

Plan for Arms Pool Apparently Doomed

PARIS (U)—Britain lined up with West Germany and Holland Tuesday in a move that practically doomed a bold French plan to put the proposed European arms pool under a single agency.

A weak compromise on the French plan began to emerge, however, before France's partners officially went to work on demolishing the single-agency idea.

Informed sources said some sort of arms pool definitely will grow out of a seven-nation conference being held here.

These sources said Germany, Britain, and Holland would turn down the French plan at the meeting Tuesday with German Economics Minister Ludwig Erhard outlining his country's official view.

Erhard circulated a memorandum to other conference delegates Monday, stating West Germany's objections to the French plan under which a single agency would control the manufacture and distribution of arms.

Lawmakers Hold Hearing On Trade Plan

WASHINGTON (U)—Four more Cabinet members were billed to appear before the House Ways and Means Committee Tuesday in support of President Eisenhower's foreign trade program.

The Eisenhower plan to expand free world trade by lowering U. S. tariffs gradually over the next three years got a warm sendoff Monday from Secretary of State Dulles and Secretary of Agriculture Benson.

Demos friendly

Tuesday's lineup called for testimony from Secretary of Defense Wilson, Secretary of Commerce Weeks, Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey and Secretary of Labor Mitchell.

Monday's sessions went along relatively smoothly. Most Democratic questioners were friendly to the trade program, the Republican critics moved gingerly against GOP Secretaries Dulles and Benson.

Chairman Cooper (D-Tenn.) of the Ways and Means Committee has introduced a bill to carry out the President's foreign trade proposals.

TWO KEY POINTS

Specifically, the program would:

1. Extend the reciprocal trade act for three more years. Under this act the President may negotiate lower tariffs on foreign products coming into the United States, in exchange for trade benefits to American goods.
2. Give Eisenhower power to cut tariffs an additional 15 per cent below current levels. The law now in effect permits cuts only to 50 per cent of 1945 levels. Many items already have approached this limit.

Editor in Tokyo

TOKYO (U)—Dr. Daniel A. Poling, editor of the Christian Herald, arrived Tuesday for his fourth visit since 1949. He met with Gen. John E. Hull, U.S. Far East commander. He will go to South Korea Thursday, for four days, return to Japan briefly and then fly to Formosa.



Youth Given Life Sentence

Executive's Son Admits Killing

DALLAS (U)—Keith Petersen, handsome son of a Dallas utility executive, faced as little as seven years in prison Tuesday after a surprise plea of guilty in the slaying of his sweetheart.

Petersen, 26, could have received a death sentence, or acquittal for the 1949 slaying of pretty Carolyn Schofield. But his father said Monday night that he feared a "vicious" jury might assess the death penalty.

AGREE ON DEAL

The elder Petersen and opposing attorneys told of a "swap-out" which resulted in the guilty plea and Judge Henry King's passing of a sentence of "life imprisonment."

Defense attorneys said they agreed to the guilty plea on the condition that the state drop its demand for a death penalty. They said they also asked—and received—agreement that Petersen's five years confinement in state mental hospitals would be counted as a part of his prison term.

This means in Texas that Petersen, once described by Dist. Atty. Henry Wade as a "pampered, egotistical boy guilty of a premeditated, cold-blooded murder," will be eligible for parole in seven or eight years.

OSC Grades Show Drop

CORVALLIS (U)—Twenty-four per cent of the students at Oregon State College dropped below a C average fall term and automatically went on probation, a report by the Academic Deficiency Committee shows.

The total is four per cent higher than a year ago with freshmen having the most trouble.

Fifty-two students were suspended as a result of extremely low grades and 104 were placed on the deferred suspension list. The automatic probation listing for below C average was established five years ago when college officials felt the need for something stronger than the "warning" notice issued before that time.

One of the effects of probation is that the student is prohibited from holding class or school offices until the grades are brought back above the C—or 2 point level.

Oregon Senators Rap Budget

WASHINGTON (U)—Oregon senators Monday attacked President Eisenhower's budget as "woefully inadequate" and one "which spells economic hardship and adversity for the Pacific Northwest."

Sen. Morse (Ind.) said the budget message was "woefully inadequate to the urgent needs of the Pacific Northwest," partly because the President "failed to recommend a multipurpose dam start in the Columbia River basin."

Both Morse and Sen. Neuberger (D) criticized the President's recommendation for "partnership" construction of reclamation dams by federal and nonfederal groups. "In the election this fall," Morse said, "the people of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest voted for new starts and public comprehensive resource development. Obviously the administration is ignoring their expressed will."

"I will work in harness with the Democrats from my region and those who regret that the bipartisan power development until recently has been abandoned by the present administration," Neuberger said the budget would hurt the economies of the Northwest.

The pledge of federal assistance for new hydroelectric development is tied specifically to the discredited partnership scheme, under which private power companies would monopolize the bulk of revenues at the dams," he added.

"This is a shotgun promise, telling the people of the region they must accept partnership or reconcile themselves to virtually no new projects at all."

"... The Bonneville Power Administration, which has been the life line of Northwest hydroelectric production, is to receive only 66 per cent of last year's budget. This symbolizes the gradual decline of Bonneville under the present administration, which hopes to see the great federal agency superseded by private power companies."
