## City Paves 1.52 Miles During 1954 Season

The Eugene city engineer's office reported Monday that 1.52 miles of streets were improved during the 1954 construction season. This is the lowest total mileage of street improvements since 1947, according to city records. An additional nine hundredths of a mile of new paving was attributed to a widening project in the downtown area. The street improvement report was made in a tabulation of public works contracts let by the city during the past year. The report was submitted to City Manager Robert Finlayson Monday. The summary includes a breakdown of all improvement projects:

One of the largest paving projects was the opening and improvement of 18th Ave. between Charnelton and Washington St. This provided an arterial for cross-town traffic under the city's 10-year improvement plan.

A rundown of specific improvement projects completed during the past year includes:

Paving: Donald St. from Pearl to 37th Ave.; 18th Ave. from Charnelton to Washington; Van Buren St. from 21st to 22nd Ave.; 17th Ave. from Agate to Fairmount; 21st Ave. from Emerald to Agate St.; 21st Ave. from Potter to University; 23rd Ave. from Friendly to Adams St.; Kincaid St. from 30th to Alder St.

Street widening: Charnelton between 8th and 9th Ave., and 9th Ave. between Charnelton and the alley to the east.

Alley paving: between Lincoln and Lawrence from 11th to 12th Ave.; between Pearl and High St. from 7th to 8th Ave.; between 12th and 13th Ave. from Hilyard St. east; between 5th and 6th Ave. from Charnelton to Lincoln St.; between Pearl and High from 6th to 7th Ave.

Sidewalk projects: Willamette St. from 25th to 29th Ave., 29th Ave. from Willamette to Lincoln St.

Sanitary sewers: Riverview district; South Hilyard St.; Agate St. from 26th to 27th Ave.; along the east boundary of Willis Heights from 34th Ave. south; Hilyard St. from 25th to 26th Ave.; Oak Grove, between 29th and 30th Ave. from Onyx to Agate; between 30th and 31st from Portland to Olive; Kincaid from 30th Ave. to Alder St.; Kincaid from 32nd to 35th Ave.; between Kincaid and Potter from 30th to 32nd Ave.; 35th Ave.

Storm sewers: Between 32nd and 35th Ave. from Hilyard to University St.; 4th Ave. from Mill to Ferry St.; between Lawrence and Washington from the Amazon to 16th Ave.; Cleveland St. from 14th Ave. to 18th Ave.; between Willamette St. and Donald St. south of 33rd Ave.; 6th Ave. from Almaden St. to Pierce St.; Longview St.

Pumping stations: Remodeling at 13th and Chambers St. station; new station at Judkins Point for the Riverview district.

Bridge projects: Across Amazon Creek at the Soals property; across the Amazon at the Leiter property.

## Youths Face Rape Charge

Three Western Lane youths were arraigned in district court Tuesday on charges of raping a 14-year-old girl.

Arraigned were Daniel E. Baldwin, 18, Westlake; James Lee Dennis, 22, Swisshome; and a 17-year-old Westlake youth.

Dennis waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury on \$3,500 bail.

A preliminary hearing was to be held for Baldwin Tuesday at 2 p.m. The 17-year-old was remanded to the juvenile department of circuit court.

According to the Lane County Sheriff's Office, the youths took the girl for an auto ride following a dance last Saturday night at Florence and criminally assaulted her.

Glen H. Syphers, 44, Cheshire, was arraigned on a charge of raping his 16-year-old daughter. He was bound over to the grand jury. Judge Chester N. Anderson set bail at \$5,000.

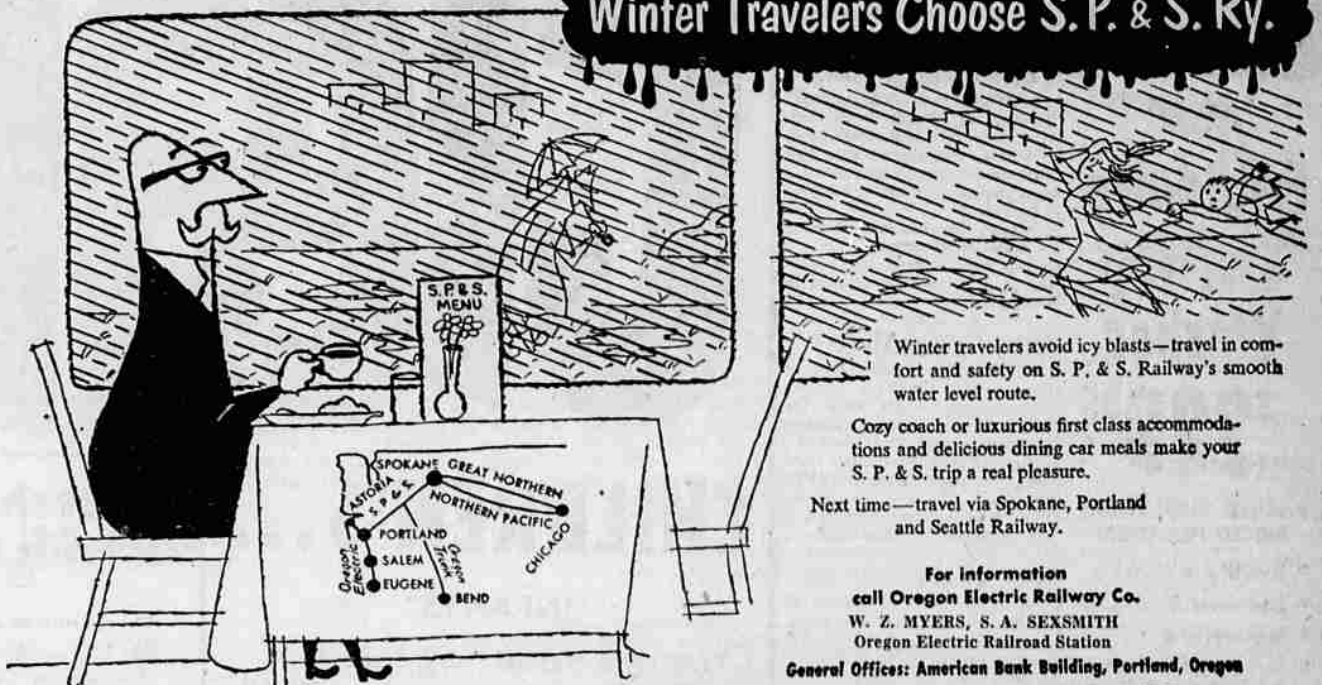
