

OSC Tops WSC 70-58

Huskies Beat Idaho 82-53; Parsons: 32

SEATTLE (AP) — Ron Olsen's great corner shooting in the first half cracked the Idaho zone and set up an 82-53 Washington victory Friday night over Idaho in the opening Pacific Coast Conference game of the season for both teams.

After Olsen's early display of gunnery, burly Dean Parsons came through with a second half scoring surge to apply the coup de grace.

The winning Huskies never trailed although Idaho's Vandals caught up twice in the early going, at 8-8 and 10-10. At that point, coach Harlan Hodges sent in Idaho's second platoon and before he could yank them out the score was 27-12. At halftime the Huskies were on top, 35-25.

ROUGH GAME
Although few fouls were called and only one player, Harlan Melton of Idaho, had as many as four, the game was rough at times and three technical fouls were called.

All three technicals were on Idaho and all for words the crowd did not hear but for which the referees supplied the music.

The Vandals held within 10 points through most of the second half but six minutes from the finish Washington put on a tally display, hitting 18 points while holding Idaho scoreless.

Parsons led the scoring with 32 points, Olsen had 18 and guard Bill Bauscher topped Idaho with 15. The two teams meet again tomorrow night.

FLU HITS
Olsen, usually a sub, started the game when Karl Voegtlin was benched by illness. Coach Tippy showed up against advice of his friends, heavily bundled in clothing to coddle a serious case of flu.

No coaching strategy was needed, however, as Olsen hit five out of eight shots from the corner in the first half. Sub forward Bobby Morris potted three from the opposite corner just to keep the defense honest.

Melton and J. Buehler each contributed 13 points to Idaho's total.

The technicals, all in the second half, were charged to Buehler, center Jim Sather and Guard Bob Falash.

Trojans, Indians Win SD Openers

Southern California opened defense of its Pacific Coast Conference basketball crown with a 63-56 victory over visiting California in one of two Southern Division games Friday night.

Stanford upset UCLA, 61-56, at Palo Alto and broke an eight-game drought against the Bruins that extended back to 1952.

California outscored USC from the floor, 24-19, on terrific display of basket shooting by the Bears' All American center, Bob McKeen, who netted 30 points for the contest, 14 in the first half and 16 in the second.

The Trojans maintained ball control most of the game and were able to score from the free throw line as they were given 39 free throws of which they made 25, the big edge in the game.

Roy Irvin, Trojan center, nabbed 19, for high point honors for SC. Tony Psaltis dumped in 10 out of 12 from the free throw line.

Stanford's Ron Tomsic hit from all sides of the court with his leaping one-handed push shots to lead all scorers with 21 points to keep his 21-point-per-game scoring average intact.

UCLA's Morris Taft scored 12 points in the first 20 minutes of play to spark a Bruin spree that gave them a 32-30 halftime lead, but the Indians came back and more than made up the deficit in the second half.

Willie Naulls led UCLA's scoring with 13 points.

GILL COLISEUM, Corvallis — Oregon State's prohibitive favorites were challenged until the last three minutes, 17 seconds by Washington State here Friday night before the Beavers posted a 70-58 decision over the Cougars.

In the opening Northern Division test for Slat's Gill's defending champions, the Beavers held the lead throughout the final 22 minutes 24 seconds, but Coach Jack Friel's invaders from the Palouse Hills trailed by only three points, 59-56, until Tony Vlastelica hooked in his fifth straight shot from the field for a five-point bulge with 3:17 remaining.

At no time did Gill use his two 7-foot hoop giants simultaneously, starting sophomore Phil Shadoin and sending Wade "Swede" Halbrook into the game with 7:05 remaining in the opening half — with WSC ahead 18-14. The 7-foot, 3-inch center, eligible for the first time this season, saw 22 minutes 19 seconds of action and collected 13 points.

LEAD CHANGES
A crowd of 6,689 fans watched the lead switch in the opening six minutes and the score was tied at 2, 4 and 8 before Bill Rehder put the Cougars in front for a lead they retained for more than 11 minutes. Longest WSC lead was 21-24 with 6:26 remaining in the initial period — just before Halbrook entered the game.

It was Halbrook's flat-footed tip-in of one of Vlastelica's early misses that gave the Beavers the lead for keeps, 24-23, with 3:43 remaining in the half — a lead OSC boosted to 29-24 at halftime. But it was little Ron Robins, starting senior guard, who kept OSC in the ball game during the first half with long set shots from the center and side — with four of his five field goals.

Ron Bennick, the Cougar "cat," scored the Beavers dizzy in the second half when he collected 20 of his 25 points. He and Rehder provided a one-two scoring punch, and except for a few fine assists from Bob Klock, that was it for the Cougars.

Friel, as usual, employed his unit substituting and Gill followed during most of the game. Regardless of Vlastelica's hot streak and the point-making of Halbrook and Robins, the key man for Oregon State was Jay Dean, a tower of strength on both boards.

GOOD AVERAGES
Both clubs had excellent shooting averages from the field, OSC .433 and WSC .400. Bennick and Rehder hit .500 and Bennick 11 out of 12 from the free throw line — to bring his scoring average to 19.1 points in three league games. Dean hit four for five and Halbrook six out of ten from the field.

