THE CAMERA CORNER

We've often said in this column that an exposure meter is the only sure way, summer or winter, to be sure your exposures are correct. But we hope you haven't gone boldly ahead and taken all exposures with a meter reading from the camera's position. That works fine if your photo subject is the entire scene before you . . . but if the main interest is a figure or any object that's just a part of the scene, a meter reading from the camera position can be misleading.

If the picture subject is in a situation where a lot of light is reflected by the background, then a meter reading from camera position will show more of the background than it will of the subject. If the subject is a person, his face will be inadequately exposed. So move in close. Hold the meter about six inches from your friend's face. A meter reading from this position will assure correct exposure of the face . . . and that's what you're interested in.

Follow this practice whenever there is a great difference in the brightness of subjects within the picture area. Move in close and take your meter reading from the main picture subject.

Last week we spoke of that resolution to take better pictures in '55. A good exposure meter will help you do this. Drop in the next time you're nearby, and let us demonstrate what the new exposure meters can do for you. One in your photo kit will save enough film during the coming year to more than pay for itself.
