

Macera Set For Kameroff

Luigi Macera, who had the tables turned on him by the Kameroff brothers after the talented Italian wrestler had beaten and crippled both, will take on Boris in a revenge headliner at the Armory arena Thursday night.

Boris, while Brother Ivan was in action, clobbered Macera so badly that the Italian was unable to return to the ring for the final fall, giving Ivan a technical decision. Macera, who specializes in an Italian backbreaker, predicts he can beat either of the brothers—one at a time. He gets his chance against Boris Thursday.

Luis Martinez, sensational Mexican who stole the show with his recent triumph over Angelo Poffo, will be meeting Ivan Kameroff in the semi-final. The local wrestling commission has warned the Russian villains they had best not team up against any one opponent this week.

Poffo will meet popular Dick Torio in the opening match, lifting the curtains at 8:30 p.m. Torio last week battled Jim LaRock to a draw.

The three-star mat program is expected to be one of the best-balanced shows Matchmaker Don Owen has arranged since the grappling sports was resumed here several weeks ago. The present crop of matmen is considered some of the best in the nation.

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Red Runners Face British

LONDON (AP)—Russian track stars made their first appearance in Britain since 1878 Wednesday when a heavily favored Moscow team clashed with a London team before a sell-out crowd of 45,000 at White City Stadium.

Russia finished first in the recent European track championships to establish itself as a strong threat to the United States in the 1956 Olympic games at Melbourne, Australia.

The Moscow team competing here Wednesday had virtually the same lineup as the Russian team that competed in the European championships. England finished second in the European games, but today's team appears much weaker than that squad, chiefly due to the absence of mile star Roger Bannister and the injury to long distance star Gordon Pirie.

Bannister, the World's first four-minute miler, was unable to compete in the 1,500-meter run because of his duties as a doctor. Pirie, who also missed the European games with a foot injury, has not yet fully recovered.

The meet was the fourth in a series of inter-city clashes organized by the London Evening News. The London team has won all three previous meets, defeating Paris, Stockholm, and Gothenburg, Sweden.

Powell Stays Top Prospect

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Charlie Powell, the 22-year-old ring giant who was stopped here last week, is still the best prospect the heavyweight division has produced in this country since Rocky Marciano.

Who says so? Fight experts who saw Powell suffer a seventh-round technical knockout at the hands of Charley Norkus say so.

Evaluation of the former San Francisco 49ers football player was still going on a week later. J. J. "Moose" Taussig, whose Willie Meehan thumped out a four-round decision over Jack Dempsey in 1918, said he thought Powell had a brilliant future. "Powell may be champion in a year or two," Taussig observed. "He's the best I've seen come along since Marciano."

Sid Flaherty, manager of middleweight champion Carl Bobo Olson, described Powell as a "fine prospect." Billy Newman, an old-timer in the game echoed these sentiments.

Powell showed that he could take a real clout on the jaw. He stood up under at least a dozen lefts and rights that would have felled an ox. He fought from the second round on with a dislocated finger on his right hand yet was ahead on points on all the cards at the end of the sixth.

This was Powell's 13th fight and all hands judged him a top prospect in spite of the defeat—his first.

Al Weill, manager of Marciano, was so impressed with Powell's ability he offered Sucey Welch \$25,000 for the big fellow's contract.

"If Charlie is worth that much to Weill he's worth twice as much to me," the manager snorted.

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You Be The Quarterback

Michigan, surprisingly enough, has been playing a 5-3-3 defense against Iowa's single wing offense. (Five men on line, three linebackers, three deep men; offense has four backs in same direction).

Michigan has a middle linebacker who is so good that the Wolverines have been able to use an unusually wide spacing with their middle men and still stop the straight plunge by Iowa's fullback, who is a fine runner.

It is the second quarter with four minutes to go, and Iowa trails, 7-0. It is first and 10 for the Hawkeyes on their own 45-yard line in the center of the field, as Iowa switches to its split-T formation.

As the Iowa quarterback, rate these plays 1, 2, 3 and 4 as the best exploratory plays against this defense: Quarterback keep play (quarterback runs parallel to line of scrimmage with possible pitchout wide). Handoff to halfback straight in over offensive tackle. Handoff to fullback over offensive end. Quarterback sneak. Page 3-D)

Llamas Gains Tennis Finals

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Defending champion Tony Trabert of Cincinnati and Swedish kingpin Sven Davidson met Wednesday to determine which one of them will meet surprising, spectacular Marlon Llamas of Mexico for the Pan American tennis crown.

Trabert defeated Davidson, 9-7, in the first set of their semifinals match Tuesday before rain caused play to be halted. The match will be continued from that point Wednesday.

Llamas, 22, became the first Mexican to reach the men's singles finals in the 13-year history of the tourney when he upset former U.S. singles champion Art Larsen of San Leandro, Calif., 1-6, 10-8, 9-7, 6-3, Tuesday. Prior to his victory over Larsen, the Mexican champion had eliminated Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, current U.S. singles champion.

Aussies Plan For Olympics

NEW YORK (AP)—Preparations for holding the 1956 Olympic games in Melbourne, Australia, are "running ahead of schedule," according to Sir Percy Spender, Australian ambassador to the United States.

Sir Percy made this disclosure Tuesday night in an address to a dinner sponsored by the United States Olympians, an organization of former Olympic athletes, which touched off a drive to raise \$1,000,000 for the 1956 U.S. Olympic team.

The question of whether or not Melbourne would be prepared to hold the '56 games as scheduled was so hotly debated early this year that the International Olympic Committee was forced to re-study the situation and reaffirm Melbourne as the site.

The Australian ambassador declared that Melbourne's \$7,000,000 program is well under way "with the full backing of the federal and state governments and the Melbourne City Council."
