

Axemen Beat Albany Zone

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A 7-4 lead for Eugene. Moran, Tuttle, and forward Curt Myers had built a 20-17 margin for the Axemen with 1:30 but five consecutive points by Albany's Jerry Hazelwood against a set shot by guard Pete King meant a 22-22 deadlock at halftime.

Eugene hit on 14 of 39 shots against the Albany zone, while the Bulldogs hit 333 on 14 for 42. The Axemen collected 16 free throws in 21 attempts in claiming their winning margin at the foul line, while the losers were 12 for 23. Six straight free throws on three bonus shots by Moran kept Eugene in the game during the middle of the third quarter.

Stamps finished with 16 points, while Pete Wilfert added 12. Coach Duane Mellem's jayvees gave their best performance of the season in a 59-33 victory over the Bulldogs. Mel Olsen was impressive with 16 points and Dave Quivey produced 10 for the winners, while Gary Torgerson tallied 10 for Albany.

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EUGENE OUSTER URGED

YAKIMA, Wash. (AP)—The seven directors of the newly-formed Class B Northwest Baseball League were scheduled to huddle here Saturday, with verbal fireworks aplenty apparently in the offing.

The biggest threat to a harmonious meeting is a suggestion that one of the seven teams be dropped in order to simplify the scheduling of games.

Most of the talk has been aimed at the Eugene Emeralds, the only one of the seven present Northwest League members who wasn't in the old Western International League before it folded last year to re-form as the NWL.

Apparently backing the plan calling for the ouster of Eugene were Wenatchee, Tri-City and Spokane. Salem is expected to fight on Eugene's side. Uncommitted, at least for the record, are Yakima and Lewiston.

Art Pohlman, president of the NWL, refused to be drawn into the argument, commenting only:

"It's all up to the directors. We have a lot to do at the meeting."

In other NWL developments:
1. Curt Hagerty, president of the Spokane entry, announced his club has obtained an option to purchase Ferris Field, the diamond used by the Spokane team in the old Western International League. He gave no other details.

2. The Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast League and the NWL Wenatchee Chiefs announced a working agreement, with a number of Rainier youngsters going to the Chiefs on option. Edo Vanni, manager of Tri-City last year, was named to pilot Wenatchee.

Junction City opened its league season in fine style as the Tigers outscored the visiting Wolverines in every quarter and almost iced the contest in the second period when Willamette could score only four points on two field goals.

At the end of the first period Marv Plesner and Guard Stan Kenyon had the Tigers off to a 16-9 lead and by halftime they pushed the reading to 30-13 in favor of the home standing club.

Plesner, who was high for the game with 18 points, and Kenyon, who tallied 16 for the night, continued to drive the Junction City club to a commanding lead as the Tiger hammered 24 points home in the third stanza for a comfortable 54-28 advantage as the final stanza opened action.

Forward Tony Peterson also figured highly in the Junction scoring, looping in 12 points. Bob Foster made his first appearance in the Willamette lineup in nearly three weeks and led the Wolverine scoring with an even ten points.

SEASON LOOPHOLES PLUGGED

NCAA Committee To Settle Video

NEW YORK (AP)—A new television committee was to be chosen Saturday by the NCAA and entrusted with the delicate task of mapping out a football video program that will please some factions and appease others.

The committee, to be elected by the college group's freshly appointed council, was given a "blank check" by the convention Friday to settle one of the NCAA's "thorniest problems," as Father Edmund P. Joyce of Notre Dame put it.

In the next couple of months the committee will have to devise a program that will be satisfactory to the numerically powerful Eastern group, which wants some kind of a national "game of the week" schedule again, and the influential threatening Big Ten and Pacific Coast Conference alliance, which desire a combination of a regional and national program.

There was every indication as the convention adjourned Friday that a compromise might be effected. When the committee has completed its deliberations, it will send out its program for a mail vote by the members. A two-third vote is required for passage.

"The Big Ten probably will do nothing until a new plan comes down," said Michigan's H. O. "Fritz" Crier, leading spokesman for the Western Conference on the floor of the convention. It was the tall, gray-haired former coach who stirred up a tempest Thursday when he said the Big Ten might strike out on its own if a more liberal TV program was not forthcoming.

The Big Ten-Pacific Coast combine and its supporters didn't enjoy the parliamentary hassle on the floor Friday which wound up in a standing vote by the members on which of the listed TV plans they preferred.

By a whopping 4 to 1 margin the delegates expressed a preference for some kind of a national "game of the week" program over the Big Ten sponsored national-regional, four national programs proposal.

The NCAA also has formally defined college football and basketball seasons as 12-month periods, thus plugging any loopholes that may have allowed teams to play beyond schedule limitations by staging "off-season" contests.

Two amendments to rules dealing with pre-season practice schedules in the sports established the football fiscal year as beginning from Sept. 1 to Aug. 31. In basketball it's Dec. 1 to Nov. 30.

Members are restricted to 10 football games and 26 basketball games during a fiscal year, excluding NCAA approved post-season bowl games and tournaments, but including practice and scrimmage sessions which were not previously counted.

HAWAII HELPED
Also now included are overseas tours, with the exception of games against the University of Hawaii because "without the help of mainland schools, the University of Hawaii would have great difficulty rounding out a playing schedule."

In football, under the new rule, members who line up nine-game schedules will be permitted one practice or scrimmage session against another team. For those with 10-game schedules, however, such drills are out.

Post-season basketball tournaments are excluded from the 26-game basketball restriction only if completed before April 1.

NEW YORK (AP)—Everybody faults Floyd Patterson except the ring record book which shows 19 gaudy victories in 20 pro starts after Friday night's fifth round technical knockout over Willie Troy.

"He missed too much," said Troy, sixth-ranked middleweight contender from Washington, D.C., as he sat in his dressing room with a tightly closed left eye and an "egg" over the right lamp. "He couldn't knock out a middleweight," said a fight manager. But that was strictly a technicality for the ex-Olympic champ battered Troy with his quick, violent hands so that even Al Weill, the loser's manager, asked them to stop it.

It was strictly no contest at Madison Square Garden where two officials, referee Al Berli and judge Artie Aidala had it a 5-0 shutout until it was stopped. So did the AP. Judge Harold Barnes gave the first round to Troy, the only close round of the fight, and had it 4-1 at the end of five.

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Reprimand Denied By Woody Hayes

CHICAGO (AP)—Ohio State football coach Woody Hayes, who said four other Big Ten teams besides Ohio State were better than Southern California, Friday denied the NCAA had reprimanded him for his comments after the Rose Bowl game.

Hayes' Buckeyes defeated Southern Cal, 20-7, in the annual classic New Year's Day. "A report I was reprimanded by the NCAA is not true," Hayes said. "If so, they haven't got in touch with me yet."

The rumor apparently stemmed from a statement made by Bill Murray of Duke, chairman of the American Football Coaches Assn., at the annual NCAA convention in New York Thursday.

Seixas Wins Title

ADELAIDE, Australia (AP)—Vic Seixas, the U.S. champion from Philadelphia, won the South Australian tennis title Saturday by beating Sweden's Lenhart Bergelin in the final 6-3, 7-5, 8-6.

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
