of the faculty council."

The justice praised Reed's achievements and hoped they would continue, adding that his letter was "in no sense written with an idea of hurting the college. I wrote it because I think it is something that should be said."

OBSTACLE

CHICOPEE, Mass. (AP)—James J. Gloster says he barely can get into his home because somebody left a two-family house on his front lawn.

Police investigating Gloster's complaint Wednesday found construction men were moving the house as soon as possible but he declared: "I'm not going to let them move it now. I'm bringing court action against them for trespassing."

Storm Brushes Dutch Islands

Path of Hurricane Still Uncertain

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Hurricane Hazel, small but violent, brushed by the Dutch West Indies islands off the coast of Venezuela Thursday and pointed westward in the Caribbean Sea.

Continuing its forward movement at 19 miles an hour, the season's eighth tropical storm was expected to increase slightly in intensity and size during the next few hours.

It packed winds of 100 miles an hour over a small area near the center. Gales extended outward 100 to 150 miles to the north and east.

SHIPPING WARNED

Northwest storm warnings were displayed in the Netherlands islands of Bonaire, Curacao and Aruba. All vessels in the path of the hurricane were advised to use caution.

Storm warnings were ordered hauled down in the Netherlands West Indies and along the Venezuela coast and its coastal islands.

No immediate land areas lay in the path of the storm, which was still more than 1,000 miles southeast of Florida.

Grady Norton, chief storm forecaster at Miami, said another 24 hours of watchful waiting would be needed before forecasters could tell "much about where this hurricane is going."

MAY CURVE NORTH

Norton said the hurricane probably would continue to move to the west northwest until it reached the longitude of Jamaica and Eastern Cuba.

"From here, it might curve to the north," he added.

Hurricane Hazel spawned from an easterly wave near the island of Grenada, at the southern end of the Windward Islands, Tuesday and moved steadily toward the west some distance off the Venezuelan coast.

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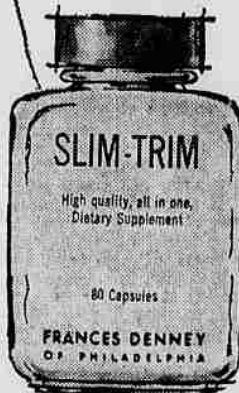
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
