

Oregon Mat Squad Defeats L-C 24-11

University of Oregon wrestlers made auspicious debuts at McArthur Court before several hundred fans Wednesday night as Coach Bill Hammer's varsity matmen, starting their second season, downed Lewis & Clark College 24-11. Coach Vern Sterling's Ducklings inaugurated the sport with an impressive 30-5 decision over Vancouver (Wash.) High earlier in the evening.

The Webfoots now invade Portland Saturday to meet the formidable Multnomah A. C., while the Frosh take on Roseburg High at the Igloo Saturday at 2 p.m.

Two varsity gridmen were of the squad, but both lost. Dave Lowe dropped a decision to Harry McAdam, Grid Coach Joe Huston's heavyweight, 4-1, and Jack Hendrickson lost a 6-5 decision to Howard Eyerly in the 167-pound class — one of the best matches of the evening. Oregon's points won on the strength of varsity scorers in the lighter weight divisions.

There was one technical decision that should have been a fall for 147-pound Dave Newland of Oregon, who was leading 5-0 in points and had Tex Cowart of the Pioneers pinned with a press when the loser was unable to continue because of pulled knee ligaments.

Roy Schlessor, Oregon 123-pounder, opened the evening with a fall over Bob Walker of the visitors in 1:10 of the first round. Only one fall came when Roland Wilson, 157-pound Duck, dropped George Willing in 1:42 of the first round. Oregon also picked up a decision in the 137-pound division when Bob Williams beat Benner.

The Ducklings won eight of their nine matches from Vancouver with Ray Green, Dick Lolema and Don Dexter scoring falls. Ken Kellogg was the only winner for the visitors, pinning Jack Cooke in the 127-pound class.

Dons Thump Broncos, 54-44

OAKLAND, Calif. — Nationally ranked University of San Francisco battled the Santa Clara Bronco basketball team to a 54-44 defeat tonight at the Oakland Civic Auditorium before 5,000 fans.

The Dons, ranked fifth in the nation used a second half stall to force Santa Clara to break its tight zone defense and come out after the ball. With eight minutes to play USF's 5 foot 7 inch guard, Rudy Zannini started the freeze. The Broncos over zealous guarding cost them fouls and gave USF the game from the free throw line.

The Dons started the evening by taking a 13-0 lead but in the final 12 minutes of the first half, Santa Clara, led by Kenny Sears and Gary Gatzert, pulled ahead and at the end of the period the Broncos were in front 29-27. Santa Clara hit for an amazing 55 per cent in the first half.

But the Dons bounced back in the second half and with eight minutes to go and a two point lead, started the stall. The Dons easily converted the Bronco fouls into winning points hitting 81 per cent from the free throw line.

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Gaels Post Upset Over COP 58-56

STOCKTON, Calif. — The St. Mary's Gaels scored well from the free throw line to score an upset 58-56 victory over the Iccold College of Pacific Tigers and record their first California Basketball Association victory of 1955.

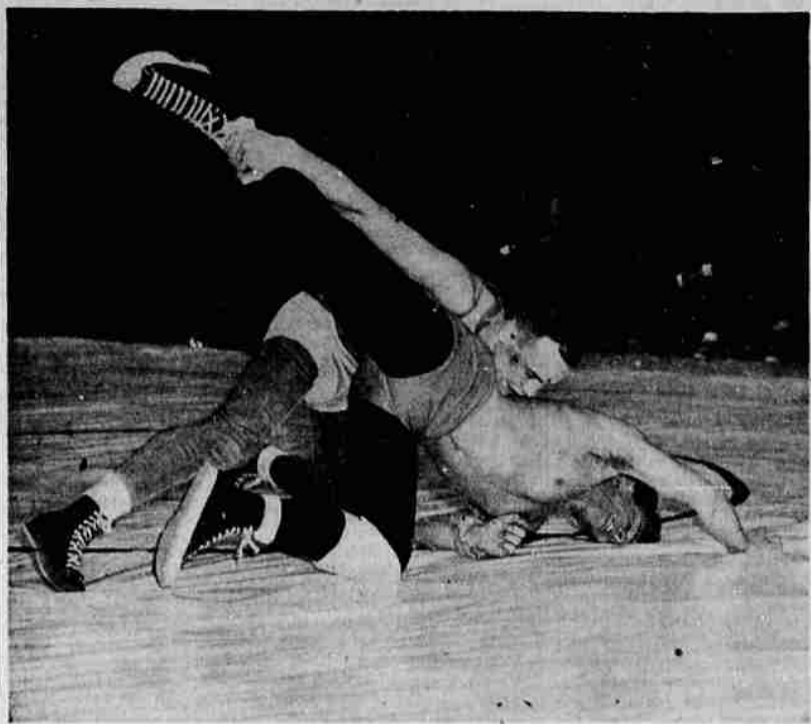
The Gaels were able to sink only 18 field goals but added 22 free throws to the total to outdo the Tigers. COP got 34 field goals into the basket but had to take an astounding 101 shots to do that. They got only eight free throws.

