FBI Agents Jail Fugitive

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The FBI arrested one of its 10 most wanted fugitives in a country club basement Wednesday night.

Agents jailed Walter James Wilkinson, 30. He was to be arraigned on a charge of unlawful flight from New York State to avoid prosecution on charges of kidnapping, armed robbery and burglary. Bond of \$20,000 was recommended.

The FBI said Wilkinson, using the name Walter Rogers, had been working for the last three months as a busboy at the Fox Hills Country Club, scene of the Los Angeles Open Golf Tournament last year.

He offered no resistance to arrest but agents said a loaded .32 automatic pistol was within reach in an open suitcase atop his bed in the club basement.

Robert L. Ragsdale of Lebanon, state president of the aviation enthusiasts' group, installed the local officers. They are Jack Larsen of Eugene, president; Freeman Day, vice-president; and Glen Stevenson, secretary-treasurer.

Lyon Lawrence, also of Lebanon, state secretary-treasurer, gave the 25 charter members their membership cards and decals for each aircraft.

Delmar Clem, president of the sponsoring Lebanon chapter, detailed the platform and aims of the association and read the pledge. The purpose of the organization is promotion of private flying, safety in use of aircraft, and good fellowship among pilots.

The local chapter decided to participate actively in a safety program contest begun by a private pilots group in California. The contest has the approval of the local Civil Aeronautics office, members said.

Committee heads named are Clifford Raish, programs; Margaret K. Husted, publicity; and Mrs. Jack Larsen and Mrs. Clifford Raish, food.

The next meeting will be a potluck, and plans already are underway for a weekend group flight to Reno.

Failure to Sell Surplus Farm Goods Criticized

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee Thursday rapped the Commodity Credit Corp. (CCC) for failing to offer its surplus farm commodities for sale competitively in world markets.

The criticism was embodied in the first appropriation bill of the new session. It is a minor measure appropriating \$25,000 in cash and authorizing several agencies to spend additional money from their own operating revenues.

The House passed the measure by voice vote and sent it on to the Senate. It was the first bill to be passed by the House in this session.

The \$25,000 in cash is to pay \$12,500 each to the estates of two House members who died last year—Paul Shafer (R-Mich) and Dwight Rogers (D-Fla). The payment is routine.

The committee recommended, subject to House approval, an increase of \$7,290,000 in administrative funds for the CCC.

But it criticized the Agriculture Department for its handling of price support, parity and acreage programs, saying the problem created by increased commodity holdings is not being solved. The CCC holds in storage commodities acquired by the government under various farm programs.

The committee said the CCC has a responsibility under law to sell its commodities in world mar-

Mayor Orders Radar Arrests

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland police were told to begin making radar arrests Thursday. Mayor Fred Peterson ordered the action because of the mounting traffic death toll.

There have been six traffic deaths in Portland so far in the new year.

Radar-equipped police cars have been in use here nearly a year, but police previously gave only warnings to motorists caught speeding.

The mayor urged that a coroner's jury be called to investigate each future traffic death. He also said additional radar equipment will be bought for the police.

Hines Workers Get 7 1/2c Boost

SENECA (AP)—The Edward Hines Lumber Co. offered its employees here a 7 1/2-cent-an-hour raise in line with the governors' fact finding panel recommendation and local 2589, Lumber and Sawmill Workers (AFL) has accepted the raise.

Ochoco logging local 2902 members previously accepted a similar raise.

The Hines Co. was not party to the dispute before the fact-finding panel. Al Zueldorff, assistant business agent of the Central Oregon district council of Bend, praised the Hines Co. here for being the first lumber operator in pine logging to grant the increase.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Negro drivers will soon be used on buses and streetcars in the nation's capital. The Capital Transit Co. has announced it is adopting an employment policy without racial considerations, effective immediately.

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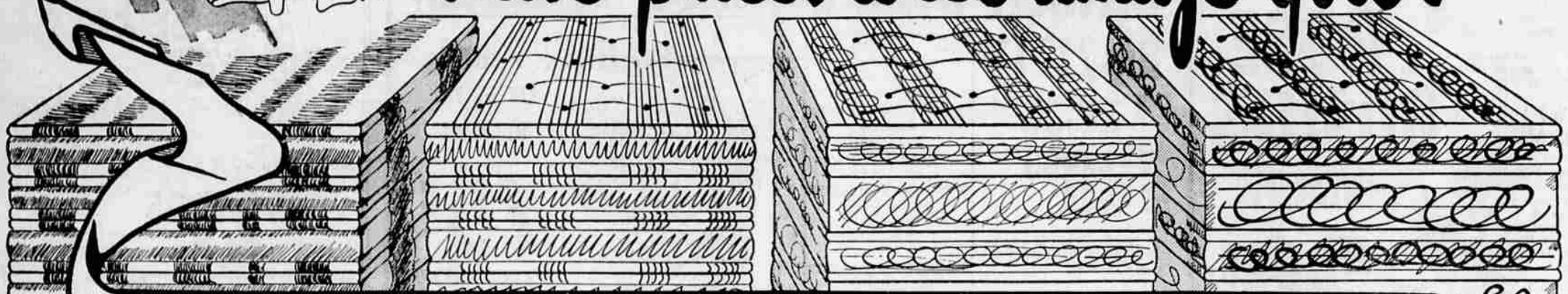
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
