Discipline Not to Be Confused With Punishment, Says Mrs. Argow

In her report of the 21 women's prisons visited in all parts of the United States during the late summer and fall, Mrs. Clair Argow, executive secretary of the Oregon Prison Assn., told members of the Women's Prison Council of Portland that discipline is not to be confused with punishment in dealing with the woman offender. She found all types of punishment in effect, even to solitary confinement in basement rooms where girls were locked for months at a time.

Contrasting with this, she found prisons where women worked under strict discipline for their own good; the institutions were run as nearly as possible like business institutions on the outside, with coffee breaks at regular intervals, and smoking restricted to those periods. Girls working under such rules would be schooled to restriction and discipline when released to reenter a business world, she said. Others allowed the girls to smoke at will when about their duties, and were failing, she felt, in disciplinary training as the inmates were allowed to form poor work habits.

She disliked to see large prison laundries, which trained the women for work which they seldom will find on the outside, since large commercial laundries are being replaced in many cities by the self-service units and the prevalence of laundry machinery within homes. Instead, she favored the teaching of the use of home-type machines, as preparation for domestic service.

Similarly, she approved the small-unit kitchens in the cottage-type prisons, instead of the central-unit kitchen on larger scale. It was more valuable, she felt, that the prison women be taught to cook for smaller groups, and learn proper methods of housekeeping on the family-size scale, so they might find employment in domestic service.

A few prisons, she noted, were training the women to serve as beauty operators, and wherever there was a beauty parlor on the premises it was found that morale of prisoners was higher.

MUSIC NOT USED ENOUGH
She found music not being used as much as she thought it should be, since the therapeutic value of music has been established. She felt that choirs could be formed in many prisons where they were lacking.

Church service, too, seemed to be a hit-or-miss proposition in many prisons, and she felt that religious principles were not playing the strong role they should. Almost none of the prisons had a full-time chaplain. Few had anyone with religious training of any sort working within the walls, although some had "staffers" who evidently were possessed of a false sense of piety, the "holier-than-thou" type.

In none of the prisons was there need of a Jewish chaplain, she noted, for there are no Jewish women among the prisoners. Some of the institutions were making no effort to rehabilitate the woman prisoner. There was no study of her case, to learn what made her a criminal; no counsel or therapy to correct her thinking. Their work was merely custodial. (This, she noted, is about the case in Oregon.)

Oregon, she noted, is not financially able to employ a full-time psychiatrist and similar staff, but the superintendent of the prison (matron of the women's ward) should always be a person able to train her staff, she said.

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Twelfth Night Party Given

Annual Twelfth Night party of Eugene Shakespeare Club took place Monday afternoon in the home of Mrs. Carl Washburne, where Christmas decorations of evergreens and burning candles were displayed as appropriate setting.

Mrs. William G. East, program chairman, was assisted by Mrs. Frederick M. Hunter and Mrs. Donald E. Tope. When all members and guests were gathered, a procession was formed leading into the dining room, all singing the traditional Twelfth Night song, "Here We Go A-caroling." They took places about the central table with its bowl of hot wassail, and Twelfth Night cake. Mrs. Henry Tromp, president, and the hostess, Mrs. Washburne, led in traditional Shakespearean quotations, others of the assembly following in turn with quotations from the famous plays.

Returning to the living room, Mrs. East announced choice of "king" and "queen" of the "revs." Don Hunter was named king, and Mrs. Frank J. Connell, queen. Both were marked with small beaded crowns pinned to their lapels, in token of office.

The program consisted in main of recordings made by Don Hunter in Ashland last August, at a Sunday evening performance presented during the annual Shakespeare Festival. It was a partial reenactment of an entertainment given for Queen Elizabeth I of England on her progress from Greenwich Palace to Nonsuch in September, 1598, when she was overnight guest in the Mitchum House. It consisted of musical numbers played on old instruments, and a short playlet.

Mrs. E. E. DeCou, a member just returned from a year's stay abroad, told of visiting many of the cities which provided locale for Shakespeare's plays, and said she was amazed how the thread of interest pervaded all her travels. Rome, which was her headquarters, reminded her of scenes of Julius Caesar; Venice, of Shylock, the Merchant of Venice; Athens, of the "Two Gentlemen"; Verona, of Timon, and Egypt's Nile river, of Antony and Cleopatra. Even in Jerusalem, she "saw" Henry IV and the Crusaders; France was filled with reminders of the French kings of whom he wrote, as well as of Jeanne d'Arc. In each case she was reminded of the club member who had led the study of the play.

Then she went to London, which to her was Shakespeare's London, and she visited Canterbury and Stratford, viewing the presentation of a play, "Taming of the Shrew," in the theater of Shakespeare. As she watched it, she could think herself back in Padua, which she had lately left.

Final step of the program was the "burning of the greens," for which another procession was formed, the greens dropped in the large fireplace. The women sang "Deck the Halls" as they marched.