In an experimental preliminary game that did away with elimination fouls, awarded points in lieu of free throws (as many as four points in some situations), the OSC Rooks defeated Lower Columbia JC 59-53. Only one player, for the losers, was charged with five fouls. Otherwise the game — designed by Gill — proved little.

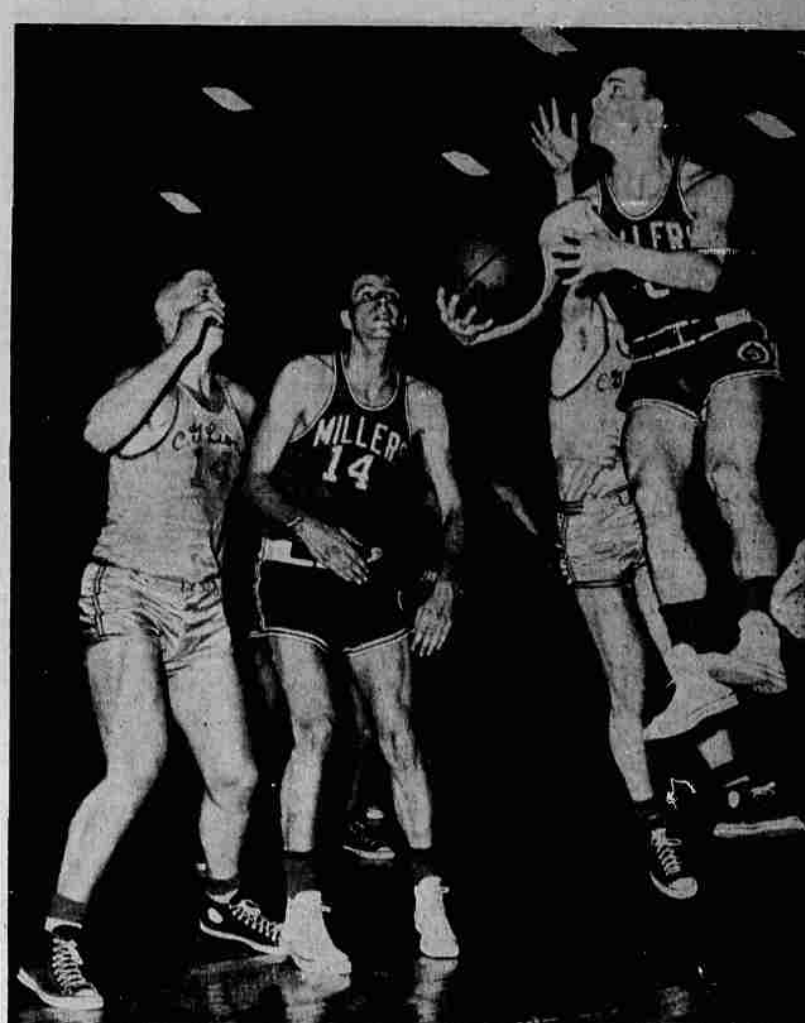
Newport Beats Siuslaw, 45-32

Axemen Beat Albany Zone

Eugene can win in fast company without center Mike Moran and Eugene can win in fast company without guard Bud Kuykendall.

Coach Henry Kuchera's Axemen, who earlier in the season defeated Corvallis without Moran, obviously missed Kuykendall in Friday night's non-league tussle with Albany but proved tough enough to whip the invading Bulldogs, 46-42.

Albany coach Tom Holman, with Kuykendall's howitzer and floorwork out of action because of a wrenched back suffered in Tuesday's victory over Corvallis, suggested his boys use a collapsing zone to muffle Moran. The Albany boys often collapsed every Bulldog on the floor against the 6-8 center but he found enough elbow room for 23 points.

And forward Leighton Tuttle proved indestructible and intolerable to the enemy as he spent enough time away from pileups to contribute 11 points on timely baskets and steady board work.

After 12 changes in the lead and 10 deadlocks, Eugene claimed a permanent lead at 32-31 midway in the third period but the Axemen were unable to build more than a five-point lead during the remainder of the battle.

Moran's two free throws brought Eugene from behind for the last time and then Guard Bob Anderson collected two points when the officials fined Albany center Buzz Wilfert for brushing Anderson's shot off the rim. A pair for free throws by Bulldog Pete Wilfert and then Moran's rebound flier left the Axemen in front by 36-33 at the start of the final period.

The difference remained three points midway in the fourth quarter after lay-ins by Moran and Larry Hughes matched a pair of fielders by Albany's fine forward, Rex Stamps. After a free throw by Albany's Bruce Ridinger, bruised and battered Tuttle contributed three free throws for a 43-38 margin.

Those poor girls screamed something awful as Albany moved within two points at 42-40 on Pat Emmons' set shot with 50 seconds left. And the place sounded like a pack of lions in a meat market when Tuttle broke loose for a clinching cripple shot.

The first quarter ended 8-7 for Albany after Stamps and Pete Wilfert connected to erase
