

Inferior Status of Women

Growth in social consciousness should wipe out of our civilization all remains of social inferiorities which are still there, sometimes consciously and sometimes subconsciously.

For instance, Paul gave the Christian position regarding the structure of a Christian society thus: "In it there is no room for Greek and Jew (social distinction), circumcised and uncircumcised (religious rite distinction), barbarian, Scythian (cultural distinction), slave, or free man (social, economic distinction); Christ is everything and everywhere" (Col. 3:11, Moffatt). And in Gal. 3:28 he adds: "There is no room for male and female (sex distinction); you are all one in Christ Jesus." That is the Christian position—clear, positive, sweeping. And in Peter's speech at Pentecost he said: "Your sons and daughters shall prophesy"—note "and daughters"—(Acts 2:17, Moffatt).

But in I Cor. 14:34 (Moffatt) Paul enjoins something else: "Women must keep quiet at gatherings of the church. They are not allowed to speak; . . . as the Law en-

joins." Note that he appeals to "the Law" for authority. Is he falling into the very thing he told the Galatians they were doing? It seems so. Every time Paul tried to put woman in a subordinate position, he appealed to the Old Testament, not to Jesus. Note: "but woman represents the supremacy of man. (Man was not made for woman, but woman for man; and man was not created for woman, but woman for man.)" (I Cor. 11:7-9, Moffatt). Here he turns back to the first creation for corroboration for his position—the first creation, not to the new creation in Jesus where "there is no room for male or female." Again in I Tim. 2:12-14 (Moffatt) he says: "I allow no woman to teach or dictate to men, she must keep quiet. For Adam was created first, then Eve; and Adam was not deceived, it was Eve." Here he turned to the first Adam for the sustaining of his position—the first Adam, not the Second Adam, Christ. His Christianity slipped a cog. And that slipping back to the pre-Christian has caused much confusion. Paul says that sometimes he was not inspired—he was speaking on his own. This was one of the times. And the ages have suffered because of it.

UO Grads Get Chance As Pastors

Campus ministers and student directors met Friday morning in the Department of Religion offices of the University to confer with the Rev. Robert Rankin, executive director of the Rockefeller Brothers Theological Fellowship Program, which has elicited so much national publicity since its genesis last February.

The Rockefeller Brothers have endowed the program to the extent of \$20,000,000 in an effort to help discover new and capable ministers for the Protestant churches of the United States and Canada. During the current school year there are five recipients of the scholarships, but but it is anticipated there will be at least fifty during the 1955-56 school year. No set stipend is designated, but necessary items of board, room, tuition, and living allowances are made according to need.

The deadline for nominations of possible candidates for next year is Feb. 1, and no student may nominate himself. Nominations may be made by professors, clergymen, or by qualified lay leaders of the churches. No student already committed to the ministry is eligible inasmuch as this is a particular effort to increase the number of church leaders in the United States and Canada.

Qualities expected by the committee which makes the final selection from the lists of nominees include (1) Demonstrated intellectual excellence; (2) Emotional stability and mental health; (3) Religious depth, which includes "a sensitiveness to the gospel, integrity, a love of people, and a rich sense of religion"; (4) Good personal characteristics; and (5) a "Vision of what the world ought to be, and the courage to fight for it."

The Association's committee which makes the final selections includes Dean Liston Pope of the Yale Divinity School, Mrs. Douglas Horton, formerly president of Wellesley College, and Dr. Whitney J. Oates, Chairman, department of classics at Princeton University. Pacific Coast candidates whose applications are considered good by this committee following their earlier nomination, will be screened personally by presidents of three Berkeley theological schools: Dr. Anderson of Pacific School of Religion, Dean Johnson of the Church School of the Pacific, and President Sanford Fleming of Berkeley Baptist Divinity School. The recipients of the scholarships do not have to enter the ministry as a vocation.

Scholarship students will choose any seminary of their choice so long as it is accredited by the American Association of Theological Schools.
