

Mr. Gelhausen Guest Soloist On Mu Phi Morning Musicales

Herman Gelhausen, assistant professor of voice at the University of Oregon, will be guest speaker and soloist on the Mu Phi Epsilon Morning Musicales, Thursday at 10 a.m. in Gerlinger Hall. He will present a brief resume of the evolution of opera. The music and styles will be illustrated by students singing excerpts from operas.

Mr. Gelhausen appeared in country-wide tours for several years with the Beggar's Opera Co., The Aborn Opera Co. and the Hinshaw Opera Co. In addition, he sang opera in Germany for four years, during which time he sang over 25 leading baritone roles. He received his training in New York and Munich, Germany, and twice won the Juilliard Fellowship.

Mrs. Spencer (Amy Lou Ware) is a graduate of University of Oregon and taught in Japan during 1946. She returned to that country in 1949 for the American Friends Seminar and the conference sponsored by World Council of Churches.

Very often the Japanese student finds it difficult to re-submit to the social mores of her homeland after her experiences in the United States, the speaker noted. Many of the girls wish they could remain in their new environment.
