He defended his department's role in the "Al Serena mining claim" case in Jackson County. That is a case, "broken" by Columnist Drew Pearson, in which the Republicans are charged with permitting mining operators to get a large tract of timber at a nominal price.

Part of Pearson's criticism of McKay was that the government rejected the assay of a government agency and accepted the opinion of a private firm which said there was sufficient ore in the timber land to make a mining operation worthwhile.

"I don't know if he can make a profit down there. It's none of my business. Maybe he's got nine boys that work for nothing for all I know. If he thinks he can make a profit, that's his decision."

Frost Covers Northern U.S.

It was a frosty morning over wide areas in the eastern third of the nation as a large mass of cool air pushed into the South and East Thursday.

But it was hot weather over Florida and along the Gulf coast with record breaking heat reported Wednesday in many Southern cities.

Below freezing temperatures were reported early Thursday in a belt from North Dakota and Minnesota eastward through Wisconsin, most of Michigan and upstate New York and most of New England. Readings were near freezing from a few sections of Northern Iowa and Northern Illinois.

Molotov Proposal Rapped

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pedo West German ratification of the recent London rearmament agreement.

Outlining his party's position to the West German Parliament, Socialist Chairman Erich Ollenhauer said the 151 Socialists in the Bundestag lower house would oppose the London pact as long as it contains no guarantee of German unity.

Similar Demands
Ollenhauer's demands differed little from Molotov's proposal, made on the eve of the fifth birthday anniversary of the Communist-ruled East German Republic.

Though Molotov did not specifically commit his government to free all-German elections, in effect he offered the Germans the hope they could reunify their country on that basis if they give up rearming and alliance with the West.

In contrast to that, Molotov repeatedly warned the West Germans that acceptance of the London agreement to give them sovereignty and arms within the NATO alliance would end all possibilities of reuniting their divided country.

At the Berlin conference early this year, the West proposed free all-German elections as the first steps towards unification. Under this plan negotiations for a peace treaty would follow the formation of an all-German government.

REJECTED BY REDS
Molotov turned the idea down then. He insisted instead on the immediate conclusion of a peace treaty which Western diplomats said would leave a unified Germany virtually defenseless on the Red army's doorstep and with East German Communists in key government posts.

In the United States, both the State Department and the Summer White House in Denver refused to comment on Molotov's speech.

Molotov as usual struck out against "aggressive circles in the United States," who he charged were fostering a policy leading to a new war.

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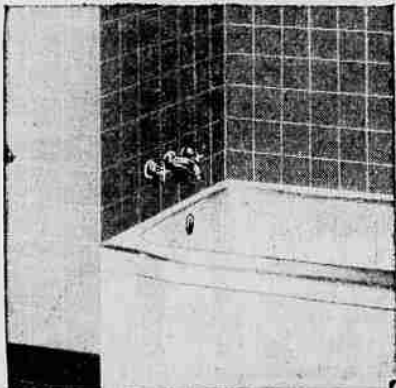
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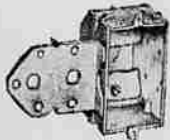
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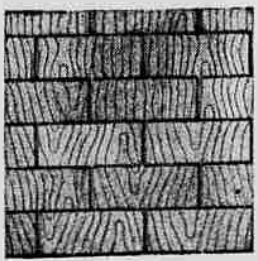
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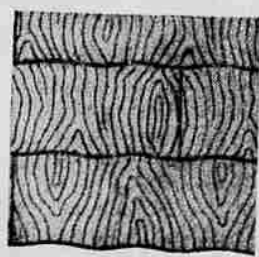
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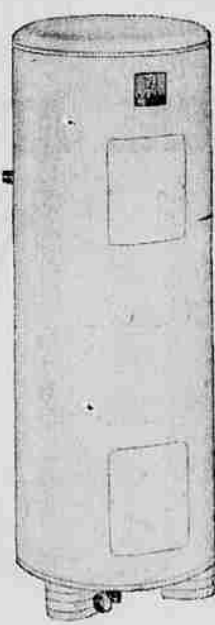


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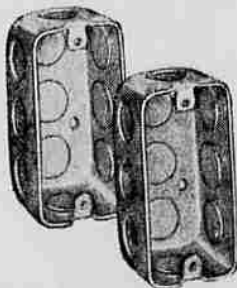
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
