Blizzards, Floods Hit West Europe

LONDON (AP)—Blizzards, hurricane winds and floods left a trail of havoc across Western Europe and the British Isles Tuesday.

Legal Battle Being Waged In Panama

PANAMA (AP)—Supporters of ex-President Jose Ramon Guizado Tuesday pressed for the Supreme Court to take over from the National Assembly hearing of charges implicating Guizado in the murder of his predecessor in the presidential chair.

The drive got underway Monday when attorney Alejandro Pinango petitioned the court to assume the job on the ground that the charges against Guizado resulted from actions allegedly taken while he was foreign minister.

The lawmakers named second vice president Ricardo Arias Espinosa to take over the government, replacing Guizado. The latter, who served as foreign minister and first vice president under Remon, was sworn in as president six hours after Remon was machine-gunned to death at the Juan Franco race track, four miles from the city.

Miro's confession said the assassination plot was carried out with Guizado's knowledge. It added that Miro had been promised the job of government and justice minister in the administration to be headed by Guizado after Remon's death.

The ousted president termed the charges "senseless."

Nautilus Due Back in Port Late Tuesday

GROTON, Conn. (AP)—Man was a full day into the era of nuclear transportation Tuesday as the submarine Nautilus, first of a proposed fleet of seven atomic powered undersea craft, remained at sea on her history-making builder's trials.

A spokesman said these trials were to last a full 36 hours, and that the Nautilus was not expected to return to her berth at the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp., here until "very late Tuesday night."

In man's first successful effort to tame the atom to produce transportation, the 29 million dollar cigar-shaped giant eased smoothly from her dock late Monday morning under clear skies.

With an absence of fanfare her skipper, Cmdr. Eugene P. Wilkinson, of San Diego, Calif., flashed a short message confirming his craft was under way on nuclear power, and moved the submarine into the trial area of Long Island Sound at a 12-knot speed.

As the Nautilus glided on its maiden run, it passed a sister-ship, the Sea Wolf, second of the nation's atomic-powered submarines under construction here.

Five Share Reward

MANILA (AP)—Five civilians Tuesday shared a \$25,000 reward for their aid in the slaying of Mariano P. Burgos, second-ranking Communist Huk leader, last November. Burgos was trapped and riddled with bullets by army units.

Balanced Budget Urged Via Cut in Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Byrd (D-Va.) urged the Eisenhower administration Tuesday to pare its spending plans by 4 per cent and balance the federal budget.

A good place to start, Byrd said in an interview, would be on the \$4,700,000,000 outlay for foreign aid proposed by President Eisenhower in the annual budget message he submitted to Congress Monday.

MAJOR ITEM This was one of the major items in a \$62,408,000,000 spending budget Eisenhower recommended for the bookkeeping year starting next July 1.

Congress responded generally along partisan lines to his "first things first" message calling for increased air power and slimmed-down ground forces.

Democrats giped at the President's failure thus far to keep his 1952 presidential campaign promises to balance the budget, criticized his "partnership" power development program and challenged his cut in farm outlays.

Republicans generally defended Eisenhower's figures as indicative of the hard realities of defense spending in an uneasy peace though a number said they were disappointed at the lack of a balanced budget. The President forecast a deficit of \$2,408,000,000, about half the size of the one anticipated this year.

Byrd, new chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and long a critic of deficit spending under previous Democratic administrations, made it clear he doesn't think Congress will be very successful in saving money because of the large amount of funds previously appropriated and available for administration spending.

But he said if the administration would take it upon itself to cut back spending 4 per cent—about 2½ billion dollars—the government could operate in the black for the first time since 1951.

'FACE REALITIES' "It is time that the administration and the Congress face up to the realities of our fiscal situation," Byrd said in a statement. "We are enjoying the greatest prosperity in our history. We are

THE CAMERA CORNER By LYMAN COBURN If you've shot much color, you already know that two types of color film are available—one for daylight use, the other for use under tungsten light. But sometimes you may be faced with the problem of wanting to make both daylight and indoor color shots on the same roll. A low-cost filter will enable you to do it.

The filter to buy here is a "compensating filter" that will let you use indoor color film under daylight conditions. There are filters that permit you to use daylight film under indoor lighting, but these filters require greatly increased exposures.

If you use Kodachrome color film, buy Type A Kodachrome film and a Daylight Type A filter to go with it. If you use Ektachrome, two compensating filters are needed: a Daylight Type B filter for outdoor shots, and a Wratten No. 81A filter for shooting indoors with photofloods. With Ansco indoor color film, get an Ansco No. 11 filter for outdoor shooting.

McCarthy Accuses Democrat Of 'Twisting' Security Report

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) accused Sen. Johnston (D-SC) late Monday of having "twisted and distorted" a report by the State Department on 90 persons termed suspect by McCarthy in 1950.

Johnston, in South Carolina Tuesday, was not reached for comment. He had announced Sunday that he had a letter from the State Department in reply to his questions about 90 persons who figured in McCarthy's early charges that the department was infested by Communists.

Johnston, noting that Republicans now control the department, said it had informed him "that not one of these persons . . . has been proved to be or found to be a Communist or disloyal to our government." He said the letter "should clear up this matter for all time."

McCarthy, who obtained a copy of the letter, said that as he interprets it, "to say they were all cleared of being Communists is completely false."

Both he and the department made public copies of the letter to Johnston, but with the names deleted—in keeping with presidential directives.

The State Department letter, signed by Asst. Secretary Thurston B. Morton, noted that none of the various laws or presidential orders dealing with loyalty or security cases "requires that it be proved that a person is a Communist before he may be discharged . . ."

Johnston had asked the department about two groups of persons—10 he said were named publicly by McCarthy before a 1950 Senate subcommittee which investigated his charges, and 80 accused by McCarthy under other circumstances.

As for the 10 in the first category, the department said one had been removed from the payroll under a 1951 law which pro-

vides the basis for the present security program, one was discharged under the Truman loyalty program, one was dropped for failing to meet foreign service standards, two were never department employees, two resigned, two were dropped when their assignments ended and one was transferred.

As for the 80 in the second category, the department said two were removed under the 1951 law, two resigned during proceedings against them under the old loyalty program, one resigned during

proceedings against them under the Eisenhower security program, one was removed for personnel unsuitability. It gave this further breakdown: 32 resigned for other reasons, 10 were transferred, 4 ended limited appointments, 8 were dropped for economy reasons, 1 retired, 1 died and 7 were never employed.

McCarthy said he had no quarrel with the department's letter which, he added, "does show that they got rid of 89 out of 80 . . . a high mortality rate that shows something was radically wrong."
