Senator's Daughter Enrolls for Nursing

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. — "Daddy warned me specifically to stay out of politics and keep my mouth shut," she said. "But I just couldn't do it." And therein lies the story of a new twist in the old saw "Like father, like son."

In the case of Miss Amy Morse, part 18-year-old freshman in the University of North Carolina school of nursing and youngest daughter of the controversial Oregon senator, Wayne L. Morse, the phrase should read, "Like daughter."

Despite the advice of her father, Miss Morse recently was swept into two elective positions on the UNC campus. She is vice president of the freshman nurse class and social chairman of the freshman class of the non-professional group.

Her political popularity was such that both student political parties, the University Party and the Student Party, were vying for her name on their respective ballots. Not bad for a girl whose chief ambitions are to "become a nurse and maintain an active participation in sports activities."

Amy is a native of Eugene, Ore., but has lived in Washington, D. C., since 1944 when her father was elected to the U. S. Senate from his post as dean of the University of Oregon school of law. The story of how the girl from Oregon's famed Willamette Valley decided to enroll at this southern university nearly 3,000

miles away is a tribute to the university.

"When I began shopping around for a school," she said, "I was looking for one that offered a four-year course leading to a B. S. degree in nursing, where the hospital was located within the campus so I could take part in campus activities, and above all I wanted to attend a school where nursing was respected just as much as a profession as law or medicine."

The three-year-old school of nursing at UNC met all her requirements and, after considering the fact that it would be closer to her family, she decided to enroll here instead of returning to her native University of Oregon.

Amy is like her father in more ways than winning elections. She is an avid sportswoman and attributes this to her father's influence. Both are excellent horsemen, and the Morse family are familiar figures at the Oregon State Fair, the annual Pendleton Roundup, and Oregon's Pacific International Horse Show. They also have won numerous ribbons at horse shows throughout the East.

She said she particularly looked forward to Sundays when she was home, because then she and her father usually visited the 50-acre farm in Poolesville, Md. On these visits she enjoyed work-outs with her five-gaited Palomino.

She is a member of the Chi Omega sorority, and is active in

the local Episcopal Church. One of her sorority sisters is another famous daughter, Laura Ervin, whose father, Sam J. Ervin, recently moved to Washington as senator from North Carolina.

Amy's social life is restricted largely to weekends because students in the school of nursing are required to maintain closed study in their dormitories beginning at 8 p.m. each week night, but she says she has been doing "very well" on weekends, when she is permitted to date until 11:30 p.m.

She says she loves the South, but she's not particularly impressed with the noted southern cooking because "I can't get used to all the grease Southerners use in cooking."

"I was mortified when I started eating grits at breakfast," she added with a laugh.

One of Amy's sisters, Nancy, also has been living in South Carolina, where she was married just before Christmas to Charles H. Campbell Jr. The remaining sister, 20-year-old Judith, is an art major at George Washington University in Washington, D. C.

In describing many of the disadvantages of being a senator's daughter, Amy pointed out that when her father attended a recent speaking engagement at nearby Duke University she managed to see him only for a minute before he was whisked away by the crowd.

"This isn't unusual," she said. "At home I never got to see him much either except on Sunday. He always was up before breakfast and headed for the office. We didn't see him again until midnight or later."

Amy says she would like to return to Oregon after graduation, and adds with a twinkle in her eye, that she's afraid she could never come to political agreement with the solidly Democratic South.

"I'm glad Dad became an Independent," she said, "because I'd sure have a rough time down here if he were still a Republican."