St. Mary's took the lead nine and a half minutes into the first quarter and never lost it. With nine minutes left in the game the Gaels led 48-38 but the Tigers closed it to 56-54 with a minute to go.

The final 60 seconds were hectic but resulted only in two points for each side.

Decision Won By Castellani In TV Bout Committee Adopts Six New Grid Rules

CLEVELAND — Rocky Castellani's unanimous decision over Holly Mims Wednesday night almost carried over into a dressing room rematch as the Mims encouragement burst into the winner's quarters screaming various versions of "we was robbed."

Castellani had been lunging in his robe. His eyes widened in surprise, and then he lunged to his feet, fists clenched, and muttered in flat, cold tones: "I'll show 'em who won it!"

Quick grabs by Castellani's trainers stopped what might very well have become a free-for-all, out of sight of the 5,348 fans in the arena and the television viewers who watched the 12-round middleweight bout.

Mims, along with his manager Nick Trotta and his trainers claimed that Castellani butted him in the clinches and rubbed him on the ropes.

Castellani's manager Al Naiman said later the rhubarb "was only the result of the heat of battle, and disappointment."

"They didn't really mean it. Everything's ironed out now. Everybody's happy."

Castellani's victory, which probably earned him another crack at Bobo Olson's middleweight crown, was fairly impressive. He let Mims take the offensive in the early rounds, but outboxed him all the way and dumped him to the canvas for a mandatory eight count in the eighth round with a hard left hook.

After the fight, Al Naiman, Castellani's manager, said Olson "has definitely agreed to fight Rocky within the next 90 days."

"Maybe," qualified Olson's manager Sid Flaherty, who sat with the champion at ringside and watched the fight. But Flaherty conceded that the only major obstacles in the way were arrangements, "money for instance."

The 27-year-old Castellani, at 159½, was four pounds heavier than Mims, 25, in Wednesday night's fray. He was rated No. 2 among middleweight contenders, behind Joey Giardello, while Mims was No. 3.

Castellani fights out of Cleveland. Mims is from Washington, D. C.

NEW YORK — College football has six brand-new rules Thursday—designed to give the game some of the "blessings" of the two-platoon system without any of its "curses."

A rule permitting more substitutions and five other more minor changes were announced Wednesday by an NCAA committee headed by Herbert O. "Fritz" Crisler—the group that has the "final say" on the rules of the game.

Under the new substitution rule, a player may leave the game once and return to the game once in each period. Last season, a player removed from the game could not return in the same period except for the last four minutes of the second and fourth periods.

The five other new rules were as follows:

2. A change in the signal for a "fair catch" from wig-ging of a raised arm to a salute with one arm raised skyward. Changed because wig-ging made it tough to catch the punt.

3. Allow the ball-handler on extra points or field goals to attempt to run, kick, or pass it, although his knee may be touching the ground when he "spots" the ball.

4. Make other linemen eligible to catch forward passes only if no other player on the team lines up closer to the sidelines.

5. Outlaw the "hide-out" or "sleeper" play in which a player lurks near the sidelines, then speeds downfield to catch a pass.

6. Allow a change in cleats to round ends instead of flat ends if desired.

The committee officials hoped that the greater freedom in substitutions would give football two of the alleged benefits of the old unlimited substitution or "two platoon" system—that is, efficiency of play and less injuries.

The rules-makers figure play will be more efficient because coaches will be able to adjust their lineup to meet situations at least once each period. And they figure the return rule will prevent injuries by easing the way for a player who is tired or nursing an injury to leave the game.

But the use of offensive and defensive "platoons" still will be impossible.
