

Morse Attacks Power Policies

JOSEPH, Ore. (AP)—If the Republicans win the congressional election next month, they will go on to even greater "give-aways" in the Pacific Northwest, Sen. Wayne Morse (Ind-Ore) asserted Thursday night.

He told the Tri-State Hells Canyon Assn. at a dinner meeting in this Northeast Oregon city that the election of Democrats was vital to ward off Republican plans.

Morse attacked the power policies of Interior Secretary Douglas McKay, Republican Sen. Guy Cordon and Republican Rep. Sam Coon of Oregon, and added:

"Scuttling Hells Canyon to clear the way for the Idaho Power Co. is not enough for Cordon, Coon and McKay. They advocate what they choose to call partnership."

This partnership would allow the private utility partners to save millions of dollars in interest alone, Morse said, citing the partnership proposal for John Day Dam on the Columbia River.

There private utilities would get all the power for a possible investment of 50 per cent, he said.

INTEREST RATE LOW

"Repayment to the federal government for the money the United States borrows—for which the taxpayers will pay interest—will be over a 50-year period, from power revenues. . . . Repayment would be at no more than 2 1/2 per cent interest, regardless of the actual cost to the government. The private utilities can't borrow money at that low rate. Over a 50-year period the interest savings alone would amount to millions of dollars. You can understand why the election of Cordon and Coon is a matter of the deepest concern to the private utilities," he said.

Morse then went after a proposal he said President Eisenhower advanced in his State of the Union message in January.

DOWNSTREAM BENEFITS

That was a proposal for legislation to require the federal government to pay for any benefits received at federal dams from upstream reservoirs.

Morse said if a private utility becomes a partner in the construction of Libby Dam in Northwest Montana after a downstream-benefit bill has passed, the private utility could "pay a substantial part of its costs by charging downstream federal dams for the release of its waters."

Puerto Rican Red Arrested

Fugitive Leader Nabbed in Texas

EDINBURG, Tex. (AP)—Ramon Mirabal Carrion, 41-year-old secretary general of the Puerto Rican Communist Party, was arrested by federal agents Thursday night at Hidalgo, Tex., just across the Rio Grande from Mexico.

Mirabal Carrion did not resist as he was apprehended by FBI agents on charges of conspiring to advocate the violent overthrow of the United States government.

He was the 11th leading member of the Puerto Rican Red Party to be arrested in the past three days. The others were apprehended in New York and Puerto Rico.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said Mirabal Carrion disappeared from his San Juan, Puerto Rico, residence last June 27 and entered the Communist Party's underground network. What he was doing in Hidalgo was not revealed.

Scott J. Werner, FBI agent in charge of San Antonio, Tex., district, refused to say if the Puerto Rican was leaving the United States or entering when arrested. Hidalgo and Reynosa, Mex., are joined by an international bridge.

Mirabal Carrion was arraigned Thursday night before U.S. Commissioner J. C. Hall in Edinburg, who set bond at \$25,000. The prisoner signed a waiver agreeing to removal to Puerto Rico and spent the night in the Hidalgo jail.

Werner said Mirabal Carrion would be transferred to Puerto Rico later, but he didn't know when that would be.

When arrested, the fugitive was neatly dressed in a gray suit, red tie and white shirt. He wore no hat. He told authorities he spoke no English and an interpreter translated his Spanish into English.

Jury Selection Continues At Sheppard Murder Trial

CLEVELAND (AP)—Six housewives and four men were in the jury box Friday as the murder trial of Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard moved into its fifth day.

With 10 jurors now tentatively seated, it appeared the state may be able to start presenting its case sometime next week. The state contends the slender osteopath clubbed his pregnant wife Marilyn, 31, to death after an affair with a pretty hospital technician, Susan Hayes, 24.

MAY BE CHALLENGED

Two more jurors must be picked before the prosecution and defense can use their peremptory challenges to dismiss jurors they do not want. Each side can dismiss six jurors without reason.

For the juror picked as an alternate, each side has two peremptory challenges.

Questioning of the prospective jurors has indicated that sex and circumstantial evidence will play big roles in the trial.

Defense Attorney William J. Corrigan and Fred W. Garmone have hammered away with questions on whether the jurors would be prejudiced against Sheppard because of his purported romance with Miss Hayes. The prosecution has stressed that Ohio law permits a first-degree murder conviction and a death sentence on only circumstantial evidence.

SUN AND SNOW

Corrigan called attention to a ray of light coming in the courtroom window and observed that "even though you don't see it, you know from the light that the sun is outside."

Method Found To Banish Fag Paper Irritant

NEW YORK (AP)—A researcher says there is a way to eliminate a reported cancer-producing substance in smoke from cigarette paper.

H. J. Rand, head of a Cleveland research organization, told a news conference here Thursday that his experiments show that treatment of cigarette paper with ammonium persulfate would prevent formation of benzpyrene, the reported cancer-causing element.

Existence of the benzpyrene in smoke from cigarette paper was reported almost simultaneously Thursday by Rand and D. V. Lefemine, chemist at the Cancer Institute, Miami.

Lefemine said the benzpyrene, which causes cancer in mice, has proved in animal experiments to be one of the most powerful known cancer-producing agents.

Rand said that while there had been some criticism of his findings on the treatment of cigarette paper, there were "good prospects" that some cigarette companies will start treating paper with the chemical.
