WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Paul H. Douglas (D-Ill.) said Sunday he is going to revive legislation designed to give voters a bigger voice in picking presidential nominees.

Peress Case Not Finished, Says Senator

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Army Stevens and Army Counselor John G. Adams likely will be asked to give the Senate Investigations Subcommittee more information on the Irving Peress case, Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.) said Sunday night.

McClellan, who succeeds Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) as subcommittee chairman, said in an NBC radio-TV interview he does not think the Army has provided all the facts.

Peress, a New York City dentist, was promoted to major and honorably discharged early last year at a time when McCarthy was demanding he be court-martialed for refusing to answer questions about communism.

McCarthy said Saturday night he had written Stevens charging the Army with practicing a "deliberate deception" on the subcommittee and the American people.

Early this month, the army issued a 10,000-word chronology of the case and listed Adams and Lt. Gen. Walter L. Weible, a deputy chief of staff, as making the final decision to give Peress an honorable discharge.

In his letter to Stevens, McCarthy said neither Weible nor Adams was included in a list of 30 officers the Army last spring named for the subcommittee as those "taking an active part in the personnel actions" concerning Peress.

The Army said Stevens had not yet answered McCarthy's letter.

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Plane Engine Probe Ordered

Boxcar Mishaps Prompt Inspection

GREENVILLE, S. C. (AP)—The 18th Air Force Sunday ordered special inspections of the engines of its 98 Flying Boxcar planes participating in training exercises in Alaska.

Headquarters of the 18th at Donaldson Air Force Base here said in a statement that the special periodic engine inspections will be "continued as long as necessary or until investigations being conducted in connection with the four Alaskan airlift C119 incidents reveal the cause for failures of the C119 engines."

Pilots parachuted their airborne infantrymen passengers during the four recent emergencies. One plane crashed, killing two.

The mishaps occurred as the planes airlifted more than 3,000 airborne infantrymen to the exercise.

Maj. Gen. Chester E. McCarty, commander of the 18th, was en route to Alaska for a personal inspection of the situation. He also ordered a review of the loads of the transport aircraft to provide greater safety should any have to operate on one engine again if the other engine fails.

At Anchorage, Alaska, the Alaska Air Command said Sunday night the 30 of 62 Flying Box Cars grounded there and delaying the start of the training exercise had been inspected and none needed any kind of engine repair. A spokesman said the remaining 32 would be inspected Monday. Other planes were still on their way north.

The planes are from the 314 troop carrier wing of Sewart Air Force Base, Tenn., with support from the 456th Troop Carrier Wing of Charleston, S. C., Air Force Base.

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Baron de Rothschild Dies Of Heart Attack in Jamaica

MONTEGO BAY, Jamaica (AP)—Baron Louis de Rothschild, 72, died of a heart attack suffered while swimming here Saturday.

The baron was a member of the internationally famous banking family and central figure in a record wartime ransom from the Nazis.

The body will be flown to South Ravalton, Vt., where the baron, who arrived here Wednesday for a holiday, had a home. He also maintained a home in New York.

At one time Baron de Rothschild was head of the Vienna bank and the Austrian branch of the family. He was arrested when Hitler seized the country in 1938, and was released a year later only after the family paid a ransom of 21 million dollars.

The huge payment was exacted as a penalty for the failure of a Vienna bank in 1931. Although

the baron had resigned as the bank head and used his personal fortune to replace losses, the Nazis maintained a further penalty should be inflicted.

One of the intermediaries in securing his release was the Duke of Windsor.

3 Lives Lost In Accidents

Automobile accidents in Oregon over the weekend claimed three lives.

Elvis A. Bennett, 24, Portland, was killed outright Saturday and his mother, Mrs. Edith P. Bennett of Oceanlake, about 55, died Sunday from injuries suffered when an automobile overturned on the Salmon River Highway 20 miles west of Dallas.

They were Polk County's first traffic victims of 1955.

John E. Sorvaag, 30, of Portland, died in a hospital Saturday about an hour after a car in which he was riding collided with a milk truck on Highway 30 near Fairview. The driver of the car, Theodore Hartman, 33, Milwaukie, suffered critical head injuries.

Rhee's Health Rumor Topic

SEOUL (AP)—The health of Syngman Rhee, 79-year-old president of the South Korean republic and implacable foe of communism, was a topic of mystery and rumor Monday.

One report was even published in Tokyo that the aging leader had undergone an abdominal operation at a U.S. Army hospital but a South Korean government spokesman denied it.

Highly informed American sources confirmed that U.S. Army doctors completed a series of medical tests on Rhee.

Despite this, Lt. Col. Henry C. Triesler, chief U.S. Army spokesman in Korea, denied any knowledge of it.

The informed American sources, who asked that their names be withheld, said Rhee has been undergoing extensive examinations for several weeks.

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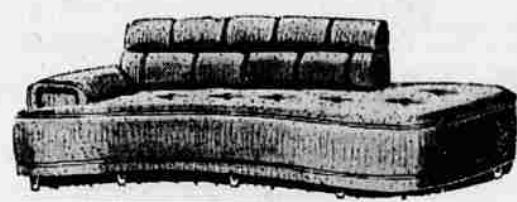
